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Idle Pay Claims Jump 44 in Week

Claims for unemployment benefits rose to 527 in Manchester, as jobs claims increased throughout the state to 33,461 during the week ended Saturday, according to the State Labor Dept. weekly report.

In Manchester, the number of claims was up 44 over the preceding week. Statewide, the increase was about 2,500. One reason for the statewide rise is a one-week shortage of Bridgeport steel mill which affected about 1,000 workers.

The report shows that initial claims, which indicate new spells of unemployment, went up to 123, 34 more than during the preceding week. Also, 14 of the Manchester claims were attributed to non-agricultural workers.

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EDC Plan Is Skipped By Terms

Berlin, Feb. 10 (AP)—Soviet Russia proposed today a non-aggression pact among all the nations of Europe, including both Communist East Germany and the Bonn republic. It would annul the North Atlantic Alliance.

Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov said the pact would annul the North Atlantic Alliance.

The proposed 50-year general security treaty would bind all the nations of Europe to "peace" East and West Germany were specifically named as beneficiaries of the pact.

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Weinberg Confesses Bodenheim Murder

newspaper accounts saying 125 or more technicians had been sent. Byrd said the next steps would be requests by the French for U. S. pilots and ground forces in Indochina, adding he would oppose that and Secretary of Defense Wilson told a news conference yesterday the fighting is going satisfactorily, and that he sees no need to step up American aid.

George D. C. (D-C) of the Foreign Relations Committee said "doubts it was a wise move" in the resolution. He agreed with Stennis that if the U. S. should send fighting forces into Indochina, the Chinese probably would send in forces as it did in Korea.

Wilson said yesterday that unless the Red Chinese intervene on a mass scale, or some similar war factor enters the picture, he thinks chances are good for a military victory in the 8-year war the French and native forces are having.

Republican Leader Knowland (Calif.) told the Senate Monday night the Eisenhower administration had no desire or intention of sending combat forces into Indochina. He did so after Sen. Mansfield (D-Mont.) had questioned whether there was such a plan.

"I am sure the President made it very clear that in the field of foreign affairs and in the field of defense, he believes that both parties should be fully consulted in advance and not merely notified after an event has occurred," Knowland said.

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Rockville-Vernon

Town's Grand List Jumps \$1,837,300 over Last Year

Rockville, Feb. 10 (Special)—The grand list for the town of Vernon as of Oct. 1, 1953 shows an increase of \$1,837,300 over the list compiled Oct. 1, 1952. The figures released today by the Board of Assessors show that the grand list total in the assessors' recapitulation is \$23,812,919 with an assessment of \$11,172,235.

A study of the recapitulation does not reveal any such stable increase as was noticeable in the 1952 figures. The 1952 total showed an increase of over \$4,000,000, due largely to a revaluation made by professional appraisers.

The 2,400 dwellings listed in the 1952 survey were valued at more than four and a half million above the 1951 figures. The 2,388 dwellings in the 1953 survey showed an increase of some 373 homes over the previous year and of only \$678,000.

Motor vehicles showed an increase of 324, the 1953 valuation of over half a million. Poultry valuation has also increased by 44,444, while cattle fell off by some 42,424.
