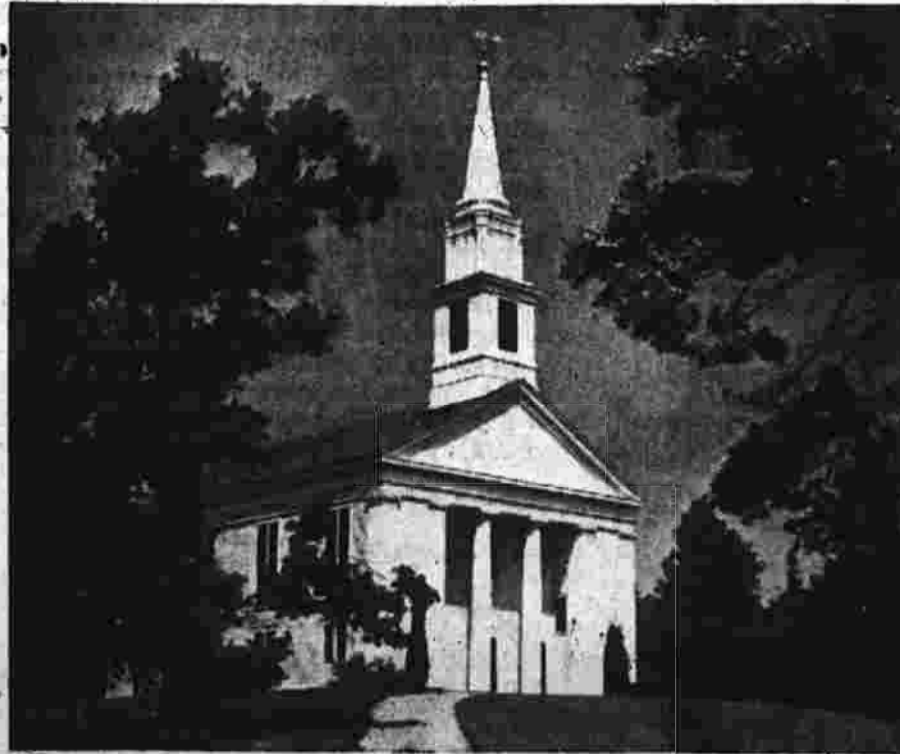

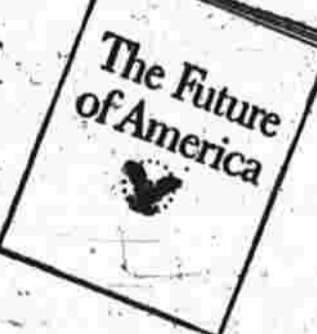

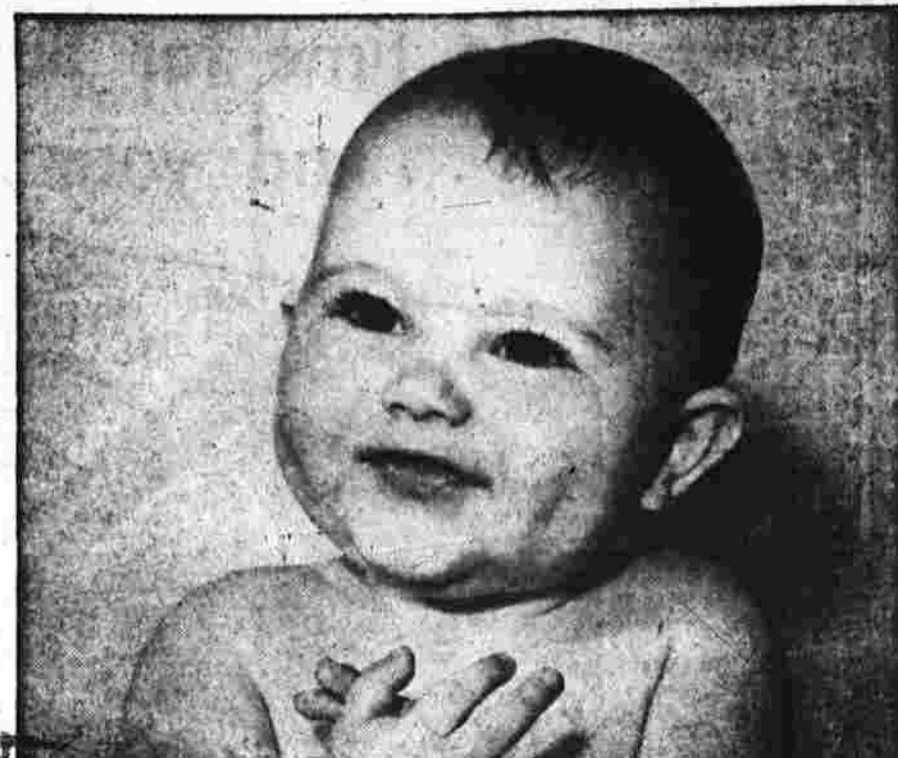

Over 2,000 Receive Degrees At Four Commencements

progress "in many fields with lightning rapidity."
"In this short period of time more has been done to relieve mankind of suffering from disease, back-breaking manual labor, discrimination, ignorance and isolation than in all other generations of our civilization combined."
"All of these accomplishments have been made possible because of faith and belief in some ideal—none of them through fear or frustration or even through chance."
"The future of private universities and colleges provided Purcell with the theme of his talk to Hillier's graduates just as the future of state universities was the main subject of Jorgensen's talk."
Free to Explore
All of the nation's theologians and many of her doctors and lawyers have been educated in private colleges and universities, and Purcell, stating that such institutions have "kept the study of liberal arts at a high level" because they have been free to venture into new fields.
Largely, he said, they achieve this freedom because they are supported by their own endowments and are not subject to pressures from any group.
In commencements to come, many more students will be receiving degrees than was the case yesterday. If the predictions made by Jorgensen at Storrs continue to pass, "The time is not far off when we shall enroll at least twice our present number of students," he said. "Assuming that we continue the American tradition of providing educational opportunity consistent with ability and motivation of students, the physical, financial and institutional load will be far greater than any we have ever called upon to bear in the history of American education."
The need for meeting the challenge is clearly indicated. The question is whether or not the planning will be done in time. Classrooms and laboratories cannot be built overnight.
Freedom of Thought
Jacobs, once closely associated with President Eisenhower, made a plea for freedom of thought as he addressed the crowd at Trinity's commencement.
"We must not," he said, "brand as a Communist everyone who dares to speak his mind honestly and fairly, who espouses a new cause, and who does not agree with the majority. America has grown and prospered on new ideas, new concepts, on the conquering of ever new frontiers and, yes, on the strength of dissenting and minority points of view."
Jacobs was provost of Columbia University when Mr. Eisenhower was president of that institution.
