After being appointed a regular carrier, he was assigned to Route 1, succeeding the late George Dickinson, who then became money carrier. When George Dickinson became postmaster, Congrove became money order clerk, succeeding Elliott W. Waterbury, who later became assistant postmaster.

During his long years in the postal service, Congrove served under Postmasters George Dickinson, George Foster, George Dickson, Saul Peizer and the present postmaster Edward M. Congrove.

When Congrove entered the postal service, the office was located in what was then called the Prescott Block, now known as the Professional Building at that time one of the present personnel of the office were in the postal service.

Jets to 'Bomb' Town for CD

Main St. Area Target; 'Red Alert' for Drill to Be Sounded at 2 p. m.

Anti-defense exercises here today will get under way when a siren of jet planes by over town. If weather permits, shortly after the "red" alert sounds at 2 p. m. and drops "incendiary" bombs on Main Street.

The incendiary bombs will really be smoke bombs exploded at designated locations a few moments after the planes pass overhead.

When the all-clear sounds at 2:15 p. m., the radiological monitoring team will arrive on Main Street to check the area for radioactivity. The teams will find no danger, however, and will message headquarters that the area is safe for defense teams.

The Engineering Division of Civil Defense will move into the area to remove debris and open the way. They will inform radio headquarters when the area is passable.

Then fire equipment and rescue teams will come on the scene. In response to requests by police and fire, ambulances and the mobile hospital will arrive.

The firefighters will remove injured persons from buildings and start to extinguish the smoke by using aluminum emergency line as well as hoses. Fire department personnel also will demonstrate use of the respirator.

Meanwhile, first aid will treat persons with minor injuries and more seriously injured victims will be carried to the mobile hospital where medical teams will be in service simulating operating procedures.

During the entire exercise all communication, except radio, will be assumed out of order.

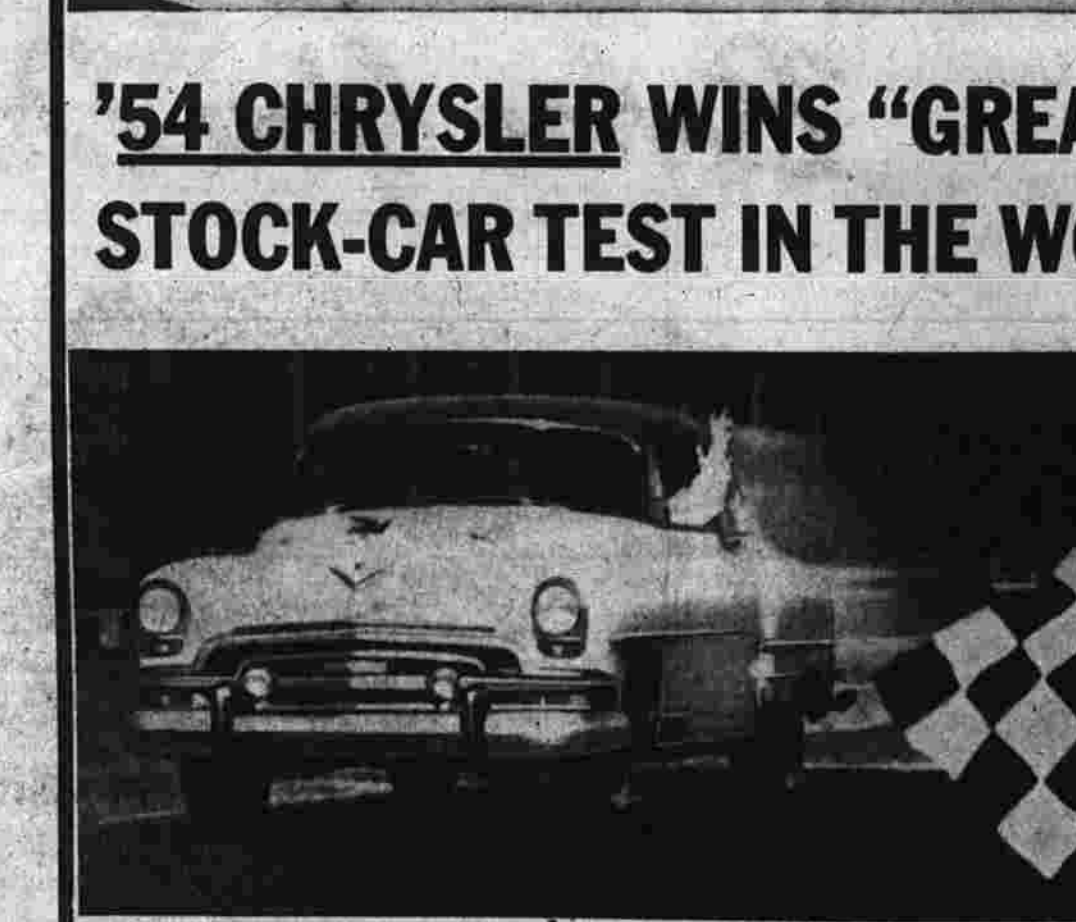

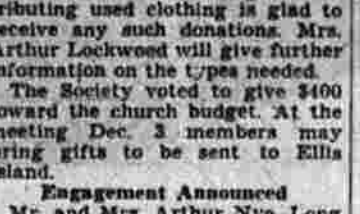
