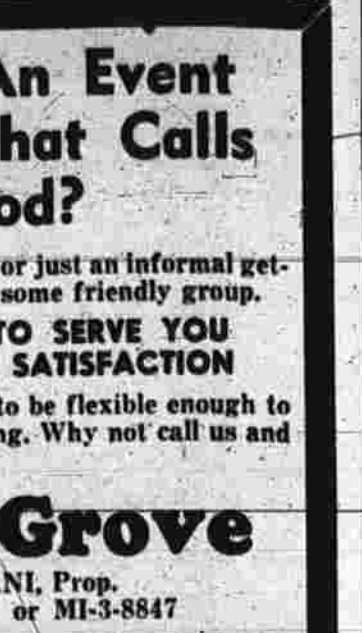

been pointed toward a specific date when the country would be ready to meet any large-scale aggression. He said he didn't believe this sort of policy was effective. "What he is asking everybody to remember, the President said, is that the President is picking up a burden I may have to carry indefinitely.

"The country doesn't have to get hysterical with fear about the military danger here," he said.

The subject of Flanders' speech was brought up when a reporter asked Eisenhower whether he sympathized with what Flanders had to say.

The Vermont lawmaker contended in a Senate speech yesterday that McCarthy's tactics in pursuing internal subversion were diverting the country's attention from great dangers from without.

Flanders said too that McCarthy "by intention or through ignorance" was "doing his best to obstruct" the Republican party.

The President laughed heartily at the question and said he had been certain he was going to get a query about Flanders' speech, as he had thought about it on the way to the news conference.

The Republican party, Eisenhower commented, now is the party of responsibility and of the people.

He added that when Flanders pointed to the danger of internal subversion, it is a situation which magnify the danger of personal aggrandizement — those things which endanger the program of the administration.

Eisenhower said also that when a situation develops where you are going three or four directions at one time, well, then, it is just fourth.

A reporter asked whether the President didn't feel that the positive aspects of the administration program ought to be emphasized, instead of having so much publicity about investigations.

Eisenhower replied that he doesn't believe negative things provide the happiness of the people. He said the spiritual, cultural and economic welfare of the people should be promoted.

Observing that sometimes corrective and punitive measures have to be taken, the President said there should be no overemphasis of them, but they ought to be studied there carefully, he continued, and give less attention to subjects that

are unworthy of being pursued day and night.

Eisenhower said he had heard and seen part of Flanders' speech attacking "McCarthyism" on television last night. He said it would be a grave error to split the party apart and go off in different directions. In that case he said great danger lay ahead for the party and the country.

Eisenhower backed up the decision of the Republican National Committee to have Vice President Nixon answer Stevenson's speech on television and radio. The President said he had not at all in mind a meeting at which that decision was made.

The President said he greatly admired Nixon and has great trust and confidence in him. He said Nixon will place before the people the facts as all of those in responsible positions in the Republican party understand them.

"Asked if this meant McCarthy would not speak for the Republican party in the campaign, Eisenhower said he doesn't suppose he would answer that question. He added that McCarthy is at liberty to say what he chooses to say he speaks for.

On other matters the President:

1. Declared that he does not believe the United States never will be invaded by any foreign nation, but that it is possible that it will be attacked by one or more of them.

2. Repeated that he favors consideration of Hawaiian and Alaskan statehood bills and rail, bus and other transportation bills.

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4. Commenting on the case of Chafetz Schwartz, who "confessed" during the Korean War that he was a spy, the President said that it is the duty of the President to see that the law is enforced. His name is Eddie Condon (born Albert Edward Condon), a high priest of jazz, 36, has an astuteness akin to the late Babe Ruth's.

The Babe never threw to a wrong base. Eddie never played a wrong chord.

Actually, he drinks 20 times as much milk as he does strong spirit. He eats nothing during the day, light hours, but his liquid par is three quarts of sweet milk and one quart of buttermilk.

His friend and "corner" player, Wild Bill Davison recently opened an antique shop somewhere on 11th Street.

"What are you going to call it?" Eddie asked.

"Trade and treasures," said Bill. Eddie shook his head.

"What's your wrong" with that name?"

"Nothing," said Eddie. "but I would have called it Wild Bill and his China Closet."

Condon is the sort of friend who doesn't give you one key to the apartment. He gives you several.

"Tomorrow," he said to me one day, "when you're out in the world, you'll have some keys made of this place."

"One for Phyllis" (his clever, pretty wife), "one for me, one for the maid and four for you," he said. "You lose things."

Condon has no opinion on the subject of boy. He just never thinks of it. He did it sure he would teach it, but someone played a hop record for him the other day and insisted that he comment.

"I sat through a hurricane in 1944 on a beach out in Jersey," said Eddie, "and this is very meaningful to me."

"Perhaps," observed the man who was interviewing him, "how do you rate a hurricane?"

"How do you rate a hurricane?" asked Eddie.

Condon's observations on the human scene and on human beings are not confined to musicians. He introduced me to a college professor one night and later told me the proper place (football) for Notre Dame.

"He looks a little old and frail for that," I said.

"Oh, he was playing before they put air in the football," he said.

The Condon household in New York's Greenwich Village is a 7-room construction.

It is the apartment of a musician, yet there isn't a guitar or a banjo in the place.

Condon has made at least 500 photographs records in his life, but

The striking IILA men are angry because last Thursday's anti-strike injunction was not directed also against the AFL-ILA and the AFL-ILA International Brotherhood of Teamsters (IBT), which is backing the AFL-ILA.

The coroner added, "After a careful examination of the topography, weather conditions, the surrounding circumstances, I believe that there was no criminal culpability either on the part of the operator, or the operator of the truck, Paul A. Dudas."

The new brick building nestles on seven acres overlooking the Potomac River. It has open fireplaces, immense windows and a fine deck.

In this atmosphere—where life is a fancy resort hotel, there is a school for the women of the age of 20 and 25 to go back to school to prepare to earn their own living. From all over the United States they are privileged to come to the Hannah Harrison School in Washington and live, both board and tuition free, during their training.

What's really the catch? None. It's a steady bachelor's idea of a place where older women faced with the necessity of supporting themselves may turn for training which they otherwise couldn't afford.

Started by Garfield, wealthy department store owner, had seen women, untrained to hold a job, come into his store looking for work. When he died in 1934 he left some \$200,000 to provide a temporary home and school for just such women, where today, besides schooling, they're entitled to a private room, heat by meals, recreational facilities, even free medical care.

Miss Genevieve Poole, director of the school which is named after Mr. Garfield's mother, says that as far as she knows, "there's no other like it in the country."

Take 46-year-old Mrs. Clara Waskey, who has just completed

her five-month course in institutional housekeeping. A young girl in a little town in Indiana she helped her father run his small hotel. At a wife and mother, Mrs. Waskey learned about housekeeping. After her mill engineer husband died of a heart attack, what could be more natural than Mrs. Waskey turning to housekeeping?

Will Make Job

The energetic student has a daughter in her tent and a married son who's working his way through Purdue University. Changes are, Mrs. Waskey will soon be taking a housekeeper's job, probably with a local hospital.

Married women with children aren't the only ones who have a chance to go back to school. Enrollment is open to single girls, and to divorced or deserted women.

1200 For Student

In awarding fellowships to the Hannah Harrison School, things like integrity, good health, financial need and one's capacity to learn in the field of study are what count. According to Miss Poole it costs around \$1200 to turn out a student.

Training is given in one of four courses:

Business, which fits them for employment as typists, receptionists or general office workers.

Clothing construction and alterations, after which they are ready for a job in a department store or dressmaking establishment or might even build up their own sewing business.

Commercial foods, for food

management jobs in restaurants, hotels, hospitals, schools and residential clubs.

Never Worked Before

Gray-haired Mrs. Freda McCormick of Darien, Conn., is a house-keeping student. Before she was suddenly faced with supporting herself, she had never worked anywhere but in her own home. One of the younger students, Pearl Pearce of Newport News, Va., is a high school graduate. After the business course she'll probably angle for an office job.

Attractive Dora Foster makes her own clothes and always has. But the Britisher was delighted at the prospect of getting professional training in sewing.

A farm girl, Dora worked during the war in a factory just outside London. With both parents dead, she decided in 1931 to emigrate to the United States.

Take Turns at Work

Here she worked for hotel people who were kind to her. "But," she explains, "I really wanted to sew."

Currently she hopes to work for a dress designer.

At the school Dora helps with the household chores. It's sort of a family policy for students to take their turn at housework, making repairs, at the switchboard or in the kitchen. Like other graduates, Miss Foster will have to successfully hold a job in her field for three months before she receives her diploma.





 London—Mr. John Stansby is out to find Livingston in distress. He has been searching for the man who is the "Abominable Snowman."

Mr. Stansby's safari to the Congo in 1937 was a kid's play by comparison. At least he had a pretty good bunch that he would find Livingston, the missing Scottish missionary.

The present British expedition has nothing to go on but a set of footprints, a dried monkey, and a bunch of confusing reports.

"According to the latter, Yeti which is the Tibetan name for the Snowman is described from a skeleton to be a man-like creature with a five-fingered hand. Some say he walks backward. Some say he walks backward to throw people off the track, others say he does it to throw the hair out of his eyes."

Miss Men Searching
 It is to settle these points in Europe that a nine-man team is now on its way from Katmandu, Nepal, to Hanchi, a mountainous slope of Mount Everest.

The team includes a lone American, George Russell, a naturalist who will conduct most of its search at altitudes of from 18,000 to 20,000 feet.

The London Daily Mail is picking up the tabs for the Snowman expedition. It is the Daily Mail's answer to the London Times' "accuse" of the conquest of Everest last year.

Unlike Stansby, who traveled with only a toothbrush, a butterfly net and a change of socks, the Snowman expedition is loaded down with seven tons of gear. It includes movie cameras, walkie-talkie radios, everything but oxygen cylinders. An army of 300 coolies is required to take this equipment from Katmandu to the base of Everest.

tee of any committee may be authorized only by the action of a majority of the committee.

3. No investigating committee or subcommittee is authorized to hold a hearing to hear subpoenaed witnesses or take sworn testimony unless a letter sworn testimony of the committee or subcommittee is present; provided, however, that the committee may authorize a majority member to constitute a quorum.

4. An investigating committee or subcommittee may not delegate its authority to issue subpoenas except by a vote of the committee or subcommittee.

5. Authentication Needed

4. No hearing shall be initiated unless the investigating committee or subcommittee has specifically authorized such hearing.

5. No hearing of an investigating committee or subcommittee shall be scheduled outside of the District of Columbia except by the majority vote of the committee or subcommittee.

6. No confidential testimony taken on confidential material presented or submitted to an investigating committee or subcommittee shall be made public, either in whole or in part, by any member of the committee or subcommittee.

7. Any witness summoned to a public or executive hearing may be accompanied by counsel of his own choosing, who shall be permitted to advise him of his legal rights.

8. Any witness is testifying to whom subpoenas are being served by members of the standing Senate committee or subcommittee as well as to Republican Senators on joint committee.

9. Ferguson said in the letter to committee chairman that the Policy Committee yesterday considered suggestions submitted by GOP Senators and selected "seven which were regarded of the minimum rules and policies."

In answer to questions, Ferguson said many Senate committees already have these rules in force but that the practice has not been universal.

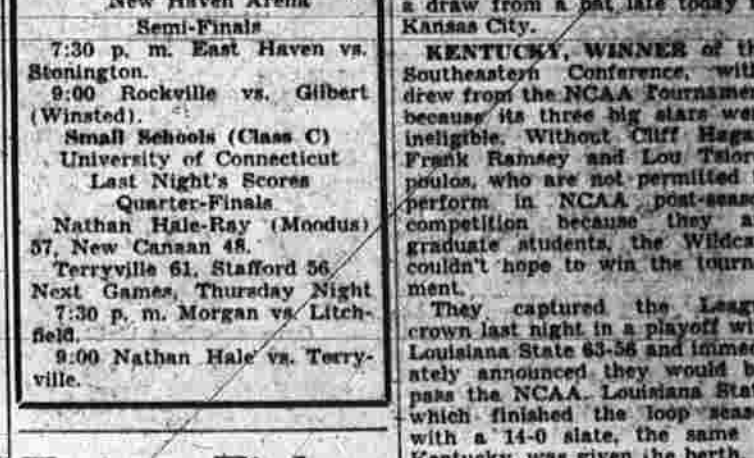

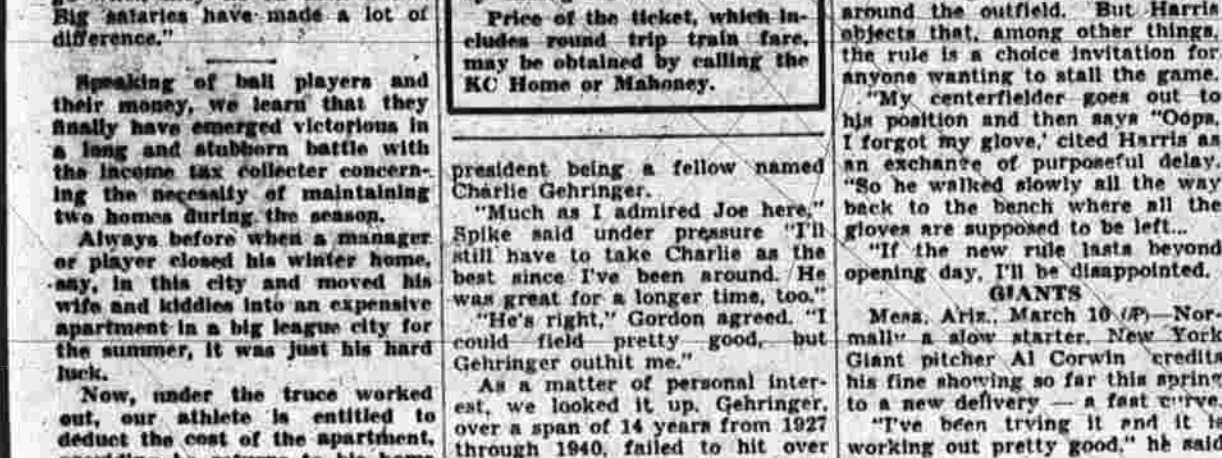
