### War Veterans Memorial To Be Dedicated Sunday

#### Ceremony at 3 p. m. to Clinax 20 Years Work by Veteran Field Unit

A dedication ceremony and the unveiling of a memorial monument in the memory of local veterans of all wars will be held Sunday afternoon, 3 o'clock at Soldiers Field in the East Cemetery.

The brief exercises planned will be the crowning moment for the Veterans Field Committee, composed of a group of World War I veterans who have struggled together for 20 years to provide this town with a permanent memorial to its war heroes.

In June, 1934, the small group of ex-servicemen, most of whom are still active on the Veterans Field Committee, gathered together to discuss the possibility of securing the original portion of the East Cemetery to be used as a veterans' burial plot.

The veterans organizations were present at that initial session and they still hold active membership on the committee. They include the British War Veterans, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Spanish War Veterans, American Legion, Army and Navy Club and the Disabled American Veterans.

It was the object of this group to designate a burial plot for veterans and the eventual erection of a memorial to those servicemen.

A parcel of land, known as Plot C on the map of East Cemetery, was the desired plot. After several discussions with the Board of Selectmen, then governing body of the town, the plot was given to the committee.

The new memorial was purchased at a cost of more than \$5,000. Funds were raised through the sale of the lots and from yearly dues paid by the members.

Site Dedicated in 1935  
Operation of Soldiers Field has been conducted jointly by the committee and town officials, particularly George Elliott, superintendent of the cemetery, and sextons of the cemetery.

Through efforts of the town and committee, work was started in preparing the parcel of land. The lots were laid out, walks prepared,

### Eighth District Tax Collections at 95%

Walter Leclerc announced today that \$42,814.47 of the district's tax money—about 95 per cent of the amount collectible—has been paid in and that most of it had already been turned over to District Treasurer Howard Keenan.

He said most of the tax money was paid by the Saturday deadline. Bills paid since then are being penalized at the rate of 6 per cent a year.

The World End property owners are paying a 2 1/2 mill tax on a Grand List of \$18,477,702 to pay for fire protection and other services provided by the district.

However, residents who are using South End sewer facilities are granted tax reductions totaling \$1,049.32.

In all, \$45,028.57 is considered collectible and Leclerc said late payments on the remaining bills are still coming in. Persons wishing to pay their bills in person may do so at Leclerc's office at the rear of 23 Main St.

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### Preacher of 91 Still at Pulpits

Chattanooga, Tenn. (U. S. Press)—Just because a man is 91 years old and his suit is pretty well worn is no reason to quit filling pulpits, says the Rev. Robert F. Rogers.

# Frosh Had It Tough in 1853

Yellow Springs, Ohio—(NEA)—  
Could you pass an examination on  
Miss Peabody's Polish-American  
System of Chronology? If not, you  
would be admitted to the Fresh-  
man class at Antioch College—  
100 years ago.

In getting ready for the college's  
centennial celebration, school of-  
ficials turned up a copy of the  
first catalogue dated 1853. It listed  
the entrance requirements, and  
most of them would stop a 1953  
fresh out.

There were some old stand-bys,  
like English grammar and arith-  
metic. But the history requirement  
was that system of Miss Pea-  
body's, and nobody around seems  
to remember what it was all about.  
The emphasis was on Latin and  
Greek, with an aspiring collegian  
having to pass exams on many  
classics in the two languages, as  
well as Latin and Greek compo-  
sitions.

Once admitted, the curriculum  
was pretty stiff, too. Freshmen  
took courses in algebra, Latin and  
Greek in the first term. Later,  
more exciting stuff was added in—  
like spherical trigonometry,  
rhetoric and belle-lettre, and  
didactic.

The tuition for this great ad-  
venture in learning was \$24 a  
year. The rent for a dormitory  
room, according to the catalogue,  
was \$3.50 per term, and there were  
three terms a year. Food, at the  
Commons Hall, was \$1.35 per  
week, but "owing to the high  
prices of provisions, some advance  
upon this rate may be necessary."  
Coffee or tea was 25 cents a week-  
end.

The catalogue, which was one  
large sheet, is now kept in a box  
for all the students to see. Maybe  
some of them will want to brush  
up on Miss Peabody's System.

# 100-Year Forecast: Too Hot or Too Cold

New York (NEA)—Weather  
forecast for next 100 years, when  
the man who makes this daring  
prediction is Arnold Court,  
graduate meteorologist at the Uni-  
versity of California. Using a  
mathematical formula, he has pre-  
dicted the probable highest and  
lowest temperatures for 100 spots  
along the U. S. in the next century.

Sometime between now and 2053,  
the mercury in Death Valley,  
Calif., will bubble up to a tepid 130  
degrees. And the coldest will see,  
in the Yukon, will be a frosty 10  
degrees. Court's computations are  
based on the fact that the world's  
temperature is rising at the rate of  
one degree Fahrenheit every 100  
years. The Montana can hardly wait  
to see the thermometer rise to 130  
degrees.

Court sets forth his conclusions  
in an article in the American  
Geographical Society's Geographi-  
cal Review. It has all the fasci-  
nation of a horror story.

Pick your location and bear the  
worst. New England? A high of  
107 (in Massachusetts) and a low  
of 36 below (in Vermont) will be  
recorded in the coming 100 years.  
The South? Up to 114 (in Arkan-  
sas) and down to 22 below (in  
Tennessee) make this coming cen-  
tury charming.

states are probably the worst off,  
with Court anticipating a high of  
116 along a belt extending from  
Montana through the Dakotas, Ne-  
braska, Kansas and on to the Okla-  
homa-Texas border, with a chilly  
60 below in Montana and North  
Dakota.

Angeles will get warmer (112 to  
Miami's 99), but Miami will be a

extremes are 108 and 28.

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# Polish Boy, 13, Finds His Way to Freedom

 A young Italian-American boy, who just has joined the 45th Division in Korea, can hold his own in the "old hands" when it comes to describing battle adventures.

Pfc Casper Dennis, 28, of Philadelphia, went to war at 13 as an Italian guerrilla fighting German Nazis in 1940. He joined the Garibaldi Guerrilla Resistance Army, named after the early 19th century Italian patriot. He harassed German detachments in northeastern Italy and threatened home collaborators.

Two years later at 15, Dennis had risen to a rank compared to the American Army's company executive officer. After surviving the Nazi occupation and four years of war, Dennis came to the United States in 1950. He lived in Philadelphia and worked as a tile setter before he was drafted this year.

 He never read Fenimore Cooper or Mark Twain — American authors once beloved by children in Eastern Europe, but now strictly taboo in the Red world. He was not turned by Indian cowboys. Wladek risked his life to go to America because in Poland people just believe that in America one can find freedom.

Never Believed Reds  
 The Reds use every propaganda device to convince the people behind the Iron Curtain that the U. S. is a "fascist" country. They even teach children in the schools that President Eisenhower is a "warmonger" who will lead us to a "war" with atom bombs.

My friends and I never believed the nutcase teachers, although we pretended we did. "Wladek said. "My father always told me that Eisenhower was a great American general and a real friend of Poland."

Wladek's stirring story tells more about the Red "paradise" — and the cold war — than any article written by experts or politically-wooded diplomatic notes.

He was six when Poland was "liberated" by the Russians. His father owned 10 acres of land in Galicia, and there was hope that, now that Poland was "free" again, he would become a big estate. But the Red Army stayed on.

He-Are "Captives"  
 Wladek's father was a hard-working peasant. But with the state constantly plundering this "capitalist" of 10 acres, it became increasingly difficult to make ends meet.

Finally, in desperation, the peasant decided to abandon the farm he inherited from his father. After months of wandering, he found work in a factory in a big city in northern Poland.

There, too, life was hard and earnings were small. But there were fewer taxes to pay and no Red grain "quotas."

But soon there came the mid-night knock on the door. Wladek's father was arrested. There was some talk of partisans, men hiding in the forests and concealed arms.

Heard Freedom's Voice  
 Wladek was sent to live with his uncle, who worked not far from the East German border.

It was in his uncle's house that the boy first heard the mysterious radio broadcast. It came a few minutes before midnight. It was a not summer night but all the windows in the house were tightly shut. Suddenly a voice said in Polish: "You now hear the voice of Free Poland."

Wladek was thrilled. New vistas opened up before the little fellow. Now he waited impatiently night after night for his uncle to turn on the hidden instrument so that he could listen to the mysterious voice.

Some of these graduates, said Miss Foster, are doctors and one is a dentist. It being easier for women to be accepted in the profession of fields than in the business world.

Not many go into nursing as a profession, however, as they have to take a long course of study.

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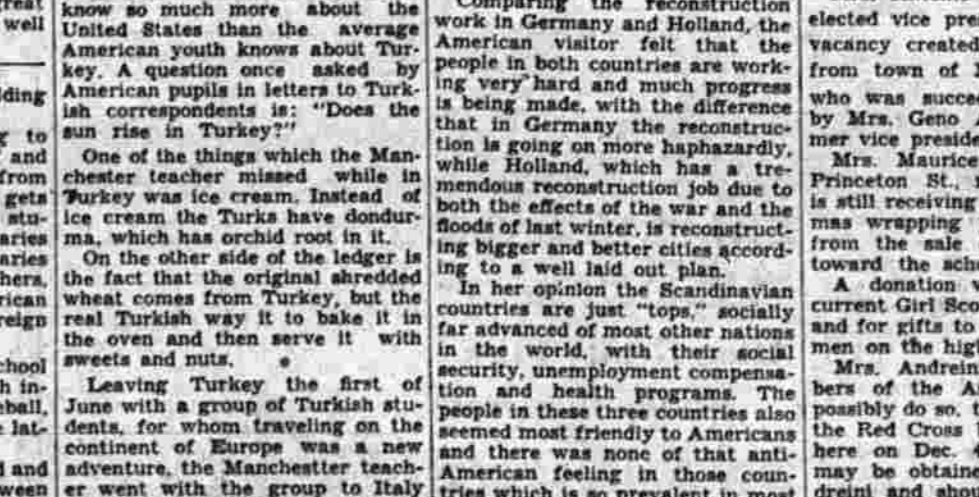

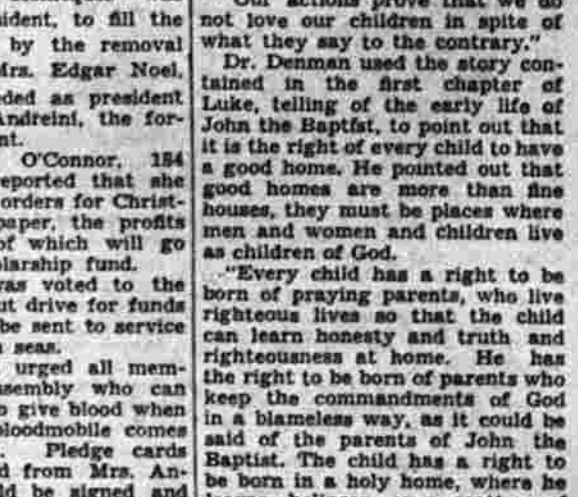

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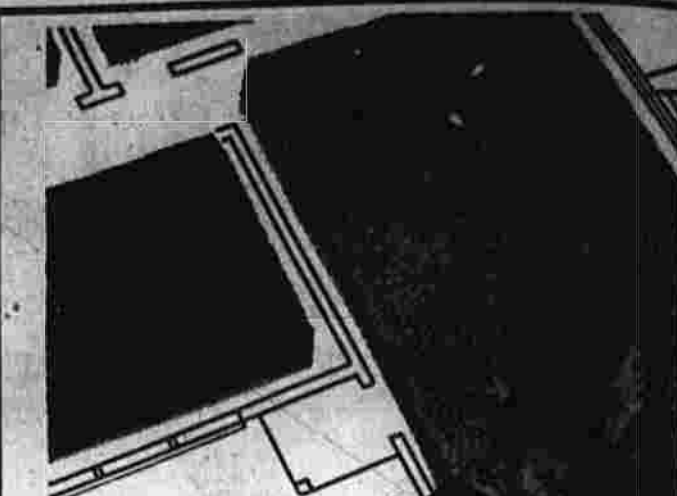

More Room for Court

paralit in current talks at Pannumoon, Thore U. R. and Red Chinese representatives have been talking about holding the Korean Peace Conference. The Chinese to say that neutral nations must be present and they call Russia a neutral. The United States, opposing neutral nations as such, says Russia may sit on the Communist side.

Many State Department officials have an explanation for what they term Russia's "evasive" attitude on a Korean meeting. Dulles told newsmen yesterday that negotiations on a Korean conference may be part of the same pattern.

Ross Have Internal Issues  
The central idea is that the Communists are plagued by a variety of internal problems which make it undesirable for them to deal now with the Western powers on concrete problems.

Speculation about internal conditions which would feed such a desire for a diplomatic stalemate and that could last perhaps for years includes:

1. The Kremlin, beginning with last summer's riots in East Germany, has found itself weak there and in some degree in other parts of Eastern Europe.

2. There probably are many complex problems which have to be worked out between Moscow and Red China's government. There is no need to assume differences amounting to a major rift in order to think that Soviet-Russian relations may be as difficult as to hamper the conduct of their foreign affairs.

3. The reins of power may still not rest firmly in the hands of Soviet Premier Malenkov and his followers. He may want to feel much more secure before undertaking serious business with the outside world.

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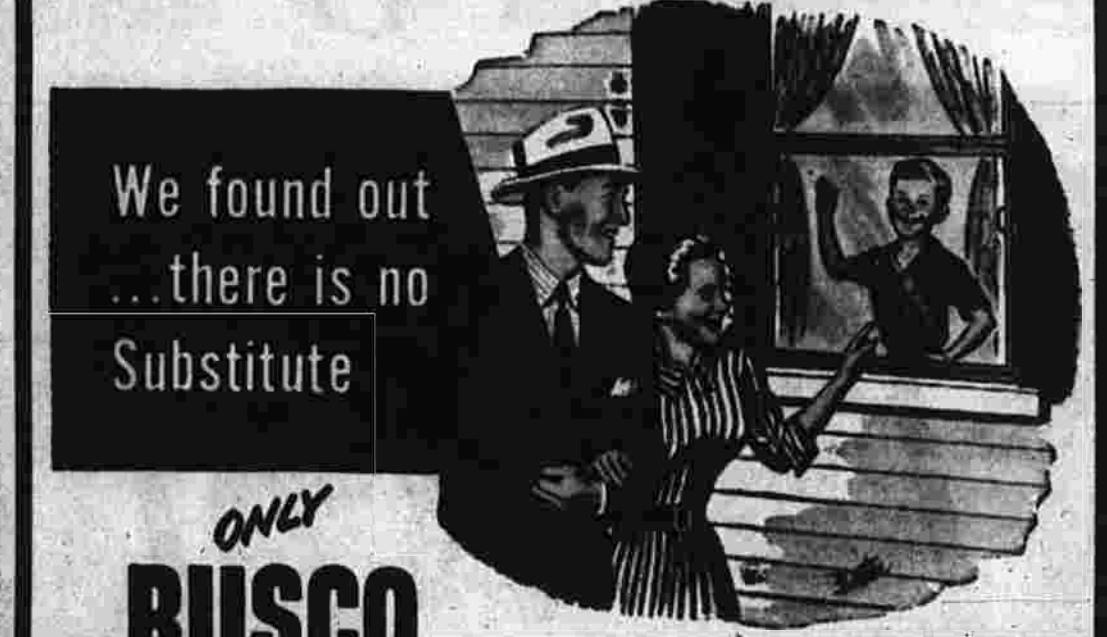

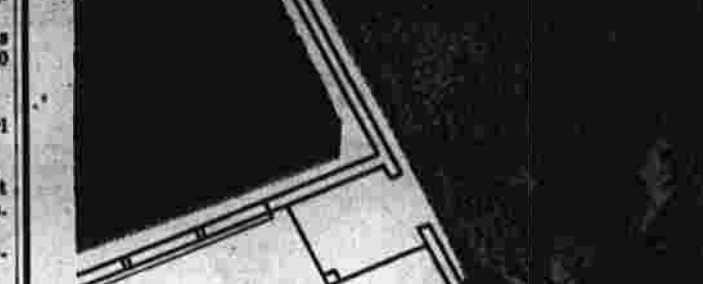

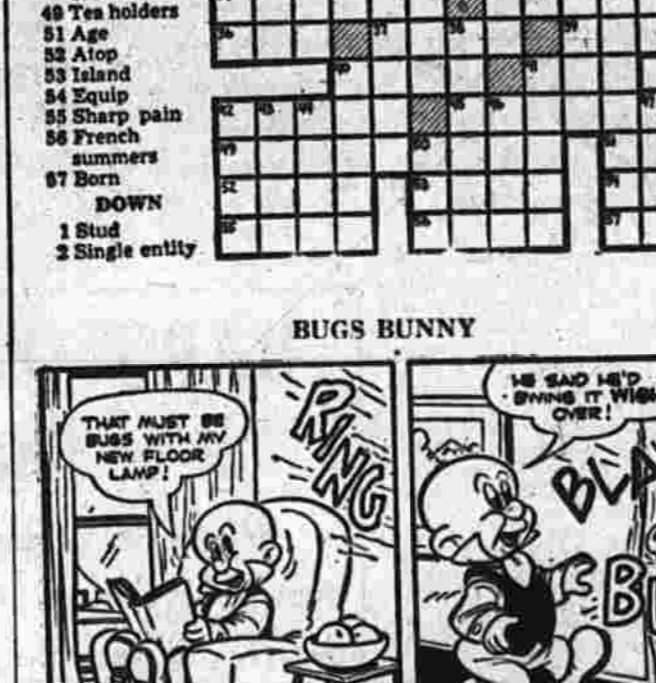
