Guatemala Exiles Reported Massing For Revolt Today

London, June 18 (AP)—British forces would launch a rebellion today against the Guatemalan government, according to reports from a source who has been carrying arms to Guatemala. But Britain promised at the same time to undertake police action on the high seas to stop any British ships bound with arms to Guatemala ports.

Tegucigalpa, Honduras, June 18 (AP)—Armed Guatemalan exiles were reported massing along their journey home along their own homeland's frontier with Honduras amid indications today that they will launch a rebellion against President Jacobo Arbenz Guzman's Communist-influenced regime.

New France Regime To Exclude Bidault

Paris, June 18 (AP)—France's new premier, Pierre Mendès-France, worked urgently to form a cabinet today. He may keep for himself the foreign minister—replacing Georges Bidault—and seek a place in Indochina through personal meetings at Geneva with the Communists.

French sources reported the new premier will go to Geneva Monday to fill the diplomatic void left when Joseph Laniel's government fell.

Mendès-France, a Socialist, is a stream of visitors in an office at the Bourne Palace, home of the National Assembly. He is under pressure to set up a cabinet quickly to make good on his promise to achieve an Indochina settlement by July 20 or so.

If Mendès-France takes over the foreign ministry he will be one of the few faces there since the war. Bidault and a fellow member of the Communist Party, Robert Schuman, are also expected to be in the cabinet.

Mendès-France became France's 14th postwar premier. His cabinet will be the nation's 20th in the 10 years since liberation.

Five American Airmen Vanish In Indochina

Saigon, Indochina, June 18 (AP)—Five U.S. Air Force men stationed at a French Air Base in Touane are missing and American officials fear they may have fallen into the hands of the Communist-led Viet Minh.

The U.S. embassy said a Vietnamese peasant had reported seeing five Americans among a group of 20 soldiers who were marching south of Touane.

Chief of the American military mission in Hanoi, Gen. Joseph H. Moore, said he would conduct an inquiry into the disappearance of the men, missing since Monday.

Reds Veto Plan for U. N. Indochina Peace Patrol

United Nations, N. Y., June 18 (AP)—Russia today vetoed Thailand's proposal for an Indochina peace patrol. It was the Russian's 39th veto in the Security Council.

The proposal was supported by the United States, Britain, France and six other council members.

Leshan abstained.

Russia's "no" vote was sufficient to kill action in the council. But it opened the way for a move for a special session of the U. N. General Assembly to deal with the question. There is no veto in the assembly.

Russia's delegate, Benymin K. Tsarapkin charged the idea, favored by at least nine members of the 11-nation Security Council, as "a diversion and camouflage by the United States to widen the conflict in Indochina."

A Russian veto would pave the way for Thailand to take the proposal to the 60-nation U. N. General Assembly. Thailand's deputy delegate, Theast Khonnan said today that Thailand would push its proposal.

"I am sure that there would be a showdown with the delegates concerned and get instructions from their governments. They said a special assembly meeting was not likely before July."

The United States backed the Thai proposal for a 12-nation peace patrol. It was the Russian's 39th veto in the Security Council.

Democrats Urge Ike to Consider Prosecutions on Hearings Basis

Washington, June 18 (AP)—Democrats on the McCarthy Army Investigating Subcommittee today called for the Eisenhower administration to consider quick action whether there should be criminal prosecutions as a result of the hearings—on the basis of the evidence presented.

Sen. McClellan (D-Ark.), speaking for the Democrats, said there should also be a fast decision as to whether there is need for an "immediate cleanup" on the staff of the McCarthy investigations Subcommittee.

McClellan held a news conference after the subcommittee met behind closed doors to discuss the problem of preparing reports on the hearings. The meeting reached no decision.

Two immediate problems, Sen. Symington (Mo.) and Sen. Eastland (Miss.) said, were Democratic members who reported to the McCarthy Subcommittee.

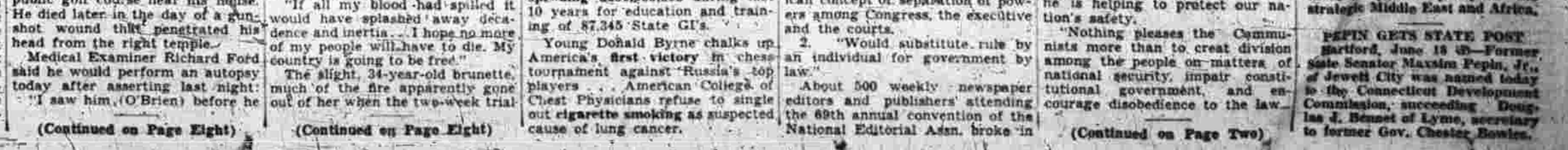

...had a bullet wound in the right temple fired at close range. Whether it was fired by himself or someone else was not prepared to say tonight.

Police, however, determined the shot was fired from an old-type .38 caliber revolver which was found on O'Brien's body.

O'Brien's death followed by two days a wild shooting affair in the Dorchester district, about a quarter of a mile from O'Brien's home.

Police said that incident was a gun duel in which about 30 shots were exchanged — from a sub-machine gun and a .45 caliber pistol.

Blood trickles and a bullet-shattered wrist watch gave evidence that someone was injured in that shooting but no one has been arrested in the connection yet.

O'Brien, from whose house FBI agents seized more than a dozen .38 caliber pistols, was a member of the Dorchester district, about a quarter of a mile from O'Brien's home.

Police never got the chance to question O'Brien while he was in the hospital, but they were very conscious when found and never regained consciousness.

Police would not say whether they suspected O'Brien with having any connection with the shooting of O'Brien, which occurred between 3 a.m. and 4 a.m. that morning.

Police have an alarm out for the apprehension of Joseph A. M. O'Keefe, 45, in connection with the shooting of O'Brien.

O'Keefe was serving a state prison term at the time of the strike in the robbery.

Reporters asked police if they think O'Brien's shooting, whether by his own hand or someone else's, might have any underworld connection. A high police official replied: "That's a theory we are working on."

Mrs. O'Brien told police her husband left the house of relatives where they are now living, yesterday, saying he was going to call his lawyers, she said. She has used only outside pay stations since he arrived because of fear his lines were tapped.

Paul T. Smith, O'Brien's attorney, said he received no calls from O'Brien.

Mrs. O'Brien said also that her husband left the house in apparent good spirits with no indication he would take his own life.

The money FBI agents took from O'Brien's home to still in federal custody. His wife and son, a student at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, are under federal indictments charging them with receiving stolen money.

During his trial O'Brien, who had no viable means of support, said he came into the money through several large gambling wins.

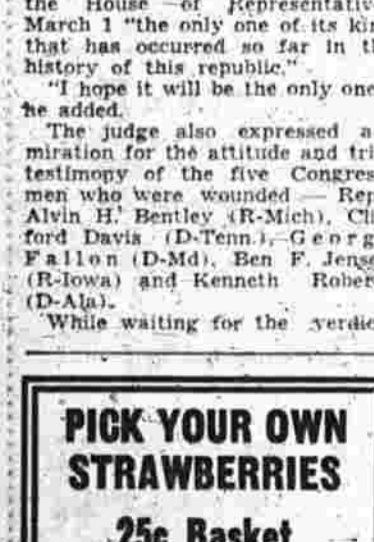

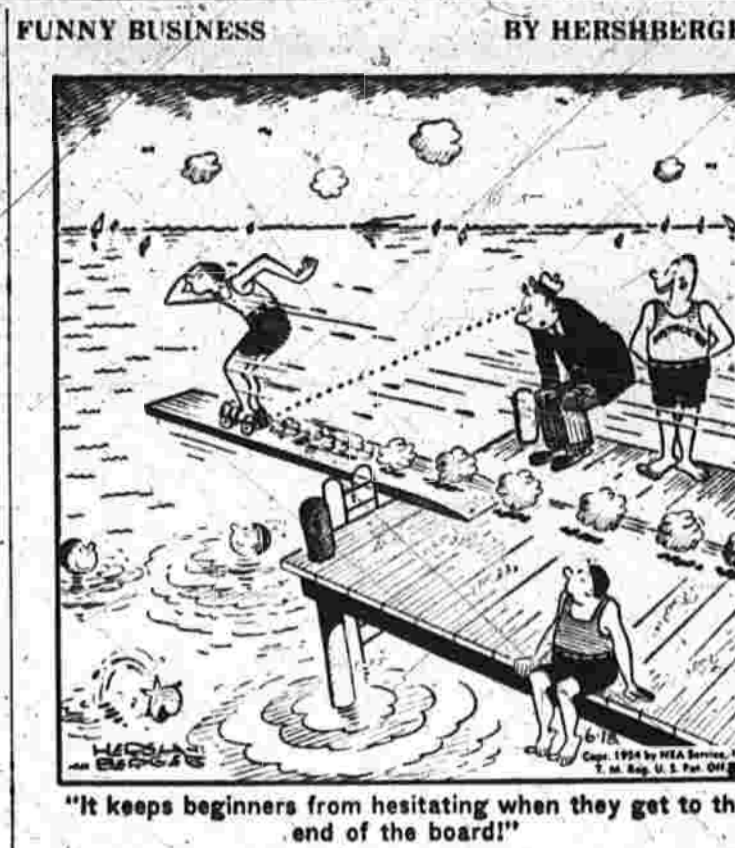
