**Martin to Sell \$5,450,000 in School Bonds**

General Manager Richard Martin was authorized by the Board of Directors last night to sell \$5,450,000 in bonds for the construction of the new high school on Kenney Street school.

The directors adopted a resolution directing Martin to make the sale, which was to be completed by the end of the month. Martin is expected to receive bids on the purchase of the bonds. Last night's special meeting was adjourned until then.

The board also designated the Hartford-Connecticut Trust Co. as the certifying and paying agent for the bond issue, even though its bid on the job was only second to the lowest. The First National Bank of Manchester, which was the low bidder, was passed over at Martin's suggestion because of the general manager's thought was that the bank's greater experience and wider service offered.

The vote authorizing Martin to sell the bonds was 7-1. Director Theodore Fairbanks was absent, and Director Walter Mahoney was the negative vote. Mahoney, who has fought the town's school building program all along on the grounds the schools were more costly than necessary, said his vote last night was simply maintaining his protest against the high cost of the school.

Of the bonds that Martin was authorized to sell, \$5,000,000 will go for the construction of the 82-room high school, and \$450,000 for the construction of the six-room Kennedy Street elementary school.

It was brought out last night that the town's capital improvement account now totals \$653,000 of which \$150,000 represents balances remaining from previous construction accounts. Martin, however, advised against tapping this source for school building.

**Men Know Fashions Better Than Women**

New York Nov. 9.—More a wife-to-day knows more about baseball, politics and the stock market than her husband.

Buy she has to tip her hat to him in one field—he is likely to be a better judge of women's fashions.

This somewhat revolutionary view is firmly held by Mr. John P. John, the noted milliner whose clan for four generations has been telling the world's "how-to" what kind of clothing they look best in.

"Men have basically sounder fashion tastes than women, because they are more interested in the women themselves than in things they put on their backs or atop their heads," he said. "They know when a style looks right on the woman they love, and when it doesn't."

That is why "Mr. John" likes wives to bring their husbands along on shopping safaris to his gilded white and gold hat palace on the East Side.

"Men like women to wear a hat with a clean, simple, unadorned hat line," said John, who has guided his himself. The naps of his life will be that simple, unadorned hat line, "I can tell her she's too old for that kind of monstrosity. I just tell her she's old and she signs one. It's wrong to go around wearing fashion monstrosities."

John bosses his feminine clientele with an imperious air that amazes and rather awes their husbands who aren't accustomed to seeing strong-minded Cantors boss men for a living male Cantors.

The 45-year-old designer has 200 employes, grosses better than two million dollars a year, but designs every hat himself, working always from a living mold. He designs every day, can turn out a new one in five minutes.

"I've designed between 15,000 and 20,000 good hats in the last 20 years," he said modestly. "Somehow you don't last. And how many hats did you design? That would be like asking a big contractor, 'did you ever put up a really lousy skyscraper?'"

"Napoleon personally designed the hats for some of his troops," he said. "They were quite good. Very dashing—quite bravo."

# Two 'Doughnut Girls' of First War Brought Fame to Town

## Turkington Cousins Lauded as Heroines

**Honored Here in Two-Day Celebration in 1919**

By MRS. MARY S. TAYLOR

Did you ever hear that Manchester was once called "Turkington" for two days, back in September, 1919? It's true for the name appeared in the headlines of an article in the Manchester Evening Herald at that time. If you read below you will find the names of the clergy-

man of revered memory who anguished it.

The occasion was the home-coming of two Salvation Army nurses after World War I—the cousins, Florence and Myrtle Turkington, world-famed "doughnut girls" of the doughnuts. They were returning after two years of service with the 56th Division and the Army of Occupation in Germany after the Armistice was signed Nov. 11, 1918.

After the news came that they were selling on the "Mahrntana," the various veteran and other organizations of the town, banded themselves with plans for giving the girls a rousing welcome. Their aunt, Mrs. Joseph Atkinson, of Boston, wife of Col. Joseph Atkinson, of the Boston area, made the trip to New York to greet them as they arrived, and accompanied them to Manchester.

Hours before the train reached Depot Square, through miles around the railroad station. It was estimated that over 3,000 people were present as the cousins alighted from the train, greeted and surrounded by the cheering throng.

There were cheers from everybody. The Salvation Army band and two other bands struck up the tune, "Home Sweet Home," then formed in line for the Welcome Home Parade.

Mrs. Atkinson and her nieces were separated in the crowd that surged around the heroines, as they were escorted to waiting automobiles.

Main Street was decorated in red, white and blue along the line of march to the Salvation Army Club. The war veterans donned the suits they bought in "Over There" and wore them again in the parade honoring the girls whose ministrations to the boys in the trenches had up to the traditions of the Salvation Army and brought respect to the Manchester corps throughout the country.

Arriving again at the depot, the girls were welcomed at the entrance to the club on the corner of the church for a quarter of a century. The Rev. Mr. Spencer, pastor of the church, brought greetings from the church and the city.

After the Rev. Mr. Neill's speech, the late Charles A. Bowen, who was called upon and he came forward to the platform and presented to the girls of honor two handsome American flags, 41 x 37 inches, made of Cheney silk, with his congratulations and good wishes.

Reverend Englewood asked for speeches, Florence said: "No words can describe our pleasure and appreciation for the welcome home. It is altogether too much for what we have done, we expected to steal into Manchester unnoticed and were not prepared for a few words but we are spoiled, and we can only thank you."

Myrtle said: "Sometimes I have been where the shells were falling around me, but the shells did not scare me half as much as I am scared now. We loved our work among the boys and we know it was appreciated. It wasn't just a job, it was our best. I have been in France, Germany, England and Italy, but they cannot cover up the fact that I'm not a homecoming girl, I'm not a homecoming girl. We are both glad to be home and we thank you all."

The cousins had been standing at the Salvation Army Training College in New York but a few minutes when they made the decision to take up the canteen work for the Army in France. The Salvationists made a wonderful record for humanitarian work in the Boer War. They were highly complimented by Field Marshal Haig for service rendered to the British Army in World War I and by General Pershing of the American forces.

Whistles blew, bells rang and everybody danced, but the stillness "Over There" proclaimed the good news.

Myrtle said it was the most enjoyable and desirable place they had found on their travels with the Army. The soldiers enjoyed the reading room with its magazines and papers from the U. S. A.

Myrtle was the taller of the cousins and didn't in the least object when they called her "Big Turk" and Florence, "Little Turk."

Today her dark hair is gray, but the smile and the sweet voice is still the same. She was honored by the American Legion to join its expedition to the battlefields some years ago and one of the few Salvation Army ladies to receive the Medal of Honor for distinguished service during World War I.

Another yet said: "The best thing about the Salvation Army work near the front line was the simple that accompanied the girls. Florence had a knack of wrapping up every doughnut and every can of coffee with a smile. The doughnuts were fine—but the smile that took the place of powdered sugar."

There were many other services that the Salvation Army girls and officers rendered to the soldiers. They followed the Army as it moved along. Often, at night, the girls were requested to pack up. They kept near the front and said good-by and a God Bless You! as the boys went into battle, and were the first to welcome them when they returned from the fray wounded and worn.

They took messages to be sent back home if they failed to return. They looked after the mail and belongings while the battles raged. The S. A. officers, hundreds of whom were doing their bit, conducted religious meetings on Sundays and evenings throughout the week in the effort to keep up the morale of the fighting men.

The Salvation Army's uniform was as welcome as that of the Red Cross. Occasionally the girls had the pleasure of ministering to the Red Cross nurses and canteen
