Joseph DellaFera Retires; Worked 54 Years as Tailor

The customers of Joseph DellaFera who stopped by his West Street shop on Walnut St. last week to pick up cleaned or repaired or altered clothing...
DellaFera, a short, iron-gray-haired man with thick black eyebrows and a neatly lined face, retired from business Saturday, and his customers—most of them away—had developed into a loyal following.

"I'm not feeling too good these days, and I want to retire and take it easy," he would tell his customers who asked him his plans. Then he would add, "I feel I've done my duty."

When DellaFera turned the lock on the small shop that he located just above the New Haven railroad station in 1902, he was starting a career that started back in Italy 54 years ago, when he learned the tailor's craft as an apprentice in his native town of Caserta, Italy.

DellaFera, who was born in Caserta, near Naples, learned to sew back in the days when tailors sat cross-legged on a table, their backs straight, and with the material they were working on resting on their right knees.

The reason for sitting on tables, DellaFera says, was simply to save space. Crowded factories would employ hundreds of tailors and having them sit on tables on each corner, did away very nicely with the need for space-consuming chairs and benches.

Learning the craft is a tedious process, DellaFera says, and cites this as one reason that the supply of tailors is drying up. "You work for four years for nothing, or maybe just for subsistence wages. After that, you don't know anything. You learn one stitch, and you practice it—not on clothing, of course, just a piece of cloth. And you're told to practice it until you get it perfect. Then you learn another stitch, and work on that until you get it right."

"This may be your last button to work on. And you have to get all the stitches to look exactly the same. If one is off, you have to do it all over again."

But the best sewing is worthless unless you know how to finish it, press, a garment, DellaFera declares, so you learn how to handle a hot iron—how to press a garment so it really looks neat and evenly done.

And all the while the apprentice is diligently practicing, he watches the tailor, to see how he fits a customer, how he cuts patterns, does alterations.

"Oh it's tough," DellaFera will tell you. "Young men these days aren't interested in learning. The business, and I can't blame them. It takes four years before they can even start making money, and then they have to work long hours to make a living if they want a shop of their own."

The constant drilling on the fundamentals that DellaFera was subjected to as a boy, almost by the evident pride he has taken in his work apparently left him with the feeling that tailoring is something almost personal between the tailor and the garment and that labor-saving devices blunt a tailor's skill.

But after a while, he decided he was ready to become a tailor in his own right, and earn something for his labor in addition to supporting his family.

He had intended to stay in Hartford only long enough to get married and then head back to Virginia. But he stayed on and didn't leave until 1921, when he and his family of six children, moved to Manchester, where the family was founded out with the addition of two more little DellaFeras.

In Hartford, DellaFera worked as a tailor for G. Fox and Co., and then, with a partner, had opened a shop on Apple St. that moved here after his brother Nicholas, already tailoring in Manchester, sold him on the benefits of the town as a place to bring up a family.

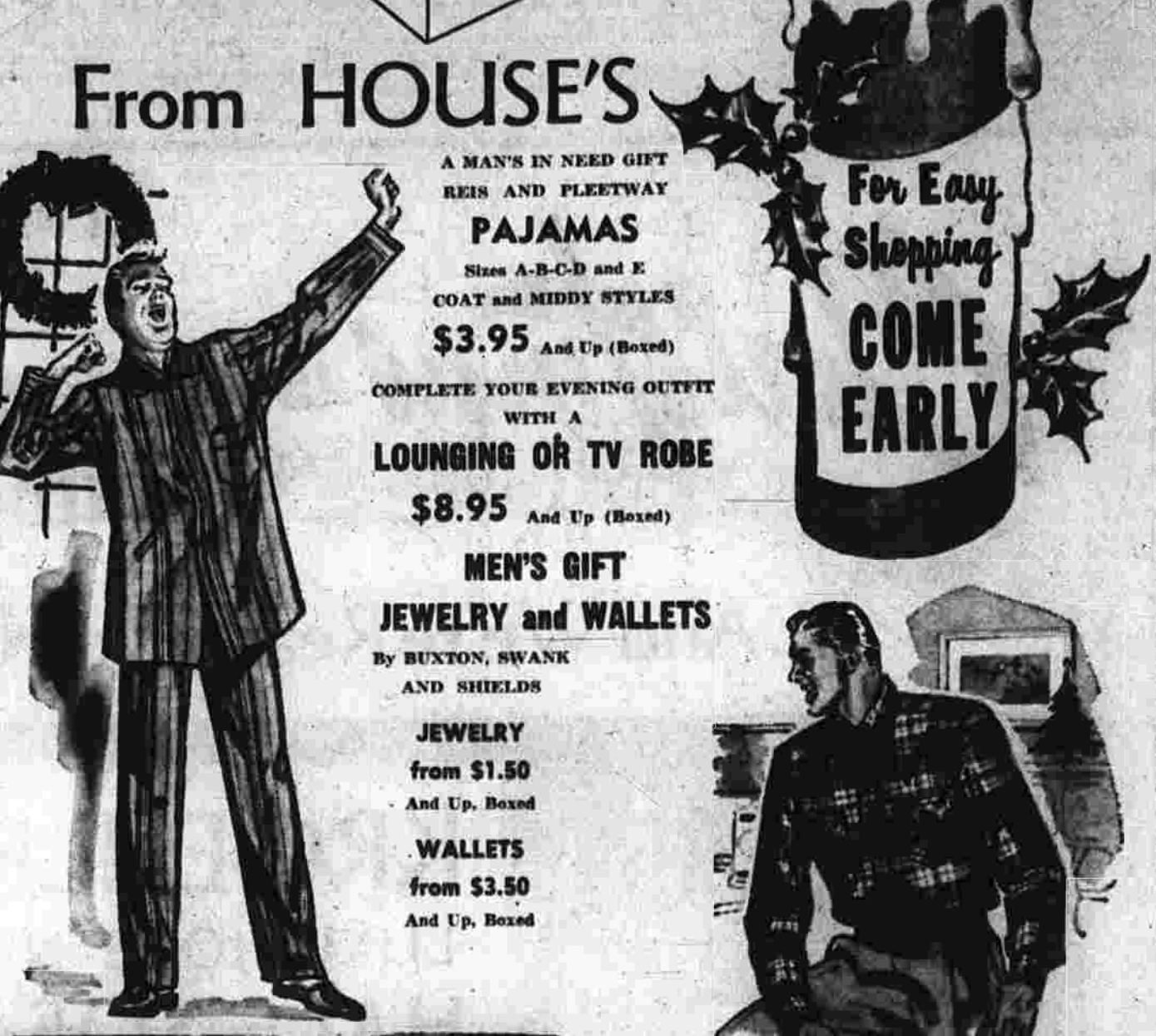
He has a rambling 17-room two-story house on Pine St., bought from the Manchester Trust Co. seven years ago, to care for his family. "I've still got a wife and three girls at home in the city between the house and the sewing for them. I'll be busy."

Uses Only Hand Iron
To the day he left his business, DellaFera would not use a steam iron in his shop, although he has, at various times in his career, operated them. He always uses a hand iron and a heavily padded ironing board for his pressing.

He feels the same way about sewing machines, even though he had one in his shop. If a quality job is called for, he would use a tiny No. 9 needle, with which he can sew a "blind" stitch, a stitch that is invisible when the job is completed. Sewing machines are all right, too, he allows. "But they haven't been able to make one yet that can match sewing by hand."

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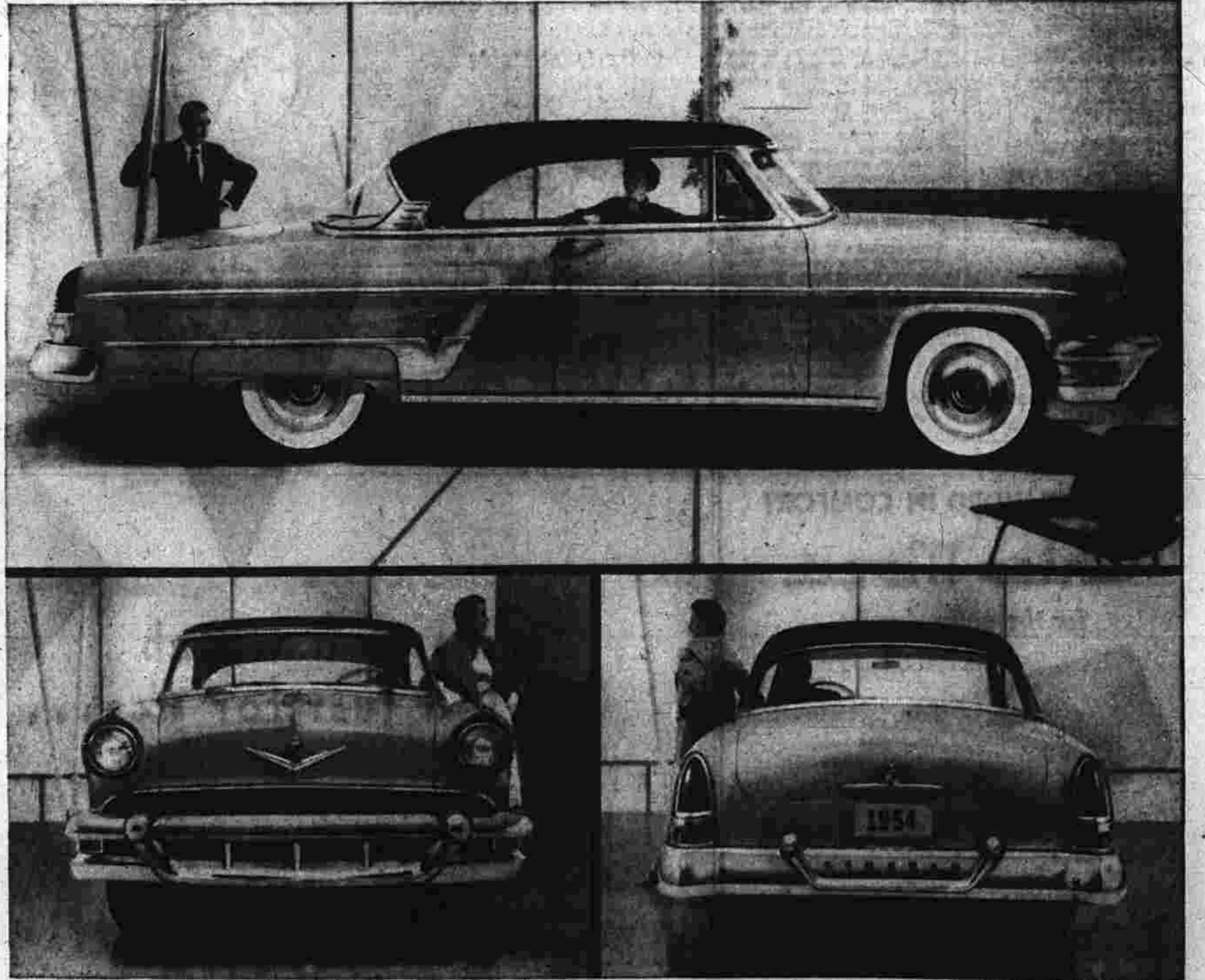

Claims for unemployment benefits in Connecticut, reflecting the advanced work done by Thanksgiving, declined slightly to 15,012 during the week ended Nov. 25, 1938, from 15,222 during the previous week.



The League of Women Voters of Manchester

Members of the State Resource Committee of the Manchester League of Women Voters attended the first in a series of four demonstration workshops sponsored by the Connecticut League of Women Voters yesterday morning at the Community Library in Hamden.

Initial claims, which represent new spells of unemployment, declined to 3,222 as compared to 3,234 during the previous week but were still more than double the 1,590 taken during the same week a year ago.

Claims from women numbered 8,950, or 60 per cent. Partial claims totaled 1,115, including 403 from women. New Haven took 239, Bridgeport 192 and Danbury 90, all others were under 85.

There were 216 unemployed Korean veterans filing claims under a federal law which supplements Connecticut benefits where wages credits are insufficient.

Bridgewater continued to take the most claims with 2,534, followed by New Haven 1,630, Hartford 1,412 and Waterbury 1,182. Between 1,000 and 500 were Danbury, 890, Norwich 828, Stamford 820, Meriden 694, New Britain 628, Torrington 606, Norwalk 571, Danbury 528, Thompsonville 517, Middletown 528, and Ansonia 512.

Under 500 were Bristol 438, New London 428, and Willimantic 336. Layoffs reported included textiles 275 by the textile, garments 200 by three shops, brass 100 for one week and 25 by two foundries, metal boxes 135, radio cabinets 125 for one week, toys 20, office machines 40, clocks 33, electrical appliances 30, small metal parts 30 and upholstery 25.

Layoffs by Area. In the Bridgeport area, an office machinery firm laid off 40, an electrical appliance firm 30 and a brass foundry 25. A Bristol clothing maker laid off 35. A Danbury textile mill laid off 150. A Meriden manufacturer of small metal parts laid off 30. A New Britain garment shop laid off 150.

In the New Haven area, a toy manufacturer laid off 60 and a garment shop 25. A New London calendermaker laid off 125 for one week. A Norwich garment shop laid off 25 for one week. A Norwich textile mill laid off 100. A Thompsonville textile mill laid off 25 and a manufacturer of metal boxes laid off 125. Waterbury upholstery products firm laid off 25. A brass foundry in the Waterbury area laid off 100 for one week.

Columbia Principal Explains Banking Program

Columbia, Dec. 2 (Special)—George Patton, principal of the Horace Porter School, in a statement clarifying the school banking program, has told parents no deposits under 25 cents will be accepted.

Patton said if the children do not bring one dollar each week, the amount brought will be held at the school until a dollar is accumulated. Then this sum will be deposited. There is no maximum, but the principal requests that deposits be brought in whole dollars or quarters of dollars.

How and where he was born is still not known, and may never be known, he said. "The baby was found in the Army compound at Acom City last July 11. He was taken to the Incheon Orphanage run by the Sisters of the Most of the Sea."

Heads of Cult Face Sentences For Conspiracy

Kingman, Ariz., Dec. 2 (AP)—The 27 purported leaders of the Short Creek multiple marriage cult will be sentenced Monday for conspiracy.

They pleaded guilty Monday—just four months after a police force set up martial law in Short Creek, on the Arizona-Utah border, and rounded up the tiny community's men, women and children.

Charges of conspiracy were dropped against 69 other defendants, all but seven of whom are women.

After the raid charges of conspiracy to commit adultery, bigamy, open and notorious cohabitation, contributing to the delinquency of minors, statutory rape and marrying the spouse of another were filed against nearly all the adults.

The state yesterday withdrew the counts of contributing and statutory rape.

The sentences will be pronounced by Judge Robert E. Tuller in Mohave County Superior Court here. The 27 men could be imprisoned for as long as one year or forced to pay a \$1,000 fine on each of the four counts. The sentences could be suspended.

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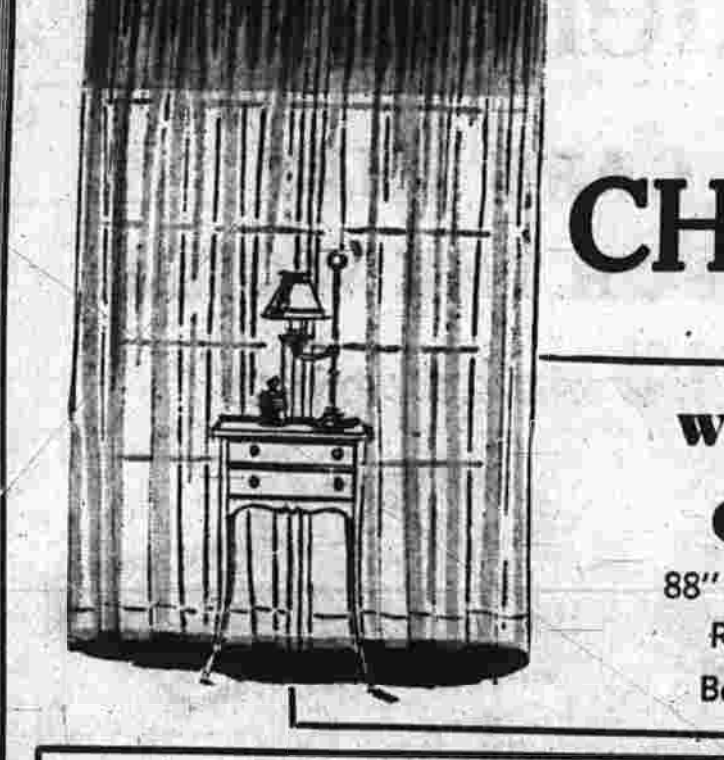

'Copter Commuting Reality In Belgian 'Helibusnetwork'

By RICHARD KLEINER

Brussels, Belgium (NEA)—The world's first intercity helicopter service is a reality, even though it is losing money. The passengers like it. The citizens are enthusiastic, and even Sabena Airlines, which runs it, is happy about the whole thing, although every flight costs them money.

I rode the commuting 'copter between Antwerp and Brussels, a 26-minute flight that costs 120 Belgian francs (12). And that 22 minutes took me from city center to city center, which is the biggest advantage of helicopters.

Sabena has helicopters right smack in the middle of each of the eight cities it serves in Belgium. The Netherlands, Western Germany and France. I landed at the Brussels heliport, for example, on the Allee Verte in the heart of the capital. I had a pleasant seven-minute walk to my hotel after I landed, doing a little window-shopping as I went.

Sabena's "Helibusnetwork" began in September. It's the pet project of Anselme Vermeuse, Belgium's first helicopter pilot and now a Sabena executive. He thinks the heliporter is the ideal means of transportation between the many cities of northern Europe.

Airports Distant "In a circle 200 miles around Brussels," Vermeuse says, "there are only five major airports—Brussels, London, Paris, Amsterdam and Frankfurt. Now, think of it, for example, it is quicker by train from Liege to Paris than by fixed-wing plane, because the airports in each city are far away from the center."

So Vermeuse dreams of a day not too far away, when almost every city in the circle will be connected by a copter route that goes directly into the heart of each city. The first step was the Sabena system.

Brussels is the hub of the Helibusnetwork. Every day, there are two routes to Rotterdam, in Holland, via Antwerp; one right to Liege, Belgium, and Cologne and Bonn, in Germany; and one right to Maastricht, in Holland, via Liege.

Sabena uses two Sikorsky S-62 helicopters for this service. Two more are on order. They only hold eight passengers, which is three frames (six seats) per kilometer—as that on fixed-wing routes. With the maximum of 10 of the passengers take the heliporter to connect with Sabena's international service to European cities or to New York or to Africa. A resident of Liege, for example, might formerly have gone to Paris to connect with the New York-bound flight. Now it's easier for him to go to Brussels. Sabena feels that the flight is so short you keep your coat on, and the copter makes so much noise conversation is impossible.

He eventually they hope heliporters will make a direct port. We flew over the pretty Belgian countryside. We flew over the smokestacks of the industrial city, Boom. We flew over the cobblestone highway with the adjacent lanes for bicycles. And, quickly, we were flying over the palace and royal gardens that mark the outskirts of Brussels.

Landing in Mid-City The route is carefully plotted to follow set paths over open ground. At the moment, all flights are in daylight and they never fly on instruments. As a result, more copter flights than fixed-wing flights are canceled by weather. Visibility must be good or the copter are grounded. There have been no crashes.

Landing is a strange sensation. Because it's like coming down on a busy street. There are buildings on both sides, and you sort of drift down between them, with people staring at you from buses and building windows as you gently settle to earth.

When you touch ground, you are right in the middle of the city you aim for. No long bus ride, no hour in a taxi, no waiting. Just get out and walk down the main street. The helicopter is in business.

readback in any attempt to concentrate initially on world problems in general.

The ambassador reportedly plan to demand attention first to what they consider the prime question facing the free world—French ratification of the European Defense Community (EDC) treaty setting up the proposed six-nation European Army, including German troops.

The source reporting Eisenhower's plan to pledge maintenance of American strength in Europe, emphasized that if involved "combat effectiveness" instead of a definite number of troops.

This gave the impression that new developments, especially in the atomic field, might cause the United States to feel she could help defend Europe against possible Russian aggression with better weapons, more efficient organization and fewer men.

Plans Not Indicated

There was no definite indication of such plans, however, it appeared certain the United States would try to avoid anything that might aggravate France's fears that she may again be the prey of a rearmaged Germany.

The source did not even hint that the United States might withdraw troops from Europe if France did not ratify the European Army pact. Such a tactic was not believed even remotely suggested. There was considerable speculation that Eisenhower might ask Lan-ka's guarantee that France would not pull out of the Indochina war against the Communist in Vietnam.

Laid won a grudging vote of confidence from the French National Assembly last week on his policy of fostering European unity. But Deputies made it clear their approval did not extend to the projected European Army. The EDC treaty is due to come before the assembly for ratification next February.

One French objection to the pact, signed by West Germany, Italy, Belgium, The Netherlands, Luxembourg and France, is that Britain is not associated more closely with it.

Britain reportedly already has told France she cannot bind herself to keep on the continent the 4½ divisions she now has in Germany. However, Churchill is expected to renew previous British offers of cooperation with EDC and consultation with it before any British troops are shifted from the continent.

West In Agreement

On the question of a reply to Russia's recent acceptance of a Western proposal for a Big Four Foreign Ministers' Conference, the three government chiefs were reported already in agreement.

They appeared ready to say in effect: "Let's have them meet in Berlin about the end of January and talk over the state of the world." The United States was said to be eager to have the reply say the West especially would like to discuss the reunification of Germany and the Austrian Independence Treaty but there was no indication of atomic information between the two countries.

The British are said to feel this would benefit both countries and the whole free world. At present such exchange is barred by U. S. law.

British sources here stressed that the conference would range over all outstanding world problems. They expect the three gov-

The AEC, forecasting a deluge of questions about matters long since made public and given worldwide publication, is understood to be taking steps to head off at least some of the inquiries.

It is reported compiling a long list of facts in which there is no security involved now and on which there have been prior announcements. These will be used as a quick-reference handbook for disposing of routine problems posed by other government agencies, including the military.

### Union Boss Works to End Manhattan Newspaper Halt

(Continued from Page One)

Lines were set up at several plants at the midnight strike deadline. In New York, longshoremen by the hundreds started the work stoppage yesterday as the New York-New Jersey Port Authority Commission, organized to rid the docks of racketeering, became fully effective.

Picket lines were set up outside plants by many longshoremen who were refused employment registration cards by the commission because of criminal backgrounds. Many registered longshoremen joined the picketing men in sympathy and others with cards refused to cross the picket lines.

Stoppage Spread Quickly

The stoppage, which started on Hudson River piers in midtown Manhattan, spread quickly to other docks in Manhattan and Brooklyn, and across the river to Jersey City and Hoboken, N. J.

A federal investigation of possible violation of a Taft-Hartley anti-strike injunction was started. The New York Shipping Assn. charged the stoppage violated a Taft-Hartley law injunction issued Oct. 5 which ended a strike on the waterfront involving 60,000 East Coast longshoremen. The federal court restrained any strike activity as 60-day period expiring Dec. 24.

The Shipping Assn., which represents 170 shipping and stevedoring companies, said the walkout has tied up "practically all the tire port." The commission, however, said less than 35 per cent of the piers were affected.

In the New York newspaper strike, the 400 striking photo engravers were to vote today on whether to arbitrate four deadlocked issues. The chief issue in the strike, which started last Saturday, was wages and welfare benefits. The number of annual holidays and the duration of a new contract.

William Mapel, president of the New York Publishers Assn., said if the photo engravers and their strike it would be impossible for afternoon newspapers to appear today. That would mean that the firstpapers New York readers could get would be early editions tonight of tomorrow morning's papers.

The Herald Tribune, the only major paper in the city not struck, suspended publication for a day's night in sympathy with the other dailies. The Herald Tribune was not struck because its photo engraving is done by an outside commercial firm.

The Herald Tribune went through the motions of putting together a 62-page paper for today to keep everything ready to roll when the strike is settled—but operations were stopped short of the press room.

The seven closed papers have a circulation of almost 5½ million. About 22,000 employees are idle.

Strike Issues Outlined

The four deadlocked issues in dispute were outlined by mediators in a statement:

1. Demands for higher wages and an additional employer contribution to the overall union welfare program; The union wants an additional contribution per year for the existing general welfare program. The publishers have agreed to stipulate the sum satisfactory to the union may be earmarked for such purposes out of any money award granted.
2. Work week: The union is asking for a basic 32-hour week of five days. The publishers propose no change in the present 38 1/2-hour basic work week.
3. Holidays: The expired contract called for six a year and the union seeks 10. Consistent with the offer to other unions, the publishers have offered a seventh holiday.
4. Contract duration: Both sides have indicated willingness to have a one-year contract. The union wants it to begin as of last Nov. 1, when the old contract expired. The publishers have offered a year agreement from the date the men return to work.

During negotiations preceding the strike, the union sought a package increase of \$15 a week, including wages, pensions and welfare benefits. The publishers offered a package of \$5.75 a week.

Basic wages of the photo engravers, who make metal plates for the reproduction of pictures and illustrations, have been \$120 a week for day work and \$131 for night work. The publishers have offered for such workers average \$100,000 a year with overtime.

Demand for copies of the city's regional newspapers and for out-of-town papers continued here today, and millions continued to turn more to radio and television to keep up with the news.

Editor Clies Threat

Charles S. Lewis, editor of the New Bedford (Mass.) Standard-Times, said yesterday there was a threat to freedom of the press inherent in this general strike.

Lewis said in New Bedford that he had asked appointment of a committee of the American Society of Newspaper Editors to investigate.

In a telegram to Beal Walters, president of the society, Lewis asked for a committee recommendation of legislation to protect the right to publish. The message said:

"In case of imminent threat from a foreign power such a stoppage of publications tends to New York City could be fatal to the existence of the United States."

Lewis said: "Freedom of the press has never faced a more serious situation than exists today in New York City where by apparent understanding among newspaper editors a strike by photo engravers has resulted in employees who are members of other unions being asked to perform their contractual duties and prevented all major New York City dailies from going to press."

Employees honoring the photo engravers' picket lines are members of mechanical, craft and editorial-business department unions.

### Rotary Hears Story of CAP

Col. Robert Frost, State Commander, Outlines Growth Since Dec. '41

The development of the Civil Air Patrol from the time it was organized, Dec. 1, 1941, six days before Pearl Harbor, to the present day, was traced by Col. Robert Frost, commander of the State CAP, in an interesting talk given to members of the Rotary Club at their meeting last night at the Manchester Country Club.

"During 1941," Col. Frost said, "the U. S. Air Force was practically non-existent and, because of the war, civilians were not allowed to fly private planes. So that air-minded civilians might be of help in case of emergencies in this country, and this was one way that civilians might be able to fly during war, CAP was founded."

Spotted Submarines

The speaker told how the CAP was of great help as spotters of submarines which infested the East Coast during the war, and saved many oil tankers from destruction. Some bases were set up along the coast, run by volunteers and their planes. CAP played a vital part in the early days of the war, until the Coast Guard and the Navy took over.

At the beginning of the war, Col. Frost stated, the CAP was under the jurisdiction of the Office of Civil Defense. Later it was transferred to the War Dept. In 1943, CAP undertook the training of pre-induction cadets for the Air Force.

After the war, it was decided that CAP had outlined its usefulness and would be disbanded, but finally it was allowed to continue under an act of Congress, and is now under the Air Force as an auxiliary.

1950 Men Available

Some of the services rendered by CAP are outlined by Col. Frost, who said it is possible that '53 was the individual who furnished information concerning the Navy's radio proximity fuse to Dr. Allan Nunn May.

Robert Morris, subcommittee counsel, said newsmen that the scientist had been questioned at a closed hearing in New York City on Oct. 28.

The Canadian government agreed last week, in response to a second request from the subcommittee, to permit Gouzenko to be questioned provided he was willing, the interview was held under Canadian auspices, and any information obtained was made public only with the approval of Canadian authorities.

Jenner objected to the last condition and asked Secretary of State Dulles to take the matter up further with the Canadian government. Dulles, however, told Jenner he was unwilling to do this condition he dropped.

In San Francisco, Donald N. Wheeler refused yesterday on constitutional grounds to tell the House "The American Activities Committee of his employment background. When FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover testified before the Senate subcommittee Nov. 27, he said he had written a letter to Truman's military aide, saying the FBI had evidence that a number of persons were engaged in or used for the purpose of obtaining data for the Soviet and that Wheeler was one of these.

After Hoover testified, Wheeler said the charges were false and malicious."

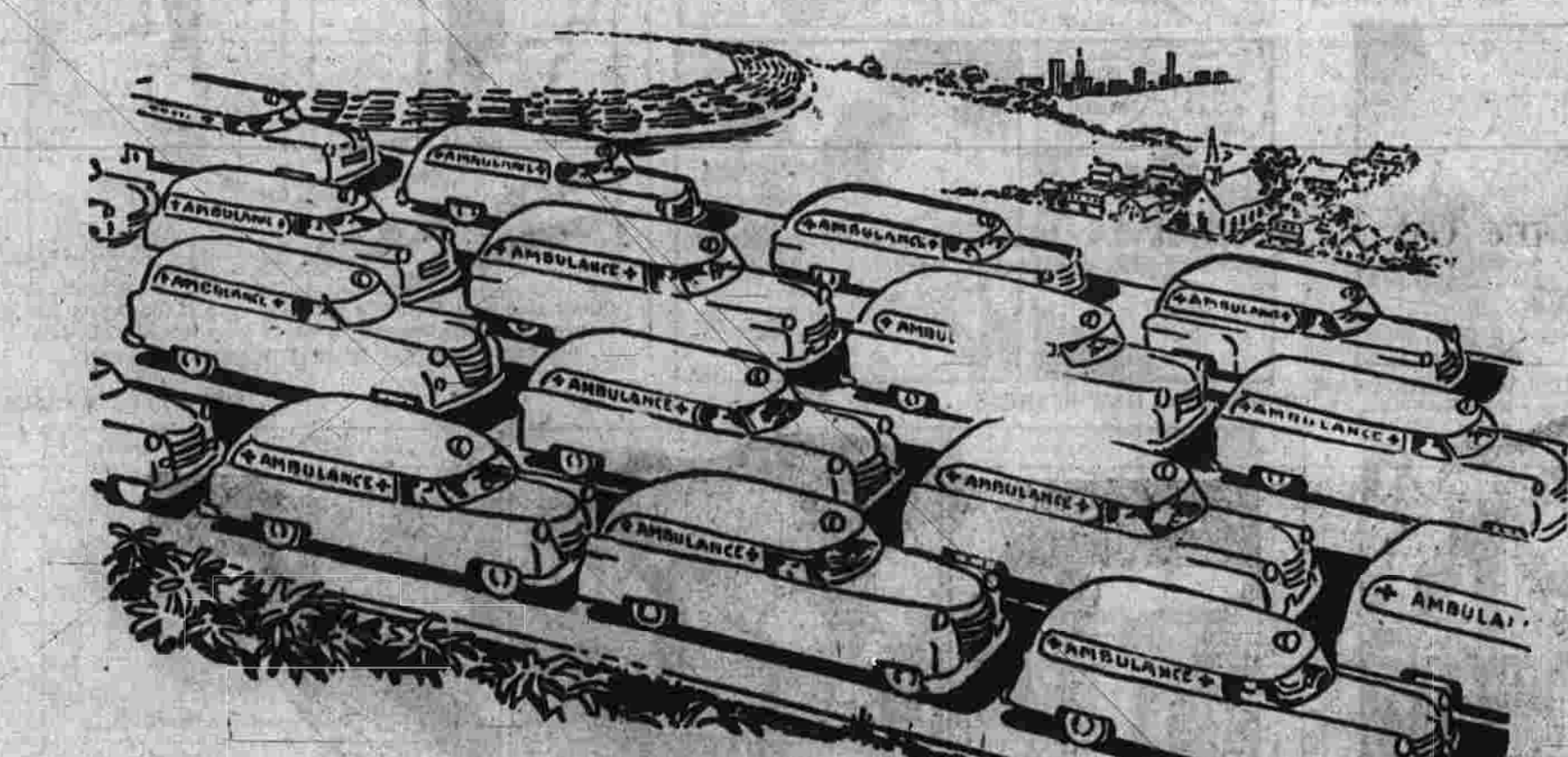
