She told the court she had liked and respected Maj. Holohan for his right principles.

"I said, instead, was a man who would have fun and make money," she testified, "he used to say 'either I will become a hero or fry on the chair.' He did not regard his work seriously."

Another witness, Police Lt. Elia Alberti, the investigator who recovered Holohan's body from the depths of Lake Ossa, told the court:

"Was 'Black Seal'?"

"Lt. Jorjani was the only member of the whole affair. I (Qualieri) Tosini and (Giuseppe) Manini failed to obey his orders and fled; they either would have been captured by the Partisans and shot, or they would have been executed."

Tosini, Manini and Manini are the three Italians charged with the murder of Holohan. The prosecution charges Le Dolec actually shot Holohan but that Jorjani planned and directed the crime.

Still another witness was Priscilla Sica, a former Partisan captain who was indicted for assisting in Holohan's death. She testified that Jorjani worked closely with Communist Partisans and cooperated little with anti-Communist Partisans.

question Mrs. Sandra June O'Day. "The FBI will let us talk to her," Mrs. O'Day said as a material witness, has admitted staying with Hall, in a St. Louis County motel the night before his arrest on Oct. 6.

Hall has not had counsel since his arrest in 1951. Louis and How-aver, he reportedly had asked M. K. Hoag, a Pleasanton, Kan., lawyer, to come with him. Hoag has said he would have his defense of Hall on insanity if he took the case.

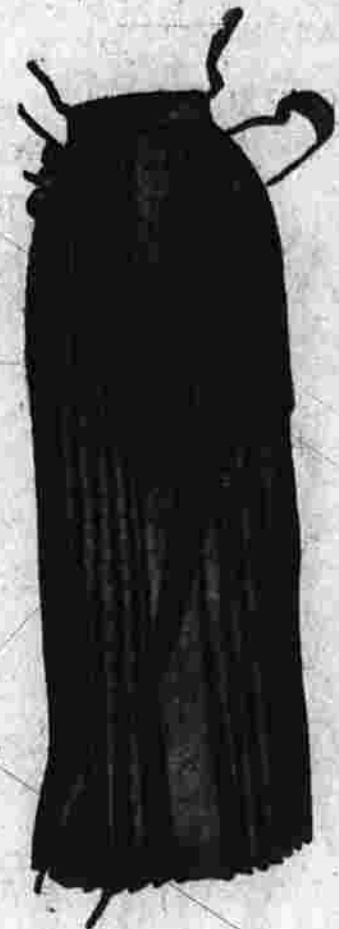

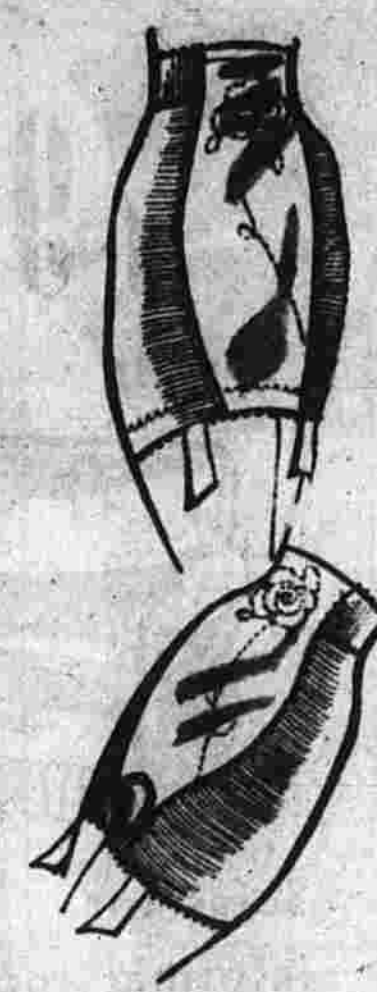

The Doctor Says

Albumin Discovered Through Albumin in Urine

By EDWIN F. JORDAN, M.D. Written for NEA Service

"My 20-year-old son," writes Mrs. B., "has albuminuria and cannot get a job because of it. He does not have any ill effects and I am wondering if diet can correct it. Please write on this subject soon."

It is impossible from this letter to know all of the circumstances concerning this young man. All that we know is that his urine has been found to contain albumin, which is a substance resulting from the destruction of certain proteins, and which is not normally present in quantity in the urine.

Why it should prevent him from getting a job is not clear because this is by no means a handicap which should alone prevent this young man from conducting most kinds of work.

The presence of albumin in the urine does call for investigation. The most serious possibility is that it may be a sign of Bright's disease, or nephritis, which is a disease of the kidneys. However, tests can be made to determine whether this is responsible, how serious it may be, and what can be done for it.

Another possibility is that the presence of the albumin in the urine is not really important, but is related to the posture or structure of the young man. In such cases the albumin is likely to be present sometimes and absent other, and is commonly associated with an excessive "swayback."

Under such circumstances it is not of serious significance.

Might Be Disease

A third possibility is a condition known as nephrosis. This is a rather general term applied to any one of several degenerative diseases of the kidney in which inflammation of that organ appears to be absent, thus separating it from the typical nephritis, or Bright's disease.

There are actually several kinds of nephrosis, in some of which the cause can be discovered, and in some not. The so-called "true nephrosis" is a chronic disease of unknown origin, much more common among children than grown-ups.

In the case of Mrs. B.'s son the problem is obviously to learn more about the "albuminuria" and its origin.

You've made the right decision, if you want to keep a son. But if you don't want that you had better stop long enough to do some clear thinking.

Perhaps you shouldn't have arrived for a visit without first writing your daughter-in-law to ask if it would be convenient for her to have you.

Even though it is your son's home, it is your daughter-in-law who must make the preparations for your visit, plan for your entertainment, and spend time with you while your son is at work.

So she should have known in advance about your visit so that she could have made her own plans accordingly.

Should Have Held Temper

Even though she was dismayed by your unexpected visit, she shouldn't have showed it or made you feel unwelcome. Nor should she have lost her temper and told you off.

But she did. And obviously she is sorry about it, for you have been invited back.

So if you are a wise mother, you'll accept the invitation graciously and enthusiastically. Limit your visit to a week, and try to understand your daughter-in-law.

You should also tell her you have realized you shouldn't have visited her last time without letting her know you were coming.

If you do that, it will probably clear the air. Especially if you add, "I won't be that thoughtless again." Then if she says she is sorry for how she acted, you can agree to forget the whole unpleasant episode and start over.
