"At a fatal moment our self-defense forces may produce the inevitable and irrevocable blow which our own weapons have given us reason to dread. Only courage and intelligence of the highest order, backed by open discussion, will give us the strength to turn back from the suicidal path we have blindly followed since 1942.

"There are many alternative courses to the policy to which we have committed ourselves, practically without debate. The worst of all these alternatives, submission to Communist totalitarianism, could still be far wiser than the final destruction of civilization.

"As for the best of these alternatives, a policy of working firmly toward justice and cooperation, and free intercourse with all other peoples, in the faith that we hope to see as early as possible a world in which we have had begotten hatred—would, in all probability, be the one instrument capable of piercing the armor of our present enemies.

"Once the facts of our policy of total extermination are publicly canvassed and the final outcome, mass suicide, is faced, I believe that the American people are still sane enough to come to a wiser decision than our Government has yet made. They will realize that retaliation is not protection; that total extermination of both sides is not victory; that a constant state of morbid fear, suspicion and hatred is not security; that, in short, what seems like unlimited power has become impotence.

"In the name of sanity let our Government now pause and seek the common sense of sane men who have not participated in the errors we have made and are not committed, out of pride, to defending them. Let us cease all further experiments with even more horrifying weapons of destruction, let our own self-defense forces further upon our mental balance.

"Let us all, as responsible citizens, not the cowed subjects of an alien power, but as free men, take note of the fact that we are all alike and we are all alike in our need for peace and security. The Board of Education in its special meeting last night voted to hike the starting salaries of teachers coming in to the Manchester school system from \$2,900 to \$3,000 and at the same time spend discussions on the possibility of providing additional pay raises to "veteran" teachers.

The board approved a \$100 increase to place Superintendent of Schools Arthur H. Illing in a "better bargaining position" in his negotiations with teacher organizations. The \$3,000 starting salary is becoming common throughout the state and will help to attract out on several paying salary offers here.

The board last night also voted to raise the present maximum pay provided by the present schedule and who, therefore, cannot look forward to any additional increases.

Board member Charles McCormick said the present maximum "falls short of the goal to provide more adequate salaries for teachers who have been here a long time. He also said the present schedule does not provide the necessary incentive for getting and keeping good teachers.

We Don't Quite Know It Yet

We don't quite know it yet, but on March 1 we ourselves brought our own formula for life in the world to a dead end. On that day we ourselves canceled our own foreign policy. On that way, we ourselves all the technical information which we had sought national safety. On that day we played out the game we had been playing.

Among those who don't see it are the editors of the New York Times who, on Sunday, produced some pretty close to the ultimate in the technique of gloating over a turning point in the affairs of civilization. For an empty-headed rationalization of our present attitude will be a long time coming.

Because the Atomic Energy Commission has announced that the test of March 1 is only the first of a series, the Manchester Chronicle and the Manchester Evening Herald newspapers, declared that there should be no more explosion of hydrogen bombs, and this for the reason that American plans are moving to bring in the clouds. If this advice were to be heeded we might as well abandon both military and civilian nuclear energy. It is the business of science to enter the unknown. A score of men were killed in early attempts to fly. The history of Arctic exploration is a part of a history of death from cold and starvation. But the aeroplane was nevertheless invented and the North Pole was reached. We have known for 50 years that there is enough energy in a handful of matter to blow up a metropolis, but we persisted in our effort to find a way to release it.

"With knowledge comes caution," said the New York Times. The Atomic Energy Commission has not ignored the consequences of the recent experiment with the Pacific test. It has forbidden areas of the test zone so that it now has a radius of 40 miles. In fact, it transferred its tests to the Pacific. The test zone is now known as the Territory of the Pacific Islands in accordance with the approval in 1947 by the Security Council of the United Nations. If it turns out that even in the mid-Pacific danger lurks after the detonation of a hydrogen bomb, there is no doubt that the commission will reinforce the precautions it has already taken. There is still hope, though at a faint hope, that the recent event in the Pacific may lead to some effective agreement with the Russians for the international control of atomic energy, no matter for what purpose it may be used.

"Enlarge the forbidden area," that, especially, is the New York Times key answer to all the worries and concerns of mankind since March 1. That makes everything lovely again, doesn't it?

City state and federal governments all are seeking to halt the port stop, and today the ILA found itself facing these factors:
1. A federal grand jury probe of the waterfront dispute. U. S. special agents in an alleged conspiracy between some employees and the ILA to keep off the pier. Those AFL men willing to work. Also to be checked is a proposed strike by ILA tugboat crew.
2. A federal court trial in which the ILA, eight of its local and three local officers are accused of contempt of federal court. The trial goes into its second day after ILA attorneys failed to win a dismissal of the charges. The case could result in fines of at least \$10,000 against the union and prison terms for the officers.
3. A National Labor Relations Board hearing in Washington last December's bargaining representation election. The ILA presently came out ahead of the rival AFL union of the same name, but an NLRB examiner has recommended that the election be set aside because of alleged ILA threats and strong-arm tactics at the polls.
4. A new injunction to be sought by the NLRB to keep tugboat crews from supporting the strike. The House bill would require to request the injunction in Federal Court in New York today.
5. Unfair labor practice charges filed by the NLRB yesterday. The employees charges, that the ILA infringes on the right to work, could result in a court order banning all pickets and non-working longshoremen from the waterfront. The association requests 170 shipping and stevedoring companies.
While legal troubles rained down on the strikers, the union gave up hope of sympathy wait-outs in other East Coast ports. In Baltimore, the nation's second largest port, a hearing was scheduled for 4 p. m. to see if a temporary injunction should be issued to require stevedores to work. New York cargo longshoremen in the jammed port have been whittling away at the backlog since a five-day court order issued Sunday.
The ILA took its fight to Washington where 1,000 pickets marched yesterday in an orderly parade in front of the White House. They were unsuccessful in getting a change to talk to the President.

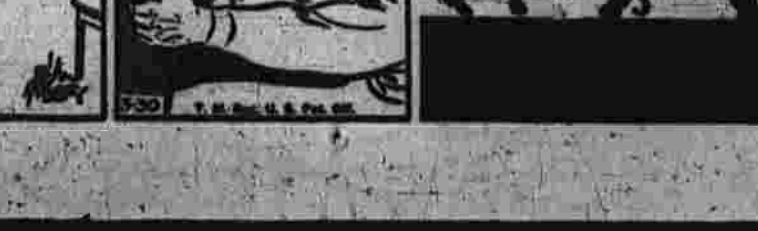

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I-Bomb Seen As City-Buster

Washington, March 31 (AP)—Chairman Lewis L. Strauss of the Atomic Energy Commission said today a hydrogen bomb big enough to wipe out any city in the world now can be made.

Strauss made the statement at a President Eisenhower's weekly news conference. He attended the conference to give the public a partial report on the progress of the atomic energy program.

"I believe that the hydrogen bomb can be made in a matter of months," Strauss said. "It is a matter of time before we will have a hydrogen bomb in our hands."

He added that the hydrogen bomb is a "city-buster" because it can destroy a city in a matter of minutes. He said that the bomb is a "game-changer" because it can change the balance of power in the world.

"Unbelievable" - The explosion occurred shortly after 10:30 a. m. at the site of the atomic energy program. The explosion was heard for miles around and the ground shook.

The measure shot through Congress yesterday in compromise form, with House vote of 72-8. It cut excise taxes on a wide range of products ranging from refrigerators to phone bills. It means savings for just about every person who spends money.
