The 32014 million dollars in loan authority recommended in the bi includes 175 millions for th Rural Electrification Administration (REA) and 145 millions for the Farmers Home Administration. The REA authorization consists of 100 millions for electrifica-tion loans and 75 millions for telephone loans. These loans are self-

iquidating. The Farmers Home Administration makes loans for production and subsistence, land purchase, farm improvements, water supply mprovements and emergency pur-

The 250-million-dollar conserva-tion program recommended for the 1955 crop year includes 55 mil-lions for use only when Congress adopts a program for the use of lands diverted from production in 1955 under crop control programs. There is an urgent need for such a program, the committee said, to elp hold down accumulations of surplus commodities and to assure a productive agriculture to meet the food requirements of the fu-

For payments for the 1954 conservation program, the committee recommended \$191,700,000, a cut of \$3,300,000 from the budget request. It explained that the department will have \$3,300,000 i unobligated balances at the end o the program year.
