Dock Union Walkout Ties New York Piers

 more widely explained today's work stoppage.
 It distributed handbills saying: "The old I.L.A. is responsible for you longshoremen having to register to work."
 Under the new Bi-State Commission, longshoremen must register and then seek work through employment centers.
 Previously they were hired in a "shape up" whereby hiring bosses chose the workers from "gangs" which gathered outside the piers.
 This was the second major work stoppage to hit New York in a week. A photo engraver strike has resulted in suspension of publication by all seven major newspapers.
 A spokesman for the bi-state commission described the longshoremen work stoppage as "a sympathy strike" for hiring bosses who had been refused work permits.
 Some of those engaged in the stoppage said their principal protest was against delays in hearings to determine whether permits should be issued to certain men.
 While collar employees of the Swedish-American Line handed luggage at Pier 9 after the Gripsholm doubled there, longshoremen refused to do the job.
 Some permits carried signs saying they were "locked out" because they were not hired for work on the United States, due in at 9 a.m. (EST). None, however, signed on.
 Under the new law, which went into effect at midnight, longshoremen must be signed on in the employment center, after first being interviewed by the commission.
 The midtown piers where most transatlantic heavy lifting is done have been regarded as a stronghold of the independent longshoremen. Longshoremen's Assn. ousted last September from the American Federation of Labor and dock rackets.
 The state commission's task of taking over supervision of all the piers has been complicated by a jurisdictional dispute between the old I.A. and a new AFL Dock Union.

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be dawning on our diplomats, too, that, as Walter Lippman observed some time ago, if the European Defense Community ever does come into being, it may be something quite different from the original plan which, Mr. Acheson launched it.

Originally intended to be a guarantee of security for Europe against Russia, it is now quite likely to wind up as some strange device for assuring Russia of security. Originally intended as a card before the horse of European economic and political unity, it may now be a rather harmless by-product of an economic and political unity placed first.

Unless it is an altered and changed, it is, by last week's counting of noses in the French National Assembly, dead. It has never fired the imagination of the people, scheduled to engage in it. The European movement in which there is genuine life and spark is that of political and economic federation. In that, there may be a safety more basic and sound and healthy than any formal alliance can provide, for that might make western European Europe strong and confident in its own mind and spirit, which is the important place to be confident and content, as the Magnin Line once demonstrated.

It is no surprise that, returning from a conference with Chiang Kai-shek, to which he was flown in an American military plane, President Dwight D. Eisenhower said that he felt that the security of America had to be answered, immediately, by the statement of our military commander in Korea that our forces stand ready to deal with any eventualities, including some dramatic move by South Korea.

President Eisenhower and Chiang Kai-shek have too much in common not to be reinforced in their mutual attitude by a meeting. Both would like nothing better if it were not for American aid. But, thanks to that American aid, both of them now possess considerable military strength. This strength is not enough to win a war against Communist China, but it is enough, if they choose to use it that way, to start a war which would soon be World War III. And World War III, whether it is only a preliminary or a full-scale war, is the only course of history which fits in with their personal views and their personal power.

Both Chiang and Rhee, although they possess military strength only as a result of our aid to them, are impatient with American policy and contemptuous of it. They even think that they would be doing us a favor if they took some action which embroiled us in full conflict with the whole Communist world. They think the battlefield is the only place where they can present world struggle can be settled.

Aside from their obvious rashness of instinct, both are also something of a liability to American policy. They pose with us as the champions of liberty and freedom, and yet both are authoritarian leaders, whose conceptions are democratic ideal and process have been more than a little above truth, distortion above information. It is encouraging, therefore, when we see instances in which the production of a newspaper is regarded as something of a sacred privilege, accepted with the highest sense of devotion and idealistic responsibility.

In New York City, they are all being missed, the good and the bad, the responsible and the irresponsible, those who do honor to the American public, and those who merely parade the presumed moralities. But perhaps even in the worst of them, as they inevitably resume their privileged functioning, there will be some slight stirring of mind and resolve, some questioning as to how, in their new start, they can better honor the mission which is theirs. No true newspaperman can ever stop and think about his profession without resolving to try to make it better.

Noses Counted For many months past, the actual sentiment of the French National Assembly with regard to the proposed European army has been a subject of guesswork. Last week in the voting which weakly maintained the government of Premier Laniel, the Assembly was actually showing its hand on the army proposal for the first time. And what it showed was a pronounced majority against the European army plan.

This does not mean that France is not ready to join the European army. It only means that, presently, apparently, they are leaning toward the proposition, if they do eventually accept it, they will do so on their own terms.

Since the Russians can probably show the voting in the French National Assembly as well as any other body, it is not surprising that they should now be operating in the knowledge that it is still likely to be a long time before we can bring our European army project into actual being. Churchill's Life Story Lesson of Inspiration

New York (AP)—All who want to live into their 80th year should take a few tips from Winston Churchill.

He is the best known artist of living in our time. Why? It isn't his talent as a writer, orator, or statesman, philosopher, warrior, and literary genius. He wrote this history, and he made his name through his words.

His restless mind plumbed all pleasures of body and spirit, questioned all creeds, yet was unshaken to pray for success to a God whose ways he couldn't understand.

The idea that nothing is true except what we comprehend is silly," he said, in summing up his spiritual religious doubt.

Churchill has played and worked with equal fervor all his life, and yet is a stout defender of the afternoon nap.

The rest and the spell of sleep in the middle of the day refresh the human frame far more than a long night," he wrote. "We were not made by nature to work, or to play, from 8 o'clock in the morning till midnight. We throw a strain upon our system which is unfair and unproductive. For every purpose of business or pleasure, mental or physical, we ought to break our days and our marches into two.

So if you want to live a rich full life like Churchill's all you have to do is favor both the sun and sweet slumber, and get that afternoon nap.

Mumps Tops List 11th Week in Row

Mumps, up from 76 to 116 cases during the week ending Nov. 28, continued for the 11th consecutive week as Connecticut's most prevalent communicable disease, according to the State Health Dept.

Since Jan. 3, a total of 6,560 cases of the disease have been reported as compared to 5,888 cases in the same period of 1952. The five-year case average for the period of 5,371.

Other diseases showing case increases during the past week were chickenpox, up from 75 cases to 89; scarlet fever, from 14 to 20; and poliomyelitis, to 8.

On the decline were German measles, down from 10 cases to 6, and bronchiopneumonia, down from 23 cases to 14.

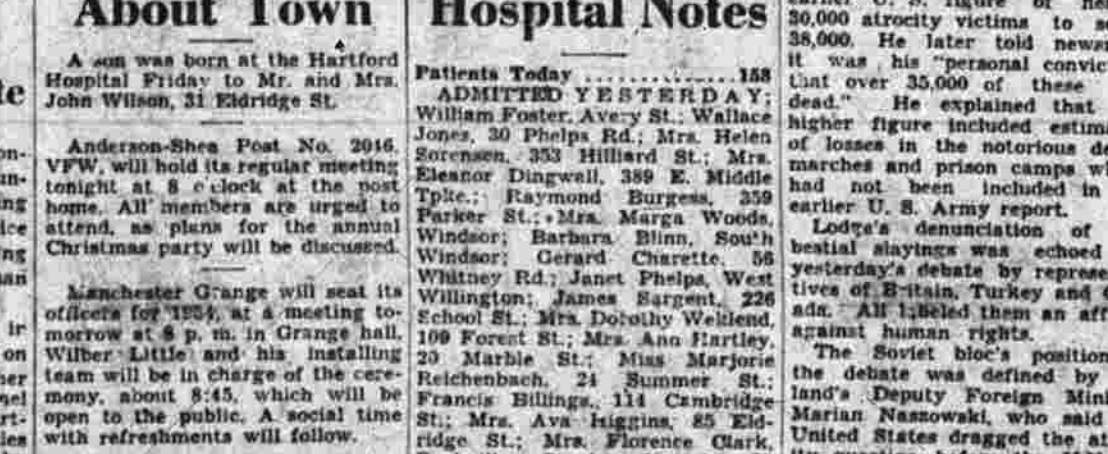

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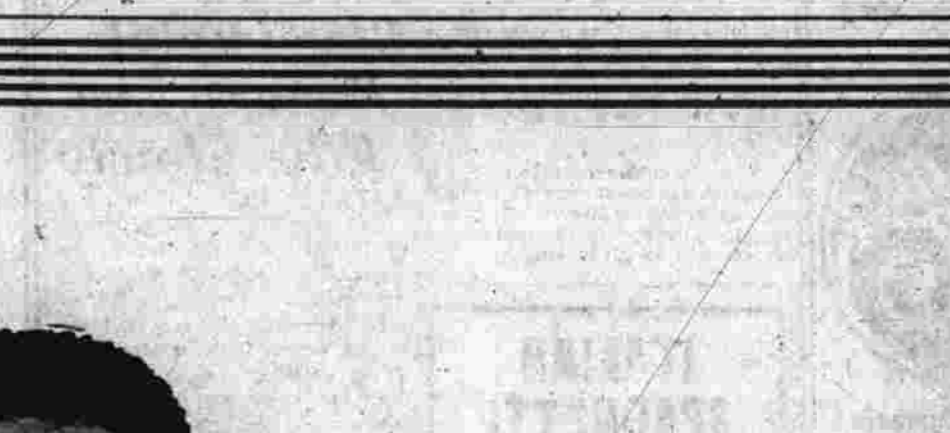
