The witness was Dr. Gerald Harrison, now an assistant mathematics professor at Wayne University in Detroit.

Dr. Harrison was the first witness called by the subcommittee in its investigation of espionage activities in education, labor and other fields.

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Dougherty Lots Appeal Victorious in Decision

Court of Common Pleas Judge J. Walter Sidler has sustained the appeal of the Dougherty lots from the Planning Commission action changing the three and a half acre lots known as the Dougherty lots from Residence A Zone to Business Zone.

In rendering his decision, Judge Sidler said that the Planning Commission of the Town of Manchester changing the area from the residential zone to the business zone is an arbitrary and capricious use of abuse of discretion and, therefore, void.

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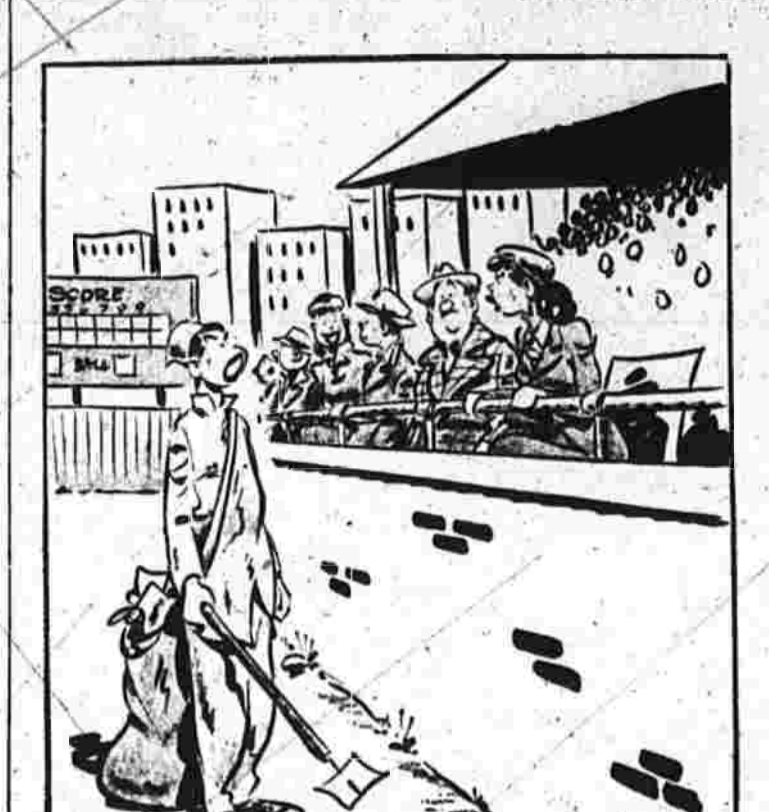

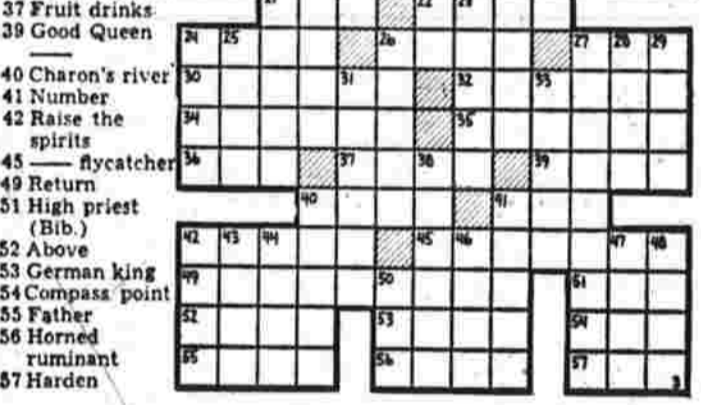
