Oct. 17, a percentage of only 24 in eight days of interviews the Communists have talked to 2,631 prisoners and have won back 104 or 3.9 per cent.

PW Campground Details

Compound B3 from which the prisoners were drawn Monday, appeared unusually quiet. The prisoners agreed readily to permit interviews with just half each day—something no other compound has done. The second 250 prisoners will go before Red explainers Tuesday. Communist refusal to interview entire 500-man compounds in a single day precipitated the long suspension of explanations.

A few prisoners cursed and spat into the tents with the mind obviously made up, but others appeared to be convinced during long and quiet interviews.

Gen. Hill told newsmen in Seoul he is interested only in being certain that the American prisoners have freedom to choose their future.

"The thing that we have stood for always has been freedom of choice," he said.

Hill added that he flew to Korea from his Tokyo headquarters primarily to discuss plans for handling about 25,000 anti-Communist Chinese and Koreans scheduled for release from Indian custody Jan. 22 under terms of the armistice.

The Communists have insisted that the prisoners be kept in neutral custody until a peace conference decides their fate, but Hill said they will be eligible for freedom "this minute" after midnight on Jan. 22.

Boost for Point Four

The Presidential advisory board which was supposed to call the President and Mr. Eisenhower want to about the program in the Eisenhower administration doesn't like to call Point Four has reported, and the gist of its report is that whatever the Eisenhower administration wishes to label the program originated as the fourth point in a Truman address before Congress in 1949. It ought to keep it a separate program, maintaining its own individual character and purpose.

Lumping the Point Four program with military or economic assistance projects abroad would amount to a "major disaster," the advisory board reports.

Recognizing what had seemed administration intent with regard to Point Four, the board said "there is danger that technical cooperation will be expediently made to lump together with military or economic aid programs of an entirely different character and aim."

"Whether done in order to obtain necessary funds from Congress, for administrative expedience or for other reasons, such a step would have the most serious consequences," the board observes. It would, says the board, "firm the propaganda of the enemies of America abroad."

"In many countries it would mobilize popular support against technical cooperation. At home, as has been clearly indicated, it would cost the program popular support."

The board recommended that the technical cooperation program be submitted to Congress as a separate, identifiable part of the total United States foreign aid program, even though it may be administered jointly with other types of aid.

It also recommended that any future legislation for foreign aid authorization should "contain specific provisions for a long-range program, clearly indicating its relatively low cost, its people-to-people character and its distinction from any form of emergency or large-scale economic or military aid."

It is to be hoped that this report, from the people whom the Eisenhower administration selected to make it, will resolve the administration's intent clearly and wholeheartedly toward a real and growing identity for the Point Four program, whatever the administration wishes to call it.

Whoever may have originated it, the Point Four program has been one of the great proposals for American foreign policy in this post-war era. It has been altogether too much of an orphan under two administrations, but has nevertheless managed to achieve symbolic wonders in the operations which have been permitted it.

The very same principle which is involved in Point Four has been honored by President Eisenhower himself, in his own great atomic pool proposal. But, in addition to that, one super-proposal, we can well afford to float thousands of small Point Four projects all over the world, and we should. No dollar spent abroad does us more good than a Point Four dollar, for it is one dollar which is neither exactly nor self-interest, but enlightened mutual interest.

Here He Comes

Today marks the coming of winter, Ha! Ha!

There he comes, blowing his way around the corner of the year on a soft southern breeze. Under his remarkable touch, the last thin island of ice dissolves and back into the pond.

The news of his coming has already stimulated the thermometer. They are racing up to greet him. The degree of warmth which his welcome is a little shocking. No thermometer should ever reveal its emotions to that extent.

Around the head of winter, as he comes, there is a swirl of approaching rain. There is nothing more typical of the coming of winter these years, than a soft rain, transported up from Florida for all those who have to spend the Christmas season at home.

About the green lawns, there are welcoming dandelions, little spots of Florida sun for the Florida rain to fall on.

The robins and the bluebirds chatter about the old friend who is coming back today.

Everything stands in warm and cheery welcome.

Well, not everything.

There are a few disgruntled characters.

Down at Rutgers University, in New Jersey, there is a wistful group of 30 research scientists. For the past six years, they have been commissioned to undertake a most important piece of engineering research. It is their task to analyze 30 different types of New Jersey soil, all normally being used for highway foundations, and to determine which of these soils stand up best under various weather conditions.

One of the conditions they have to investigate is that of frost, honest cold, and, to be ready for such tests, they have had their thermometers buried in the various soils for six years now. And for six years they have been waiting patiently—hoping that a few steady days of zero temperatures would give them some readings that might be significant.

Other researchers are disappointed and disgruntled, too.

Manchester is full of young researchers who have never had a real chance to test new states on actual ice. New England is full of people anxious to conduct certain experiments involving snow and sleet. There is a long list of merchants who would like to conduct certain experiments involving a supposed relationship between the temperature and the movement of certain types of merchandise.

Alternate Routes for Proposed Expressway Through Town

ALTERNATE ROUTES RELOCATION OF U.S. 6 MANCHESTER-CONNECTICUT

One of the two routes shown in the map above will be the path of an expressway through Manchester when the General Assembly provides funds for its construction. Designed primarily to handle semi-local traffic—auto travel which begins or ends in Manchester—the expressway will run from some point on the Wilbur Cross Highway through town to the clover leaf at Bolton Notch and will constitute a relocation of Route 6.

Although both routes are still under consideration by the State Highway Dept., State Highway Commissioner G. Albert Hill has said he strongly favors the southernmost route shown here. The other, he said, would be less expensive, but would not serve the community so well.

The first announcement of plans to construct an expressway came at a Dec. 4 meeting of the Men's Club of Center Congregational Church when Hill described seven different routes which have been under department consideration from time to time. The other five have since been eliminated for one reason or another.

The trend of local development played a part in determining acceptable paths for the expressway. One of the routes under consideration, for instance, would have passed through the site of the new high school.

The State Highway Dept. is continuing studies to determine which of the routes to select. When it has decided upon one, it will settle on the connecting arteries. The map above shows alternative connections at either end of the northern route and at the west end of the southern route.

The route preferred by Hill would run south of Hartford Road going just north of Overland Street and the end of Server Street. It would cross Bridge Street just north of Wetherell Street. From there it would cross open land south of Hop Brook and cross Prospect Street at Farm Drive. The route would cross Main Street near Mt. Nebo Place and continue across Gardner Street about midway between Highland Street and Spring Street. It would cross Glen Road and Wyllys Street just south of Highland Street. Continuing across Potter Street, it would run west of Howard Reservoir, across Finley Street and Bolton Center Road to the Notch.

At various times local planners have considered several methods of speeding the flow of traffic from the area tributary to Wetherell Street onto Hartford Road. The construction of the expressway in that region would make local moves unnecessary, presumably. Two of the moves discussed have been the widening of Bridge Street and the extension of Server Street to Hartford Road.

The expressway construction might also affect proposed changing of the intersection angle at Hartford Road and McKee Street.

In explaining that the expressway would serve chiefly semi-local traffic, Hill pointed out that study of traffic moving over the western boundary of Manchester indicated that 96 per cent of the traffic had its point of origin or destination in Manchester, 25 per cent starts or ends in the Bolton Notch area. Only 17 per cent is through traffic.

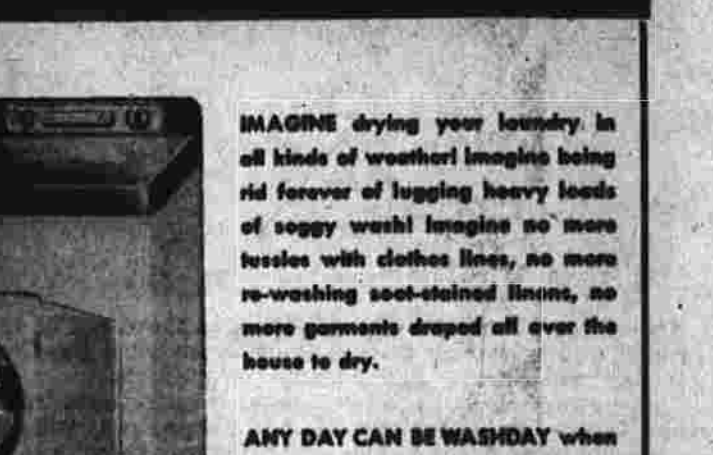
