Not Rejected Yet
 We remember back to Dec. 9, the day after President Eisenhower had made his address to the United Nations proposing the cooperation of all atomic powers, including Russia, in the development of an atomic pool for peaceful purposes, and how gibed opinion in this country, more than anything else, has been the cause of Moscow's rejection of the proposal. We held and still hold the idea that Moscow is powerless to reject a proposal of such a nature. We said then, and say now, that it possessed the power, as long as we ourselves keep it alive, the overwhelming actual power that belongs to a great and good idea. It is clearly and clearly expressed, as President Eisenhower did express it on that occasion.
 "What has happened since then?" In January, at Washington, Secretary of State Dulles began "proceeding" talks with Soviet representatives in Washington on the President's plan. At the Berlin conference, in February, Mr. Dulles held two private talks with Foreign Minister Molotov on the President's plan.
 "We have agreed," Mr. Dulles said then, "on the next procedure, which will involve continued negotiations between Moscow and Washington, through the Soviet Embassy in Washington."
 On March 19, the United States delivered to Russia a private note dealing with the question of atomic energy.
 Tuesday, at Geneva, Foreign Minister Molotov paid a special call on Secretary Dulles, delivering to him Russia's reply to our note of March 19.
 This reply is being kept private. There are some indications in the contents requests for further amplification of our proposals and also some counterproposals from Russia.
 In all this, it is to be noted, the diplomacy of the two countries is following the same method of procedure—private communication which diplomatic usually employ when it means business and is just not seeking headlines or propaganda advantage.
 When and if the discussion comes to an impasse, as the record may be made public and clear. But pending that time, nobody is being put on record publicly with a position which the discussion might help change. Nobody is building up "face" which might be lost if there were compromise.
 Now it may well be that Russia is merely playing for time, hoping that the comparative weakness of the Eisenhower proposal will eventually fade so much that Russia can take the chance of veering away from it permanently. It may be merely that Russia is seeking for the safe way to turn down something it does not, in fact, turn down immediately and openly. But even if this is the case, and Russian intentions are completely innocent and disinterested, this will prove of the unusual power of the Eisenhower idea possessed and possessed. At the least, it has shown and embarrassed Russian diplomacy as has no other diplomatic or policy action of us. But that is only its minimum effect. There still no reason to discard the possibility that it may have results much more positive than that.
 It is when one compares the effectiveness of such a policy with the complete lack of power involved in our wavering of the hydrogen bomb, as Secretary Dulles' proclamation of the theory of "massive retaliation," that one comes to the deep wish that this country should engage in a great deal more of the business of negotiating the positive in the course of its world leadership.

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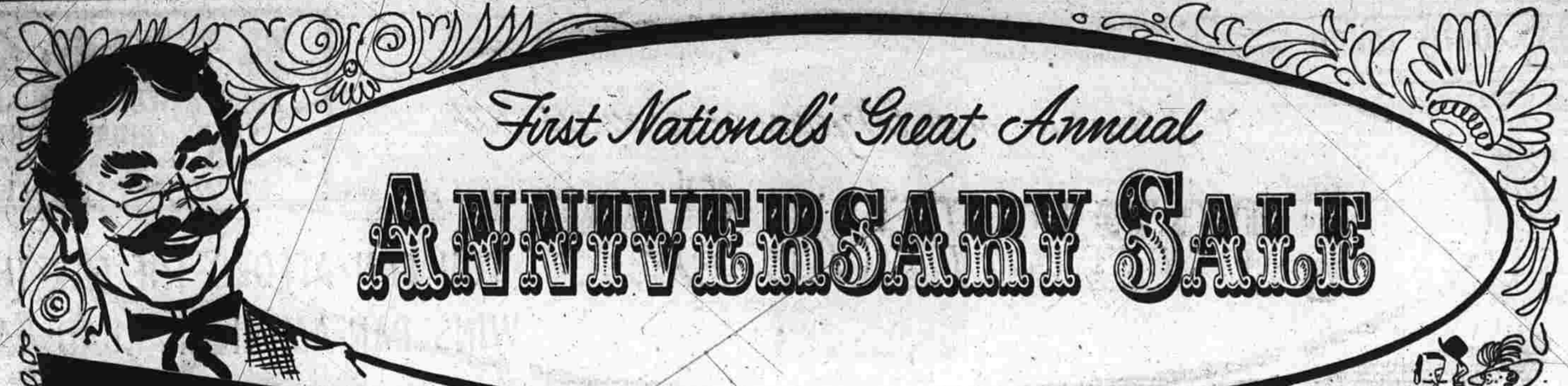

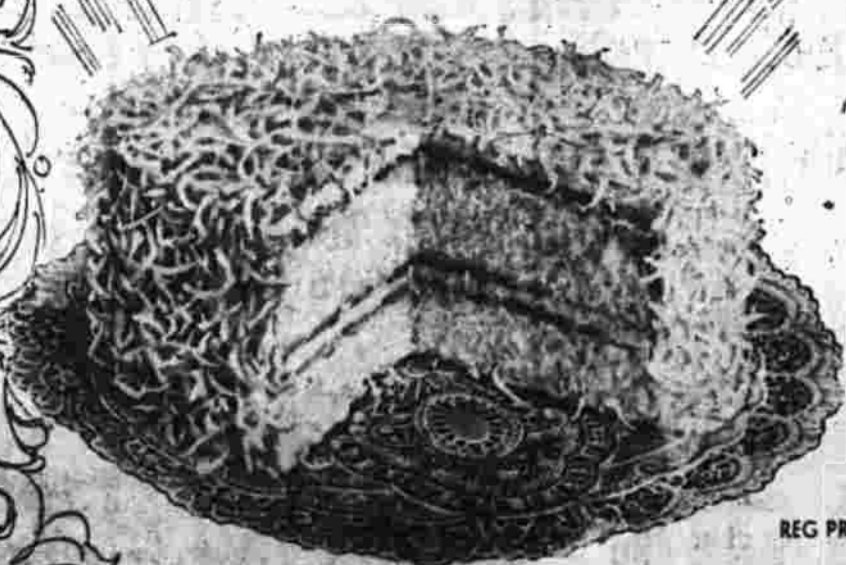

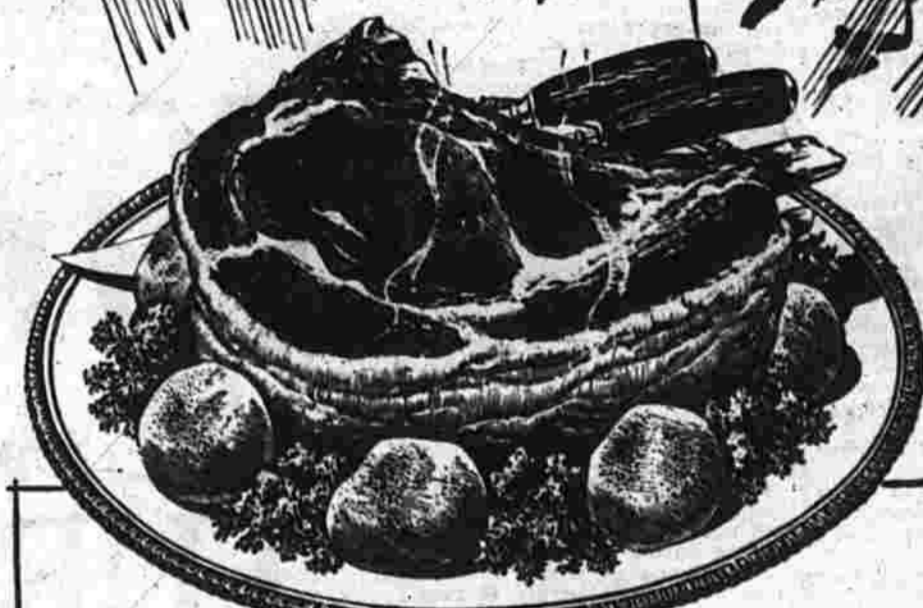

Does Camera Interfere With Dignity of Court?

(Continued from Page One)

The Bar Assn. expressed belief that such activities "defeat from the essential dignity of the proceedings, degrade the court and create misconceptions with respect thereto in the minds of the public."

Two years ago, as a result of the growth of television, it too, was included in the ban with radio and photography.

Some judges have gone even further than Canon 35, banning news photographers from any part of courthouse premises.

Between these two extremes, courts in recent months have developed in various ways that may and may not be done.

Opposition growing. Meanwhile, the general ban on courtroom photography itself has been drawing more and more opposition, including test motions assigned to show that pictures should be made without disturbance to the courts.

One noteworthy case occurred recently in Cleveland. Last August, Cleveland press photographer James Thomas took pictures in Common Pleas Court at the arraignment of a former probable judge on embezzlement charges.

The common pleas judge, Joseph J. Gilbert, cited the photographer for contempt, along with City Editor Louis Clifford, who had ordered the picture taken, and reporter Sam Gindoff.

The city editor was sentenced to one hour in the custody of the sheriff and fined \$500. The reporter was given a \$100 fine, and the photographer got a \$2500 fine.

When the matter was carried to the Court of Appeals, it upheld the sentence. Court Backs Judge. It ruled that Judge Gilbert was well within his rights in prohibiting pictures. It said one of a judge's duties is to insure that there are no undue distractions, even in a routine judicial proceeding not taking place before a jury.

The press then announced it would take the case to the Ohio Supreme Court. Said Editor Louis E. Selzer: "It is our basic argument... that photographs and news pictures taken in a courtroom... essentially no different than a reporter covering a trial with his pad and pencil."
