Durkin as Secretary of Labor. Durkin, a union leader and a Democrat, quit his cabinet post with a charge that the Eisenhower administration had broken an agreement with him to resign if the CIO quickly sided with the administration to be made in changing the controversial Hart-Weinbaum Labor Relations Law. Meanwhile, the first 14,700 Chinese war prisoners who were renounced Communist arrived in the Korean neutral zone, shaking their fists and shouting, "Death to the Communists," at Red observers.

Nearly 1,000 anti-Communist Chinese entered the newly opened stockades at the sprawling "Indian Village" near Panmunjom, where they will be guarded by Indian troops.

Most were underhanded stamped with the Chinese Nationalist sunburst. Many were 1,000-foot anti-Communist slogans.

The prisoners filed one by one through barbed wire lines and were imprisoned in the Indian U.N. and Communist observers watched the operation.

Some defiant Chinese prisoners, their faces flushed with anger, trembled and shook their fists at the Communist soldiers and newsmen peering from outside the barbed wire. The Reds stood impassive.

An interpreter said the captives shouted: "We will go back to the China mainland and kill Mao (Premier Mao, the Tung of Red China) and crush the Communists and running dogs of Russia" and are determined to go to Formosa.

The interpreter said some of the language was too strong to be printed.

The Indian soldiers had to grab some prisoners by the shoulders to quiet them over the shouting.

The Allies are turning over to the 3-Nation Repatriation Commission 14,700 Chinese and about 8,000 North Koreans who have refused to return to their Communist masters.

The Communists have said they would turn over about 10,000 Chinese and about 20 non-Koreans—mostly Americans—whom they claimed have refused repatriation.

No Report Received

An Indian spokesman said the Reds have made no official report but they may turn over these prisoners when they reach.

In Washington, the U. S. government has advised allies of the United Nations to hold "long conversations" about the repatriation of the men who have died in "harmful" fighting.

The main point of the plan is to let the men go to the United States, the United Kingdom, France, the Netherlands, Belgium, Luxembourg, the United States, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, and other countries.

Earlier, the Red Peiping Radio had attacked the list as "taken" and accused the U. N. Command of trying to draw attention away from what it termed Allied treachery in letting thousands of Red war prisoners go home.

Peiping apparently was referring to the anti-Red Chinese and North Koreans being moved into makeshift zones. It has often repeated charges that the Allies are using force to keep them from returning to Communist China.

There was no indication when the Reds would make an official report to the Allied demand for an accounting.
