can judge how clear the proof of White's guilt would have seemed, back in 1950 and 1951.
 It is a new device necessary that, whatever it is to show, there should be full disclosure, from as many angles as possible, of what happened to the FBI reports which should have gone to President Truman.
 Finally, if the Eisenhower administration has now decided that it is both good politics and its own solemn duty to undertake such disclosures about the political past, it is to be hoped that it will make a clean job of it as swiftly as it can. It was elected to be an administration of accomplishment as well as purge. The great hope for the present American military and diplomatic policy in Korea, but he also has very definite ideas of his own about just how the American economic aid which is on its way to him should be spent. There is \$520,000,000 already earmarked for South Korea, but President Rhee's attitude leaves some doubt as to how swiftly it will be spent.
 A Congressional committee, headed by Congressman Charles B. Brownson, Indiana Republican, has just returned from South Korea and a survey of the problems of reconstruction there.
 Congressman Brownson reports that "President Rhee wants to rebuild the Federal Building just because the Japanese built it while they ruled Korea. He ignores the fact that the Federal Building is far more serviceable than our State House in Indiana, for instance."
 "Similarly he wants to span Korea from Pusan to Seoul with a four-lane super-highway. Neither the terrain nor the country's automobile traffic would justify such a project."
 In addition, according to the Congressman, President Rhee has requested that "the world's largest radio transmitter" be built at Seoul.
 All such projects the American congressmen found to be more in the nature of "memorials to his administration" than projects designed to help create sound economic conditions inside the country.
 Nonetheless, Congressman Brownson deserves credit for taking a measured view of President White when he promoted such difficulties with him.
 "He is neither archangel nor devil incarnate," said the Congressman, "but a weary old man who has spent a lifetime fighting for his country's freedom, and his ideas are those of an old man, some good and some not so good."

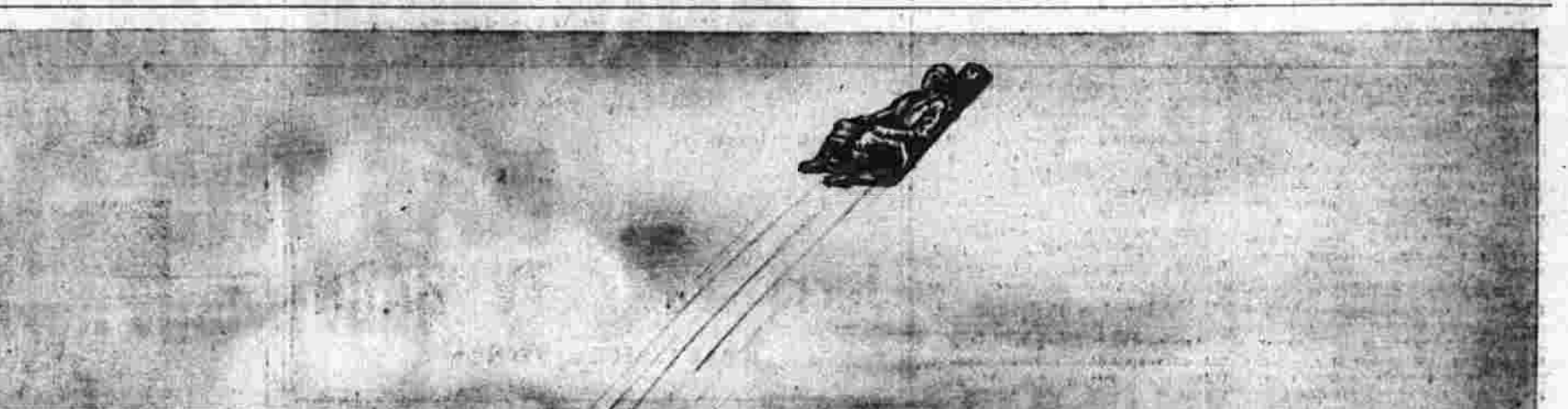

Connecticut Yankee
 By A. H. O.
 The importance of being mayor, under the Hartford city manager system, is largely a matter of honor. Such political power as exists inside the city manager system, resides in control of the City Council. The member of the City Council who scores the highest vote in getting elected is automatically in a year. Nevertheless, this ceremonial and honorary title has become quite a prize, in the years that Hartford has been on the city manager plan.
 Hilberto, the Citizens Charter Committee, the non-political party organization that supports the city manager charter in the election, has always been the direct one of its candidates. But there has always been the threat that one of Hartford's self-made, non-political candidates, one of the individuals rising straight out of the East Side type of ferment which is most of Hartford, once you get beyond the insurance buildings, would make it for mayor.
 In the midst of Democratic State Chairman John Bailey's entry into the hitherto non-partisan elections Hartford has been holding, one of these characters did make it.
 Democratic DeLacoco had already become famous, as a member of the City Council, for his colorful operations on the English language, as well as for the free-wheeling style of policy advocated by him. And, following what was the formula for success and prominence in Hartford politics, he is a restaurant owner. He is the new mayor of Hartford.
 This fact is not the most important product of the success of the Chairman Bailey's re-entry into local Hartford politics. The important fact was that the Bailey touch was enough to convert the hitherto disorganized efforts of the ambitious Democrats into a concerted campaign which resulted in a change of control of the City Council. There, State Chairman Bailey stands pledged to defend the city manager charter and principle, which makes the question merely that of what there will be left of it after he gets through defending it.
 But the by-product of Bailey's success was the fact that, in the Democratic victory, DeLacoco ran high man, and therefore became mayor. And how he happened to run high man, is an interesting story of election day strategy. We are unable to give credit to anybody for the strategy involved, because it would not be the kind of thing either Bailey or DeLacoco themselves would do and DeLacoco made it quite clear, in his post-election statement, that he disapproved of it heartily. It will have to stand, we are afraid, as an anonymous stroke of political genius.
 The strategy consisted of passing out at the polls campaign pamphlets bearing the name of some other candidate in large bold letters at the top. Next, the pamphlet offered a lever number, but that of DeLacoco. At the bottom of the page, in small type, was a line intimating what the pamphlet was really about, which was DeLacoco for mayor. This strategy was expected to work unusually well in districts particularly interested in some minority group candidate, who didn't stand a chance of winning anyway. But it was also applied, boldly even to the mayor DeLacoco now succeeds, his name in big type and DeLacoco's "number underneath it."
 No one knows whether this anonymous stroke of genius made DeLacoco mayor or not. There was, according to reports, something of a race between the number of those who were fooled by it, and those who, discovering the trick in time, showed their resentment by casting DeLacoco altogether. But, in any case, this was part of the atmosphere of the campaign which has now brought reform government to Hartford a new set of "defenders."

Cab Driver Hit by Sailor Who Refuses to Pay Fare

Bolton, Nov. 10 (Special)—A young Bolton sailor, home out from the base at Norfolk, Virginia, will appear in Trial Justice Court Nov. 17 on a charge of breach of the peace.
 William Tomlinson, 19, of French Rock, engaged a City Cab Co. taxi in Manchester at about midnight Saturday for the trip home. When he was asked for the fare of \$3.50 by cab driver, Clifford Loomis of Route 85, Tomlinson is alleged to have told Loomis he would have to go to Norfolk to collect it. Loomis suggested a return trip to the City Cab office to settle the matter whereupon, State Police report, Tomlinson struck Loomis who lost consciousness.
 When Loomis was able, he drove back to his office and was immediately taken to Manchester Memorial Hospital where three stitches were necessary to close a gash in his forehead. Doctors were of the opinion he received several blows.
 Tomlinson was arrested from sleep at his home by State Trooper Richard E. Powers of the Colchester State Police barracks. Tomlinson was identified by Elmer Thrall, dispatcher at the City Cab office, as the fare Loomis picked up at the office before the ill-fated trip. It occurred in being taken to a \$500 bond for his appearance in town court. He is due to report back to Norfolk Nov. 19.
