### Hal Boyle Bronze Bust Out-Acts Budding TV Thespian

New York, (AP)—Have you been invited to be a television actor? Not yet? Well, don't give up hope. In video everybody is getting into the act. If they get around to you, they'll get around to you.

I made my first professional TV debut recently and it didn't immediately become a "bright living legend in the theater." It was my fault. They switched roles on me. I was moved out by a bronze bust of Hamlet.

The play was "King Richard III," written by William Shakespeare, or, as we in that enchanted world behind the footlights prefer to call him, "The Bard." It starred Maurice Evans and Sarah Churchill and was presented over the NBC network on the Hallmark Hall of Fame program at a cost of \$170,000—more "cash" than Shakespeare saw in his whole lifetime.

When I was first asked to join the cast, I was careful to inquire what part I would play.

"You play the corpse of King Richard in the final scene," said the agent. "You just lie there in a coffin with a mask over your face. It's by far easier than they carry you off. It's a tremendous job."

It did sound good. And playing a corpse with a mask over your face would bring out the "Bard" more in any actor.

But when I went to the rehearsal I found the plans had been changed.

"What Evans played Hamlet on television last year, the corpse of King Richard in the final scene of the play," a director said.

I promised on my honor not to breathe for five minutes before the last scene until five minutes after it was over, but the director said:

"We can't take a chance. We've given the corpse role to a bronze bust of Maurice Evans. The bust has been made up to look like King Richard, and we feel pretty sure it won't flutter his eyes."

When I asked where that "let me be" was, he said:

"Most actors start their careers as stage hands. We'll start you as an onstage silence. You'll be a level at the court. You don't say anything. You just stand there and look as sober as an old English lord."

I shared my debut with three other newcomers to the theater. Two Bronze busts named Nicholas and Lisa (a brother and sister act) and a horse named Southern Comfort.

Lisa was so nervous she had a stomach upset just before her entrance. But there she stood, looking up like the game little trouper she is.

"Good luck, kids," I whispered. They trotted out and came back a few minutes later, wearing their tails like veterans, actors.

Southern Comfort also did about as fine a job of acting as any horse can remember offhand, but when his owner led him back he said:

"Look at that horse's knees. He's still shaking like a leaf."

Just before the final death scene I whispered to an actor, "Will it be all right if I wave goodbye to the king's corpse when they carry me off? I'll make the scene look less somber."

"If you even so much as twitch your nose," he blazed back, "the director will cut your head out and put you in that coffin for good."

As I stood as still as a waiter because bust outfits. I must say that, bust, played the role of a corpse to the hilt. It couldn't have been much more dead-like.

Later Evans threw a champagne party for the cast. As Southern Comfort didn't care for champagne, and Nicholas and Lisa were too young for it, I topped their share and went home feeling better—feeling, in fact, more like an English lord than ever.

**A Dictatorship Is Born**  
 In towns, as in nations, in America, as elsewhere, it arises, from time to time, the form and substance of a dictatorship. It has happened before, and it will happen again. When it happens the question is how long it will last, how much damage it will do, how the community subject to it will conduct itself, and how it will end. It always does end, by one means or another—by its own excesses and rebellions, by explosion within itself, or by revolt against it. A dictatorship can be identified by certain characteristics. It has techniques which are standard. It relies upon weapons which are always the same. In all respects, the dictatorship which was born in Manchester last night complies with the traditional standards and techniques. The most prominent mark of the dictatorship is the answer. By its action last night, the Board of Directors directed the smear against all those Manchester people who, in any capacity, have had any contact with the Manchester school building program to date. The next most prominent mark of the dictatorship is its use of the big lie. The big lie, in this instance, is that Manchester's school building program has been "extraneous." The fact that the counterparts in the town of West Hartford are urging authorities in that town to take Manchester for a model, and build schools as cheaply as we do, indicates the magnitude of the lie. A dictatorship makes its own laws. If there are laws which hamper its design, it reinterprets them, ignores them, or simply defies them. Last night, the Bowers bloc flew directly into the warnings of the town council, and, having been told that a motion was legally unenforceable, passed the motion nonetheless. A dictatorship poses as the champion of the masses. "The people" whose rights it usurps, it creates an image of a proletariat for which it alone is the "natural" representative. It excludes from the ranks of the "people" all who have previously been of any public service, or who have accepted any public responsibility, or who happen to disagree with the actions of the dictatorship itself. All others are dismissed. All others are the tools of selfish interests. All others are enemies of the "people." But if the "people" themselves "err" do not, some slight claim on the power and influence which is supposedly theirs, they find that it has become the sole property of the dictatorship, and that they, too, are its captives. **Ike Predicts End to Dip in Business**

Washington, Jan. 26 (AP)—President Eisenhower today predicted the nation "markedly prosperous" recovery this year from a "brief and self-correcting" business dip and pledged to use the government's vast resources to combat a depression if one should develop.

He proclaimed readiness "when necessary" to avert a depression—to cut taxes, liberalize credit and launch large-scale public works even at the cost of new deficit financing.

Eisenhower gave forceful notice, in his economic report to Congress, that it should take "bold steps" to avert a depression.
