Pope Pius Condition Is Growing Weaker

Vatican City, Feb. 5 (AP)—The condition of Pope Pius XII was described as continuing to weaken today in the first official Vatican bulletin issued regarding the Pontiff's health by his private physician. The bulletin, read by Prof. Riccardo Galeazzi-Lisi, indicated it is hoped as soon as possible to repeat a similar examination to determine the condition both of the Pope's gastric area as well as of other organs in that area.

Has Light Fever The bulletin said that "since Feb. 25, the Holy Father has shown, together with a light fever, symptoms of gastritis, preceded by insistent hiccup. Objective clinical examination has excluded all other pathological reactions and laboratory examinations revealed normal (excluding hyperaemia and cardiac lesions)." It added: "Hyperaemia is an abnormal, high concentration of non-protein nitrogen, especially urea, in the blood. The bulletin said the 77-year-old Pope has continued to weaken by a brief announcement that the general state, weakened by excessive, prolonged labor, both mental and physical, has suffered a further weakening because of the fatiguing gastric disturbance and the difficulty of feeding." The bulletin underlined the anxiety felt for the Pope's condition. It was believed to be the first one ever issued by his personal physician.

**The Guns That Walk**  
 Liberty, democracy, and a chance at progress—these, as well as guns and perhaps more guns, are some of the things that are being fought for in many instances, are the basic weapons against Communism. The trouble is, some people engaged in fighting Communism find it much easier to reach for a gun than it is to reach for ideological weapons. And when they do reach for guns only, what frequently happens is this: The guns walk over to the Communist side. This was what happened in China. No matter how many guns we supplied to Chiang Kai-shek, they walked over to the Communists because the Chinese people themselves had not confidence in their ability to be free and enjoy democracy and make progress under the Chiang leadership. Perhaps they made a bad choice; people sometimes do when confronted with two evils. Now there has been a touch of it in Indo-China, where it has just been disclosed that the Vietnamese troops in 28 outposts have taken themselves over to the Communist side. The one thing that might make the people of Indo-China absolute-ly certain that they want nothing to do with Communism would be the possession of their own free- dom. American diplomacy has known this all along. It has been known since the people of Indo-China that they are defending their own country, not a French colony. And the French, under pressure from us, have made many concessions so that, today, they do stand rather firmly committed to some sort of eventual independence for Indo-China. But the people of that country cannot yet put their dependence on promises, the ac- tual strength of which they are still hangs heavy over the country. One may still be able to do this, but the people of Indo-China are becoming restive, as they once were in China itself.

**Fulbright's Vote**  
 We read somewhere not long ago that Senator Fulbright, the Arkansas Democrat, was one member of the Senate who gave no ground to Senator McCarthy, and that sentiment of his seems to be confirmed. For when the Senate on Tuesday voted Senator McCarthy's committee a new appropriation of \$214,000, there was a lot of controversy and oratorical opposition, as had been predicted, but only one final vote opposing the appropriation, as against 65 votes for it. The lone vote was that of Senator Fulbright. The risk he dared run, that no other Senator dared run, was that of being attacked for being against the usual stand of the Senate center and the Seal.
