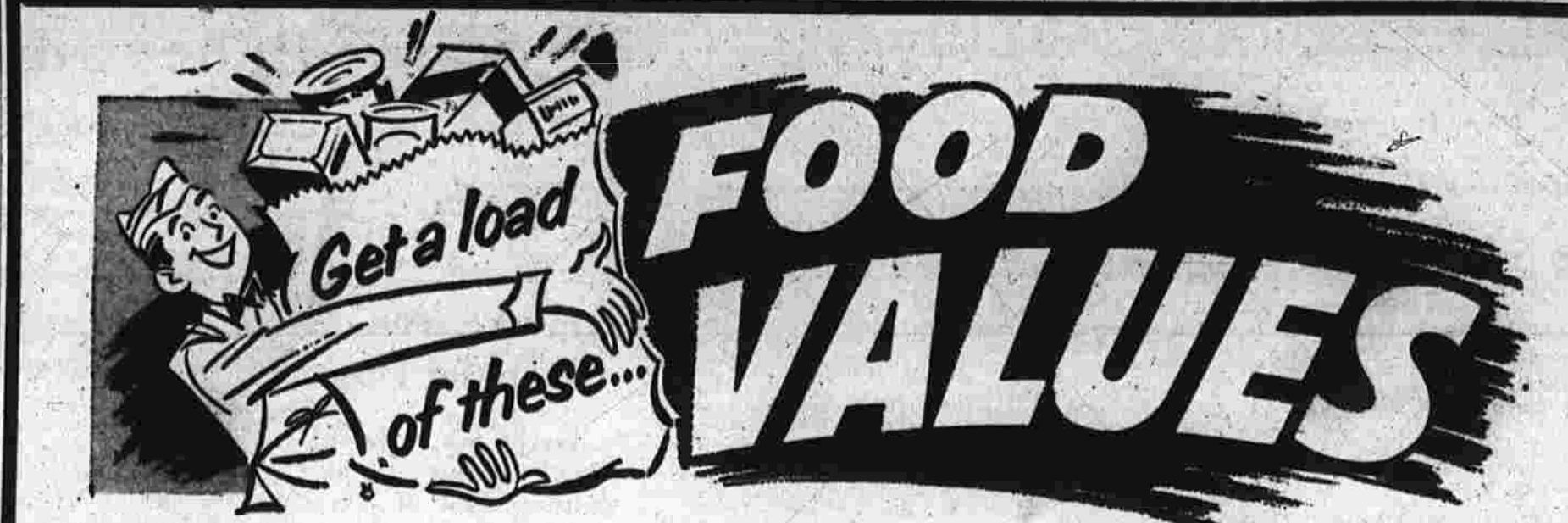

 Further south in Indochina, King Norodom Sihanouk of Cambodia orders general mobilization in his kingdom and announced he would appeal to the United Nations against a Vietnamese aggression there. French observers said they considered the king's decree an appeal to world conscience and not a formal request for U.N. action.
 The young sovereign's move was prompted by a small-scale invasion of Cambodia by about two battalions of Vietnamese from Laos eight days ago. So far, only scattered actions have been reported in the vicinity of the Laos-Cambodia border.
 Main attraction still was focused on the building for renewed fighting at Dien Bien Phu. The French paratrooper divisions were ordered to defend the isolated mountain fortress. On the fringes and in the surrounding low-lying hills, the Vietnamese brought fresh troops into attack positions and continued to bolster them with supplies and ammunition from Red China despite continued air assaults by French fighters and bombers.
 French and Vietnamese patrolled around the edges of the fortress, feeling out each other's strength.
 Political Move
 King Norodom's mobilization call was regarded as a political military move, with his chief aim to gain the support of the Cambodian ruler, who has won considerable sovereignty from the French but still is negotiating for complete independence and looser ties with the French Union.
 He has assumed command of all military forces in Cambodia, including a French operational group. This arrangement, made in

The Whip

Whatever Secretary of State Dulles is driving for—and the best guess still is that he is threatening direct involvement in Indo-China primarily in order to provide himself with a bludgeon for the upcoming Geneva conference—his chances of getting it have been diminished rather than increased, by the tactics which came into the open yesterday.

What appeared yesterday was the launching of a bold new strategy by Secretary Knowland, the majority leader in the Senate. This was an obvious signal from the Eisenhower administration that obviously designed to whip Britain and France into line for Secretary Dulles' proposals, whatever it is. This was Senator Knowland's statement.

"Since some of the nations with which we are associated have been suggesting that they wait until after the Geneva conference before deciding how to respond to Secretary Dulles' inquiries regarding a collective action that would follow Russian aggression in Southeast Asia, I find there is a growing sentiment in Congress that perhaps Congress should delay until after Geneva before setting any final policy in support of the United States in support of North Atlantic Treaty countries, particularly those that have dragged their feet so far as the European Defense Community is concerned."

This is not, unfortunately, hot-head Knowland going off on his own, as he sometimes does, but the nature of the job involved is a familiar one. After our allies have been insulted and knocked on the head, Secretary Dulles will go to London and Paris in a sweet and reasonable mood, offering to patch things up for them if they will only do a little symbolic yielding to his own proposals.

Since this precise tactic has been employed before, to obtain ratification of EDC, and has failed conspicuously, there is not much reason to expect that it will work now and succeed in bringing Britain and France meekly into line. And the threat, this time, is a little more non-symbolic than usual. Most of the aid we give to France, for instance, goes to the Indo-China war. So what we are now saying to France is that if France tries to make peace in Indo-China or fails to accept our policy for the fighting in Indo-China, we will get even by cutting off France's capacity to fight in Indo-China.

Such a threat not only threatens to mark us as a bully. It is also pointless. When we act this way it is good news only to the Communist world.
