Atom Talks Plan Vague About Date

Washington, Jan. 7 (AP)—The United States and Russia were agreed today on starting preliminary atom-for-peace talks in Washington, but the important question of timing was still up in the air.

The Soviets announced the agreement last night in Moscow and the State Department quickly followed.

The State Department, without an hour, announced Secretary Dulles would "proceed at an early date to have the general negotiations." That was another good omen for full scale negotiations. No date was mentioned.

This is short for Dulles, who is expected to leave two weeks from today for Berlin and the Foreign Ministers Conference there Jan. 25 among the United States, Russia, Britain and France.

Dulles has been pressing for early negotiations ever since President Eisenhower proposed, in his Dec. 8 address to the United States, that the world unite to strip atomic weapons from the hands of atomic materials and know-how.

Dulles has said he planned to discuss the idea with Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov at the four-nation summit conference in Moscow, to be held in Paris, Jan. 25.

But when the meeting was postponed to Jan. 25, he instructed Charles E. Bohlen, U. S. Ambassador at Moscow, to take it up with Molotov.

A-Weapon Use Guides Defense

Washington, Jan. 7 (AP)—President Eisenhower called for voting rights for 18-year-olds and held out hope for future tax cuts in laying before Congress today a massive legislative program embracing revision of farm, labor, social security, housing and tax laws.

Announcing he intends a new five billion dollar cut in government costs, the President said a more economical defense program will be geared to the use of atomic weapons "if they are needed to preserve our freedom."

Wants to Share Knowledge: On the broad scope of the program, Eisenhower proposed that citizenship be stripped from anyone convicted of the use of conspiracy to advocate the violent overthrow of the government.

For De Gasperi's election law was not really a defensible thing, and represented a scheme to grab more parliamentary power than the people of Italy might vote to him. And it is possible, too, that this law had been used that fact would have created as much trouble and strife in Italy as exists now.  
 But, regardless of the existence of such a blot on De Gasperi's position, it seems clear that he did win the election on the basis of the votes cast, and that he lost it on the basis of actual events, including his own concession of defeat. And nothing, apparently, can be done about it. The sovereign will of the Italian people, as expressed at the polls, has been negated. The rightful winner of the actual election, but Italian officials, doesn't even dare proceed with the recount and finish it up. There is no chance of rolling back events, so that what is right and honest can be set up in place of what was wrong and inaccurate. Perhaps this all means that there should really be no political crisis in Italy. Yet, the crisis exists, and must be faced, and the miscarriage of the democratic process should be so solidly responsible for it is frozen into the record of Italian events and cannot be remedied.

**Security For Everybody?**  
 East and West are reported ready to enter the Berlin negotiations with propositions which, on the surface, would appear to be far apart as ever.  
 The Russians are expected to submit a plan for the unification of Germany on condition that the European Defense Community project for rearming Germany be abandoned, and Germany be placed in the role of a neutral.  
 The West is expected to offer "security plans" for all Europe, including Russia, in which the European Defense Community will be pleasantly presented as a force against Russia, but as an assurance to Russia.  
 The thing which divides the two expected propositions is that we favor the rearmament of Germany within the European Defense Community, while Russia demands that the EDC project be dropped.  
 But this division could be made somewhat less real than it seems. In addition to the contrary, such as that of Chancellor Adenauer, which proposed that Russia should regard the EDC as a guarantee of limitation on German armaments, and therefore as an assurance to Russia rather than a threat to Russia, there are other things which might be done to strengthen such a contention.  
 The projected size and nature of the EDC would already seem a reasonable indication that its purposes could not be anything but defensive purposes. It has never been projected as a force which could go forward and conquer anything. But one thing that seems rather automatically scheduled to soften Russian fears of it is the eventual American program for a reduction in the number of American troops placed in Europe. It is also being suggested that the West can retain its EDC program at the same time as it can retain full effectiveness by postponing any entry by Germany for a stated period of a year or more, since there is no assurance that France will ratify the project in its present form anyway, there might be actual gain for the project, and thin loss, in tailoring it so that it is less objectionable to both France and Russia.  
 The main point is that EDC may be preserved as a formal institution, but that its meaning and significance may become something quite different from that it had when it was first launched. In fact, some observers have been declaring for some time that EDC was dead, in its original meaning, and could only come into being as something quite different.  
 It is in this potential transformation of the EDC and its proposed rearmament of Germany into something more of the organization of the project would quite recognize that the long-shot possibility for some significant agreement at the Berlin conference exists. The diplomats gathered there may not choose to put their tongues in their cheeks and drop their mutual way toward such agreement, but if the will to do so should happen to be present, the little fiction of light offers are ready at hand, and EDC can miraculously become everybody's security and nobody's enemy.

 The Board of Education stands to gain the use of about 15 acres of land adjacent to the Highland Park School, on Foster Street, if a proposal made by E. J. Holl, developer of Rockledge, and approved tentatively by the Town Planning Commission and some town Directors last night became a reality.
