French Break Out From Red Pincers

Hanoi, Indochina, Feb. 16 (AP)—French Union forces broke out of their northwest Indochinese fortress of Dien Bien Phu today to drive encircling Vietminh troops from two hill positions. The French claimed they inflicted "heavy losses" on the Communist-led enemy and admitted "appreciable losses" on their side.

By their attack the French seemed to indicate they are going to carry the battle to the 36,000 rebels who have been threatening, but never yet have attempted, an all-out assault on the heavily fortified French post just north of the Laotian border.

Text of the letter, signed by Lt. Gen. Rene Cogny, French commander in northern Indochina, apparently tried to show that the Vietminh to attack the fortress, sent out 4,000 to 5,000 men against the rebels strongly entrenched in the hills surrounding the French position.
