Nicaragua Splinters with Guatemala

Washington, May 20 (AP)—Nicaragua Ambassador Guillermo Sevilla Sacasa said today his government broke relations with Guatemala yesterday, charging that Guatemala had violated an agreement by spreading Communist propaganda in Nicaragua. The ambassador's statement continued earlier word from other sources here that the diplomatic break was not directly related to a recent arm shipment from Communist Poland which President Eisenhower described yesterday as "disturbing."

Britain May Bar France in First Pacific Front

Geneva, May 20 (AP)—Top diplomats at the Geneva Conference held a series of private talks today which may determine the fate of the so-called Pacific Front. The talks were held in the presence of the British and French representatives, who discussed the possibility of a Pacific Front between Britain and France.

Russia Reports Execution of 'U.S. Saboteur'

Moscow, May 20 (AP)—Red Star announced today the conviction and execution by shooting of a Ukrainian exile allegedly parachuted into the Soviet Union by U. S. intelligence agents. The man was identified as a "U.S. saboteur" who had been working to undermine the Soviet war effort.

110 Evacuated By French in Fortress Airlift

Hanoi, Indochina, May 20 (AP)—French military planes today evacuated 110 men as helicopters and light planes lifted them from a fortress in the hands of Communist forces. The evacuation was carried out as part of a larger military operation in the region.

Dublin, Ireland, May 20 (AP)—John A. Costello's coalition today triumphed over Eamon de Valera in the Irish Dail (Parliament). Nearly complete tabulations of Tuesday's election results showed De Valera's Fianna Fail (men of De Valera's party) had lost any mathematical chance of gaining a majority in the 12-seat Dail.

The prime minister's source said that the coalition had given some thought to the possibility of breaking off the talks at this stage to see any sign of a change in the French position. The coalition parties split their seats as follows: Fine Gael (United Ireland)—49; Labor—17; Sinn Fein (Farmers)—3; Clann Na Poblachta (Republicans)—2.

House Group May Vote More Security Benefits

Washington, May 20 (AP)—The House Ways and Means committee yesterday approved most of President Eisenhower's proposals for expanding social security coverage and today it turned to the military district pension benefits. The committee is expected to vote on the proposals soon.

## Reds Claim Korea Role Data False

Moscow, May 21 (AP)—Pravda accused the United States today of producing documents to show Russian participation in the Korean war and Russian and Chinese intervention in Indochina.

In a bitter article entitled "American Provocational Forged Documents," the Communist newspaper accused the U.S. government of "aggressive adventures" and "backstabbing" which have made the world a creators of provocational forged documents.

The Pravda attack was based on two U.S. government documents. The first, entitled "New Colonialism in China-Soviet Invasion in Indochina," charged Soviet equipment had been supplied to the Indochinese Vietminh rebels after the Soviet Union had sponsored a widespread plot for Indochinese penetration.

The second, a series of documents issued Saturday by the Pentagon, accused the Russians of masterminding the Korean War. It said 6,000 to 12,000 Russian troops participated in the Korean war. It also charged the Russians with sending anti-aircraft batteries, medium gun regiments, quarters, units and railroad outfits. It also charged the Russians controlled the North Korean government.

Pravda contended itself with rejecting as false the Indochinese charges, reserving its sharpest words for the American charges of Russian participation in Korea.

The authors did not attempt to confirm this malicious invective which has no factual ground to support. "The newspaper declared, 'Why do the ruling circles of the United States use this mass production of forged documents? . . . It is quite obvious that government organs in the United States began to fabricate these documents because of their failure in attempting to bring about an armed intervention in Indochina.'

"With these forged documents they want and need the same one he gave Western agents in Germany several weeks ago which he asked for asylum—documents which he wanted to assassinate an anti-Communist leader in the Russian zone but instead had tipped off the intended victim and leader in the zone."

Pravda contended that the authors had been assigned to "conclusively established" the "treasoning of the United States as a satellite of the Soviet regime but did not intend to do so."
