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Needle, Thread Brought To Mrs. Picken

At the age of five, Mary Brock Picken hitched her wagon to a needle and thread—and it has carried her to heights of fame and fortune.

This bright-eyed, pink-checked lady probably is the world's foremost authority on sewing, dressmaking and all varieties of needlework. The contender's bundle of sewing, more important to the health and peace of mind of the average woman than a medicine cabinet, says she:

"If more women had to do things by hand, as our mothers and grandmothers did, there'd be less business for psychiatrists."

This age of automatic house-keeping is a wonderful thing, but in the opinion of Mrs. Picken, it's likely to leave women with too much time on their hands. And if those hands can't pick up a bit of cotton work on a pair of socks to darn, there's trouble ahead.

Mary was born on a farm near Arcadia, Kan., and before she was old enough to go to school she learned not only sewing, but also spinning and weaving. From her grandmother, who lived on an adjoining farm, she inherited her grandmother's sewing machine.

...miles a day when spinning—back and forth, throwing the yarn over the spinning wheel from the distaff in her hand.

Mary was married before she was 20, widowed before she was 23, and remarried at once upon the death of her first husband. Her first book, the revised edition of the "Beginner's Book," has just been published, containing everything any home seamstress might be likely to want to know, including how to darn, mend and embroider; how to use patterns; how to get professional finishes on dresses and suits; how to make slipcovers, drapes, rugs and bedspreads, children's clothes and aprons.

She taught the economics of fashion from 1931-33 at Columbia University, earlier was fashion and dressmaking editor of "Picture Review" magazine, making regular trips to Europe to report Paris openings.

During World War I and II she did therapy work for Veterans' hospitals, and in between worked in occupational therapy at mental institutions and other hospitals.

Mrs. Picken was one of the founders of the new fashion group, and one of the five original directors of the costume institute, now part of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, in New York. She is on the Board of Managers of the School of American Craftsmen at Rochester Institute of Technology.

West Three To Maintain NATO Unit

Letting the NATO nations have "pertinent information" on how to use the atomic weapons America is building. He did not say the Allies would be told how to build them themselves.

Not did he offer to share U. S. atomic weapons with anyone, but observers pointed out, he said nothing in the meeting of Allied foreign, defense and finance ministers which would suggest the possibility of shipping atomic weapons to Europe, where the United States already has its atomic cannon.

Presenting Sharing Secrecy

The McMahon Atomic Energy law at present bars the sharing of U. S. atomic secrets with foreign powers. Wilson said Eisenhower was prepared to ask Congress to amend the law.

The NATO ministers quickly approved these goals for their 1954 campaign to forge a stronger West European defense and foreign policy organization.

Wilson said Eisenhower has all the power to give NATO close to 5,700 planes by the end of 1954. A high American official had said earlier the United States would contribute at least half the total inventory.

A 2.5 per cent increase in ground forces to give NATO 103,000 men and 1,000 tanks.

A 15 per cent boost in naval craft, for a total of about 3,000 ships by the end of the next year.

Wilson promised NATO Allies the United States would keep up its supply to them of modern weapons and munitions. He called on West European military leaders to hurry on with the job of devising procedures for using the weapons to best advantage.

The Western Big Three assured their NATO partners today they will hold fast to their transatlantic alliance in the proposed Berlin talks with the Soviet Union, according to an official source.

The official said American, British and French foreign ministers sat for almost two hours with their North Atlantic Treaty colleagues in a closed session of world conditions affecting the location of the NATO Council sessions went into their final day.

The dismantling of NATO as well as the dismantling of the project of a closed European Army have been prime Russian conditions for reunification of Germany, the liberation of Austria, and a definite settlement of the German problem in a peace treaty.

The closed talk was arranged as a sort of intermission in the formal NATO Council agenda in order to give the ministers an opportunity for an informal exchange of views.

Hal Boyle Here's How to Work A Cut-Rate Christmas

New York (AP)—What are you doing to cut down Christmas costs? Some people complain, "I no longer can tell the difference between Christmas and bankruptcy."

"They have let this festive season get out of hand. But there is no reason why you can't enjoy a fine Christmas at minimum expense if you show a little ingenuity. You may also have to act like a heel, but everybody else will be over-looked if you show a little humanity."

So here is a heel's guide to a cut-rate Christmas.

You probably still have last year's Christmas cards. So mail them back to the people who sent them to you, and enclose a note saying:

"I received so much pleasure from looking at your Christmas card in 1933 I am unable to deny you the same joy in 1934. May it make the New Year happy for you."

Why people will be talking for days—after getting a present like that—about how thoughtful and sentimental you were to think of a way to keep their Christmas tree from catching pneumonia.

Your wife, of course, can't be overlooked. One way to please her is to pick out a luxurious bathrobe one size smaller than a circumvent, charge it, and bring it home. When she finds it doesn't fit, she will take it back to the store after Christmas. But by then you will be holding so loud about bills she won't have the heart to exchange it for something else. Meanwhile, you did give it to her, didn't you? Almost everybody has two aunts he has to send a Christmas gift to. You can cut this item in half by buying a pair of gloves and mailing one glove in a box to each aunt. Don't worry. They won't blame you.

John R. Allen fails to answer three charges in court, faces arrest.

John R. Allen, local realtor and insurance agent, jumped a \$1,000 bond when he failed to appear in Town Court this morning to face three charges, and a warrant has been issued for his arrest.

Substitute Judge Alvin Leone, of East Hartford, who called the bond forward to future expansion. The company recently purchased a new shop in Berlin.

Aceto and Sylvester, local contractors, want to change property on the west side of Parker Street from Rural Residence Zone to Industrial Zone. The area is north of Mitchell Dr. and runs parallel to Parker St. for a distance of 600 feet. It would be used to establish a landscaped garden center and plantland. A petition carrying the signatures of many property owners and residents will be submitted and that George Dougherty, 17 Dougherty St., again will lead the opposition to the change.

Jarvis has made five previous attempts to change the property for business use. Neither party can claim complete success. In most instances, the commission did change the front portion of the lot in 1950. Jarvis secured title to the property March 20, 1949 from Leo D. Rosenstein and Joseph S. Carter, both of Hartford. There are 27 lots on the plot, which are for carnivals and circuses under non-conforming use. What was reverted to Residence A in Sept. 1950.

On March 20, 1947, Cottage Homes, Inc., another Jarvis holding, was deeded a change from Residence A to B zone. Jarvis had plans to establish a community theater and pharmacy block on the front portion in 1947 and had apartments in rear portion. He asked for a combined change, the front to Business and the rear to Residence C. This was also denied.

Jarvis came back a day short of a year later, Oct. 21, 1949, asking to change the whole thing to Business zone. The plot was not changed.

Then, on May 9, 1950, the commission following a public hearing, changed the front portion, along Center Street to Business Zone A to a depth of 200 feet. When the regulations were subsequently revised that year and business zones more clearly defined, the commission made it Business Zone II.

Oct. 24, 1951, found Jarvis again before the commission, asking to extend the Business Zone II portion to include the whole lot that lies between Dougherty and McKee Streets and has a depth of more than 400 feet. Once again, in the face of major opposition, the board refused to change the zone.

Jarvis has not made use of the property, even the front portion that was changed. When the new regulations were adopted, off-street parking facilities were demanded in business areas.

Three other applications will come before the board tomorrow night also, Dr. Theodore Rosen

who posted the \$1,000 for Allen's appearance, telephoned the court from Hartford to say that Allen was in his office and that he would bring him in.

Later, however, the bondman, Barney Lehrer, said in a telephone conversation with Prosecutor W. David Keith that there had been a "misunderstanding." He is reported to have told Keith that Allen was not in his office but that he knew where he was.

At 11:45 this morning, however, Lehrer told The Herald that he did not know Allen's whereabouts, but was trying to locate him.

Allen is charged with non-support of his wife, obtaining money under false pretenses and fraudulent issue of checks. The third charge had been lodged against Allen in October, before the other two, but it was not disclosed until this morning.

Keith said news of the arrest had not been released and the matter not pressed immediately because Allen had assured him he could prove the bad check charge was a "misunderstanding" which could be explained.

But the proof has not been provided. Keith said today, and Allen was to have been presented on the charge this morning. The check involved was for \$250.

Allen was arrested on Nov. 23, first for non-support on complaint of his wife, and then a few hours later for obtaining money under false pretenses. The latter charge resulted from the complaint of a Bolton couple who said they had bought a lot from Allen, which they claim was represented as being free and clear.

Actually, they say now, it had two mortgages totaling \$1,000. Allen, who has recently been suspended from the Manchester Board of Realtors, a group he once headed, faces the suspension of his real estate license if he is convicted on the false pretenses charge.

Frank Wagner, director of Insurance Commissioners' office, said the statutes would require a 10-year suspension if Allen is convicted of the offense.

She said that she enjoyed the flight, even though the plane was approaching Boston about daylight Monday before they were able to see their surroundings for the first time, the rest of the flight being made in darkness.

She was originally scheduled to make the trip to America by boat, leaving Germany Dec. 3.

When Mrs. St. Louis tried to board the boat, she was informed her papers were in order, but that she had no reservation on the boat. She then decided to fly in order to be with her husband for the Christmas season.

Sgt. St. Louis and his bride first met just after Christmas in December 1950 at Friedberg, Germany. Mrs. St. Louis visited at Hartford, Aug. 15, 1949 and after about 14 weeks basic training at Ft. Dix, went overseas in November as an infantryman. Mrs. St. Louis is the former Katha Frieder of Herford, Germany.

They were married at Herford, July 4, 1953. Sgt. St. Louis who had returned to this country, but went back to Germany in June, arrived there June 29. They were first married by the Burgomaster, or mayor, in a civil ceremony, and later in the Roman Catholic Church.

McLevy Condemns Closed CD Parley

"From my observations," the mayor said "the meeting was an open demonstration that a closed door policy usually backfires."

Seventeen should have been allowed to attend. They are as much interested in the welfare of the nation as any elected officials and certainly could be trusted to withhold any information which ought to remain confidential."

Sikorsky at Ceremony

Among the notables here to honor the memory of the Wrights was Russian-born Igor Sikorsky, who first visited Kitty Hawk at the 25th anniversary celebration, Dec. 17, 1928.

Sikorsky, head of the famous Bridgeport, Conn., helicopter company bearing his name, said he built his first helicopter in 1910 "a very good machine, but it wouldn't fly."

He said he believed the machine he built in 1928 was the first successful helicopter in the Western Hemisphere. He added that he has a 25-passenger helicopter, which the armed services will launch "very soon." The next development in his field, he said, will be a 50-passenger helicopter which because of its carrying capacity, should prove most attractive to the airlines.

A representative of the nation's airplane builders, Dewitt C. Ramsey, president of the Aircraft Industries Assn., said in a luncheon address yesterday that the aviation industry which stems from the Wright experiments has now affected the economic life of every part of the United States.

Ramsey said workers in the aircraft manufacturing industry alone earn \$1 billion dollars a week and spend about \$5 million of it weekly.

"The manufacturing companies themselves allocate 150 million dollars a week for the purchase of materials and parts, for production facilities and services and for taxes," he said.

Ramsey said that to get a realistic picture of the economic chain from the "Kitty Hawk Flyer" of 1903, one must add the millions of dollars spent by:

1. The airlines and their 100,000 employees.
2. An estimated 500,000 additional employees of the manufacturing industry's subcontractors and suppliers.
3. More than a million military personnel connected with aviation activities.
4. The thousands of government and airport employees and airport suppliers, the owners of the 650,000 active civil aircraft, and the nation's \$70,000 certified pilots.

Dean Returns; Korean Parley Hope Still High

(Continued from Page One)

A South Korean prisoner reported from the pro-Communist compound today said, however, that three of the 23 Americans want to be repatriated.

Kim Min Du said most of the 77 North Korean prisoners to be interviewed also would ask to return home. He asserted the Communists deliberately stalled further interviews so they would have no choice.

Kim asked the Indian guards for repatriation and was returned to the U.N. Command compound. He said it was possible other prisoners might also ask to be repatriated.

There appeared to be virtually no chance that the Americans and Britons would agree to attend the interviews before the deadline. And the U.N. Command considered other ways of reaching the prisoners—sending Chinese and Korean broadcast over the compound public address system.

The music would be interpreted with appeals to abandon Communism and return home, a spokesman said.

One officer said "a number of things" are under consideration, including a request to the Indian Command for permission to send explainers right into the compound.

Gen. Thimayya, chairman of the Neutral Nations Repatriation Commission, reiterated Wednesday that Indian troops will free unrepatriated Americans, British, Korean and Chinese prisoners or turn them back to their captors on Jan. 22.

The Indian Command issued an official statement quoting Thimayya as saying: "The Communists agree to allow him to have further custody of prisoners beyond Jan. 22 but would have no alternative but to release them or return them to the former detaining side."

American officials said the U.N. Command never would agree to extend the Indians' custody beyond the date set in the Korean Armistice for freeing all prisoners who have refused repatriation. The Indians are guarding about 22,000 pro-Communist and anti-Communist prisoners in Korea's demilitarized zone.

With the explanations all but finished, it seemed that the only likelihood any of the 23 Americans prisoners would come home was if they turned themselves in to Indian guards at South Korea's Private First Class Kim Min Du did Wednesday morning.

Kim was one of the prisoners in the north camp who had not yet been interviewed when the cease-fire talks broke off last Saturday. All of the 300 South Koreans who were interviewed before Saturday elected to stay with the Communists.

Kim was returned to the U.N. Command Wednesday afternoon.

He said he and George Healy, president of the American Federation of Labor, and Richard W. Elicum, general manager of the Philadelphia Bulletin, would have to confer about data presented at the hearings Saturday and yesterday.

The strike ended Dec. 8 when Local 1, AFL International Photo Engravers Union, and the publishers accepted a federal mediation proposal of a 10% wage offer, with a fact-finding board to study the dispute. The board's decision is not binding on either side.

The Publishers' Association Committee has presented the same proposal to nine other unions.

Korea Vets Take Long Way Home

New York, Dec. 14 (AP)—More than 1,100 American veterans arrived today from the Far East on a trip that will have taken them around the world by the time they get home for Christmas.

The men were part of the passenger list of 2,172 aboard the Navy transport ship, Larry E. Jones, docked at Staten Island.

The ship left from the Far East, carrying troops from Turkey, Greece and Belgium, who had been in the Far East since the war with United Nations forces.

On its 14,000 mile voyage home, the transport touched at Ceylon, went through the Suez Canal and visited Turkey, Greece and Italian ports.

About 1,000 members of families and friends of the returning soldiers crowded onto the pier to greet them. The soldiers, after a short visit, left to Camp Kilmer, N. J., where they will be either charged or given burials by Christmas.

Alabama Relaxes Harsh Poll Taxes

Also, the proposal would apply only to workers who have children under seven years old. The theory is that caring for school-age children is not so much a problem as caring for younger ones.

The plan would permit workers meeting these qualifications to deduct from their incomes, for tax purposes, up to \$500 annually actual expenses for child care. Some congressmen have proposed a \$500 limit on the deduction while others have urged allowances to cover all expenses of child care for working mothers. Advocates of tax relief in this field argue that in many cases the expense of baby-sitters or other child care is necessary to employ a mother by the wages earned, and should be deducted on the same basis as business expenses are deducted.

The staff of the Senate Finance Committee on Internal Revenue, headed by Colin P. Stans, Treasury official and others have been putting in long drafting the sweeping tax revision proposals named by point. The draft still is subject to review by top officials, and to rejection or change by Congress.

Chairman Daniel A. Reed (R-NY) of the tax-writing House Ways and Means Committee has pledged the revision program will be his first order of business when Congress reconvenes three weeks from today.

The child-care proposal apparently would involve less than 20 million dollars in annual revenue. Overall, however, if original plans are followed, the tax revision program would mean an annual loss of about 1½ billion dollars when it reaches full effect.

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Spinsters' Lot A Happy One— It Says Here

A pretty interesting commentary on American spinsters has surfaced recently, and at the risk of sounding positively subversive, I'd like to point it out subtly.

In a recent copy of a magazine called "Lifetime Living," there was printed unobtrusively the results of a survey made among about 1,200 women telephone operators. The object of the survey was, I gathered, to find out a little something about the health of women workers.

Their main finding didn't strike me as particularly new or startling; about two-thirds of all the women in the group were married.

In recent years, we've all been made increasingly aware that there really is such a thing as being accident-prone and that certain people actually seem to attract disaster, even and physical mishaps because of a certain "alchemy" which involves bad thinking or unconscious drives toward self-destruction.

It seemed, therefore, quite understandable that the surveyors among the telephone operators found that the group of women with the least share of physical distress were the most harassed and worried women of the lot: the widows and divorcees with small children to care for.

The startling finding to me was this: the survey people found that the women with the best health were the telephone operators who were single, without family responsibilities, who had no desire to marry and who were content with their jobs and their station in life.

This was a pretty limited survey and perhaps can be attacked as a basis for broad generalities because it was all on one level and represented only one group and one income bracket.

The fact remains, however, that it is the first comforting word I've come across in years.

Statistically, it has been shown repeatedly by the census that a spinster is inevitable in a country where there are more potential than men and where monogamy is a federal law. But the untried female sweater, by choice or necessity, have been attached on a lot of fronts as deans who by all the rules should take nervous stock of themselves.

And now comes along this friendly little poll of telephone operators which finds that women who aren't gnawed by ambition and take pleasure in their work can at least enjoy good health even though unblest by spouse or child.

Of course, the little survey really doesn't prove that to be healthy one should be single. It just goes to show that women who are financially responsible for the support and upbringing of small children have more worries and pressures than women responsible to themselves alone.

The piece I read made no mention of the health of happily married women with children.

But anyway, it's nice to know if some women must be spinsters, they can be healthy and happy as telephone operators.

A Thought for Today

Saint Francis of Assisi has much to teach us about peace of soul. We will be invited to discuss him with the conclusion that his way is not practicable for us under conditions of modern urbanism and industrialism. Consider the reasons why he is significant for us.

For sheer joy you can scarcely match his experience. He enjoyed God and he enjoyed people. He lived on this earth only forty-four years, from 1182 to 1226, but from the moment of his conversion to the drawing of his last breath, his words and his deeds were a continuing stream of thanksgiving.

Francis loved people, all kinds of people. He loved people with self-giving concern for them and radiant satisfaction at being with them. His tender care of lepers fills

people. Sharing is really more satisfying than grasping. Non-attachment to things brings a glorious release to the human spirit. Meanness is to be despised above benignity. Self-commitment is rather than self-assertion is the pathway to peace of soul.
