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McCarthy vs. Army In Capsule Form

Washington, May 25 (AP)—Here is a brief rundown on the Senate investigations subcommittee in the dispute between Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis) and top Pentagon officials.

The basic charge—Secretary of the Army, Gen. Omar Bradley, was accused of attempting to use McCarthy as a "hostage" in efforts to induce McCarthy to halt or divert an investigation of alleged subversives in the Army.

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Split Roads Meeting Again?
 After several days of the "split" between British and American diplomacy, it begins to appear that there is nothing in the spirit that time and a continued Communist intransigence will not cure.

The difference between the two diplomats was in the method and manner in which they preferred to approach the Geneva Conference. Secretary of State Dulles preferred the Communist beforehand, and therefore, seemed to greet them at the opening of the conference with an ultimatum.

Foreign Minister Eden believed in going to the conference in good faith himself, and in presuming that there would be good faith on the part of the Communists. He could not be going in good faith himself if he brandished an ultimatum first. He could not seem to presume good faith on the part of the Communists if he did not try to negotiate with them.

So, while Mr. Dulles has been in Washington, exhibiting a good faith in the assumption of had faith on the part of the Communists, and desiring to take no part himself in a conference with them, Mr. Eden has been hard at work at Geneva, meeting with the Communist leaders in a long series of private conferences, and doing his conscientious best to explore every last possibility of sensible and honorable agreement on something or anything.

Mr. Eden's patience, resourcefulness, such skill have unified his own nation behind his efforts, and they have impressed the whole free world. They have done so because only a few really want the free world to be the one to cast out the possibility of negotiation and turn to force as the only argument.

But Mr. Eden has now made rather extensive explorations, at Geneva, into the capacity of the Communists to be reasonable. He is beginning to be discouraged, and his latest consultation with his cabinet at home has resulted in a decision which instructs him to set a time limit for the negotiations at Geneva, following which Britain is likely to join the movement to join Mr. Dulles in a warning to the Communists that their failure to make peace in India-China will result in some collective security action which will try to guarantee their failure to win any complete military victory in the war in Indo-China.

Thus Mr. Eden's path, which has been the path of reasonableness and patience, risks, in the end, the same destination as Mr. Dulles' path, which was the path of toughness and impatience. This might well be taken as proof that Mr. Dulles was right in the first place. But it seems to us that the Eden path was still preferable, and still much sounder reasoning.

Mr. Eden has been demonstrating, by his own patient and sincere efforts, and in a manner which must be convincing to all who have watched, including the so-called neutrals of the world, something that Mr. Dulles sought to have the world presume. The Dulles course disintegrated and alienated world opinion; the Eden path has courted world opinion, and, presumably, influenced it as well.

The Communists still have it within their power to defeat Mr. Eden's calm and patient exposure of the fact that Mr. Dulles was right, even if he was hasty. They can do that by being reasonable, by talking a language that somebody can accept. They can prove Mr. Dulles wrong. And it would be good for the world if they did.

Luxuries
 With the back of its hand, and a very small pressure of the back of its hand at that, the world is producing for itself a series of minor luxuries. These are occurring in the field of "technical assistance," for which there are three main programs in the world—the United States program, the program of the United Nations and the United States program, and the program of the Colombo Plan, organized by the British Commonwealth nations and other independent nations of the Far East.

The New York Times has just published a world summary of the things happening in various countries as a result of these programs. It has defended its favorite creed, that of inaction, without too much trouble.

Inaction Triumphs
 The world of politics has a way of closing in on the best and most cherished intentions, and as it has done with the one thing President Eisenhower most hoped to accomplish rather early in his service.

He hoped to be able to bring about a new Father-son deal, instead, in this country's attitude on the issue of foreign trade. He hoped to be able to lead his own party into a renewed life of traditional resistance to repeal and extend the reciprocal trade agreements program.

There are the world of traditional politics, and economic conditions not yet ready to topple over gracefully, made its first attack. The finding of the Communist use of a hideous trap, as many as many billions as it had recommended.

The one positive thing it did recommend was that the reciprocal trade agreements program should, this year, be given a continuation for three years instead of just one, and that there should go with it authority for the President to make three five per cent cuts in our tariff levels, one for each year.

This would be all he could get without a prolonged struggle in Congress, neither the nor Congress is in the mood for such a struggle, the time of the season is growing late, there are other things that have to be done; it is easier to glide past the fundamental issue involved and say we will get around to determining it at some later time.

Perhaps it will be easier, "at some later time," as the saying is, but at any rate, one high hope of a dynamic re-organizing of one of our most important national policies goes glimmering and the normal world of politics stands snug and satisfied. It has defended its favorite creed, that of inaction, without too much trouble.

But in 1922, continuing the Monroism in which parties dare to widen the base of the Republican vote, the Republican ticket contained three Yankees, one Irishman, two Jewish and one Irish name. It was a politically startling array as contrasted to former Yankee slates.
