He told Shay he felt a thump and remarked that he had run over something. Then he got out of the car and found the child lying in the driveway.

Mrs. Della LaChapelle, 45, whose home the accident occurred, said she had just fed her grandson when she was walking near and saw the car in bed.

The child was born in Williamstown Nov. 13, 1956, to William and Lillian LaChapelle. His father, 42, is a salesman of hardware. Beaudry's parents have three other children: Walter, Richard, William and George. Beaudry's mother, Mrs. Joseph LaChapelle, is a maternal grandmother, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph LaChapelle, and his maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph LaChapelle.

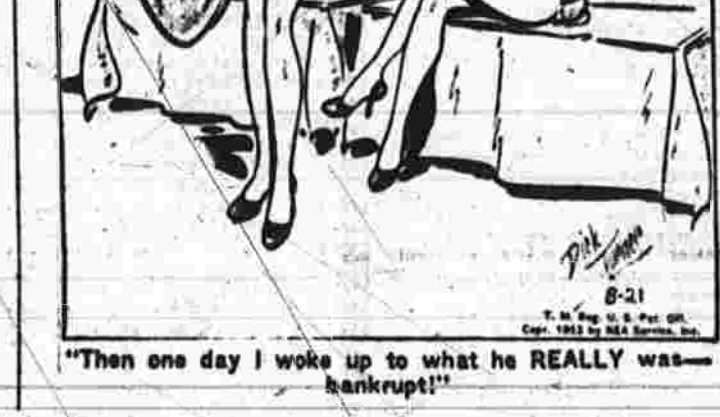
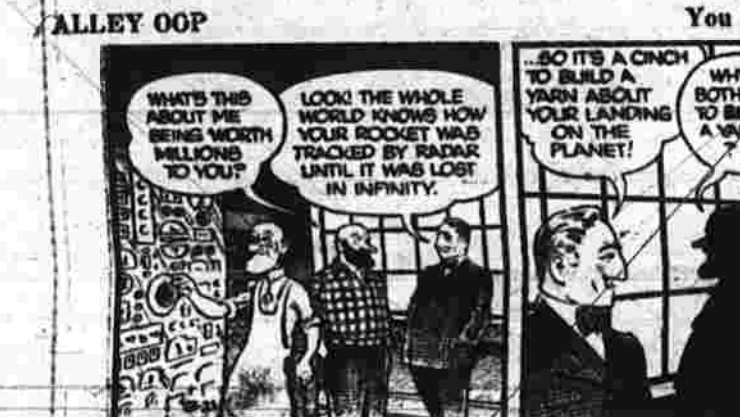
