Stenographer Admits Slaying of Young Girl

New York, Aug. 25 (AP)—A pretty Massachusetts stenographer, sobbing hysterically, admitted today she killed the 14-year-old sister of a former boy friend who broke off with her and married another woman. Police quoted petite Mildred McDonald, 25, of 230-20 51st Ave., Queens, as saying she shot the girl, Mary Di Rocco, on Monday night at a fireproof safe and a purse of jewelry.

The girl had been shot five times, her throat slashed and her body partly buried in the Di Rocco home in Bayside.

She had returned home today, Miss McDonald appeared in General Sessions Court and waived extradition proceedings. She was turned over to Massachusetts authorities to face a murder charge.

"I do consent," she said, dabbing a handkerchief to her eyes, when she was asked to sign a statement that she was willing to go back to a sharp-edged policeman, Patrolman George P. Grace, spotted Miss McDonald near the safe and took her into custody.

He recognized her from an Associated Press wirephoto of the girl's body, which was found in the trunk of a car in the Queens colony in 1948.

For 10 hours, the Monde newspaper protested her innocence. They later gave police the girl's name.

Detective Lt. David Murphy of the Middlesex County District Attorney's office, who came here to question Miss McDonald, said her story became vague from that point on.

He said she barely remembered dragging the Di Rocco girl's body from a first floor bedroom to the basement. But he said he recalled cutting the girl's throat, pouring oil on the body and lighting it.

Murphy quoted her as saying she got some water from the kitchen later and attempted to extinguish the flames.

Made Dramatic Appearance
The distraught stenographer, who was employed by the Massachusetts State Employment Agency, appeared in a police line-up after she had been booked in the charge of carrying concealed weapons. Standing on a stage in the glare of bright lights, she twisted a handkerchief and dabbed her eyes. She wore a white blouse and red skirt. She began sobbing heavily at the first questioning questions as to her name and address. Asked when she arrived in New York and how, she said she came on Monday by bus.

New weapons are so important, he declared, that they "are beginning to shake the present division of functions between the Army, Navy and Air Force."
