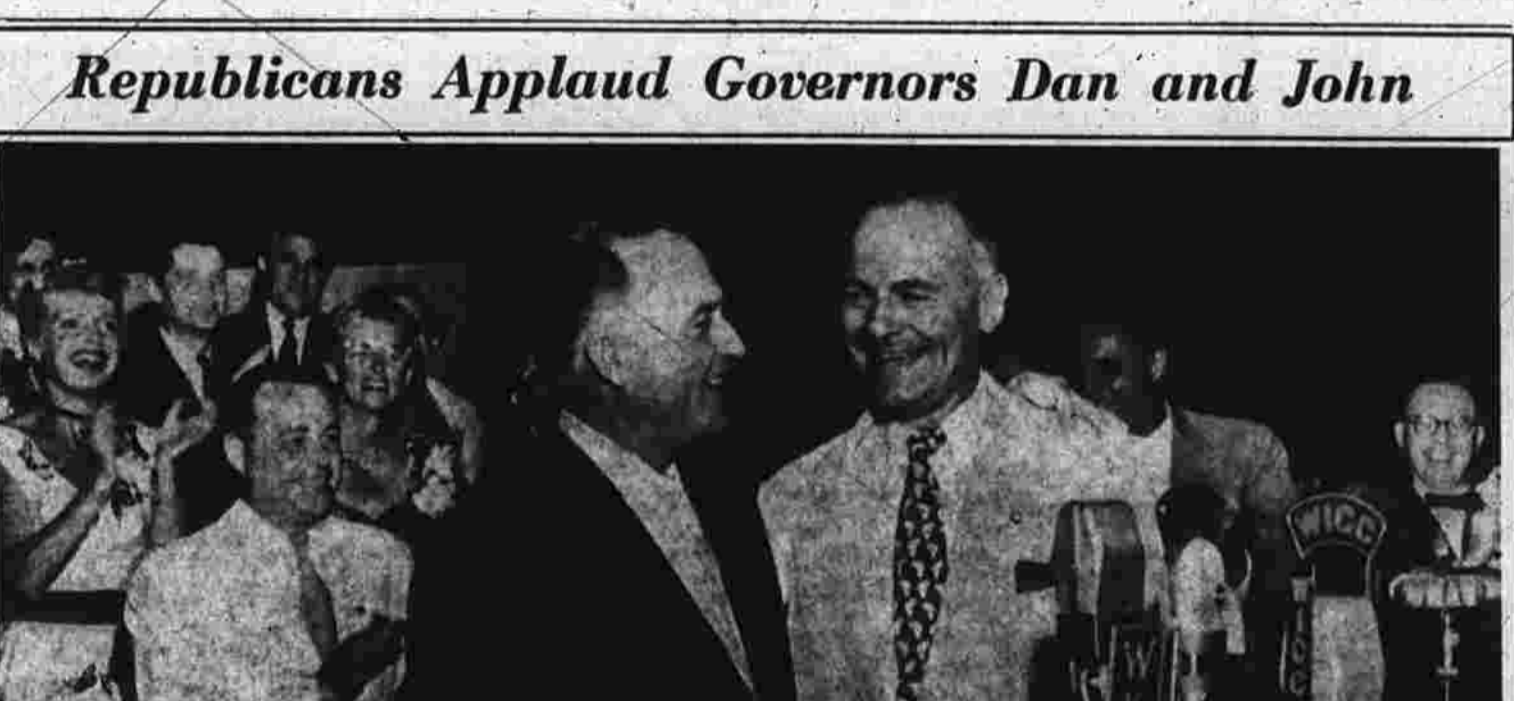

**The Doctor Says**  
 Night Blindness Can Generally Be Treated to a Deficiency of Vitamin A in the Diet.

A most interesting subject is brought up in today's first inquiry. Q—What is night blindness and how is it caused? Mrs. P.

A—Night blindness is a term usually used for inability to see reasonably well in a dim light. None of us, of course, see as well in a dim light as in bright light. But those with so-called night blindness are comparatively worse off. This often seems to be related to a deficiency of vitamin A. Vitamin which is present chiefly in the liver and which is taken into the body in several of the animal fats including butter and fish liver oils. Night blindness can sometimes be improved by adding these substances to the diet. Night blindness also occurs sometimes in diabetes and other conditions and becomes increasingly common in the older years of life.

Q—Please tell me what could cause black specks in front of my eyes. Does this mean kidney trouble? Mrs. E.

A—The most likely explanation is that you are suffering from cataracts in front of the eye. An eye specialist could quickly tell whether this was the cause or not. Kidney trouble is less likely.

Q—Where can I get information to tell my teenage son about the facts of life? The doctor said my husband should talk to him but he refuses to do so.—Mrs. L.

A—There are some excellent pamphlets and books which can be given to adolescents, both boys and girls. A list of suitable ones can be obtained from the Bureau of Health Education, American Medical Association, 535 North Dearborn St., Chicago, Ill. It will be possible for the father to supplement such material with his own and mothers with their own.

Q—For several years I have been having intermittent attacks and out to bring about the death of my child. These attacks are mostly in the legs and hands. Not long ago it appeared on the left side and finally in the calf of the right leg. It is now in the calf of the right leg. I have had it on and off for two or three years. I am sure I might have had some connection with angina pectoris.—A. K.

A—This is a very serious condition and does not sound at all like angina pectoris. Possibly it is a type of disturbance in one of the glands of internal secretion, or with the obstructions of the blood. It would probably take the exact cause and until this is done no one can suggest a suitable remedy.

Q—I have a small cyst on my wrist and wonder if it will appear by itself. Should it be removed by itself? I would like to see what happens.—Mrs. H.

A—An ovarian cyst will rarely disappear by itself. If small, however, it may not cause any trouble and the question of removing it by surgery depends on symptoms caused if any, age and general health which can be decided only by knowing and weighing them carefully.

**Could Manchester Afford It?**  
 Should Manchester agree that the Town Planning Commission's recommendation for turning Cottage Street and its projected extensions into a broad travel artery paralleling Main Street all the way from Cottage Street to East Center Street, with adequate parking areas included, and should Manchester also agree that, if this is done, the time is not to be left, but now, there would still be left the question of cost and financing.

There is, as yet, no accurate estimate of what the cost might be. Whenever some estimate is reached, we can be sure that it will seem too much—prohibitive, in fact.

It will seem prohibitive whether it is \$500,000, or \$1,000,000, or \$1,500,000.

And we are at a stage in our municipal history when no additional special expenditure, however sound it may be, however necessary it may be, or however productive of future town income and economic health it may seem certain to be, should be undertaken lightly. Before it spends any money on such a thing, this town has to be sold on it—sold on it rather completely.

Nevertheless, when we begin to get some trustworthy estimate of what the cost for the project might be, we will still have two questions to ask ourselves:

One will be: Can we afford to do it?  
 The other will be: Can we afford not to do it?

In other words, we will have to measure the cost to the town in dollars against the possible cost to the town which would be involved in refusing to open ourselves up to what the future is offering us.

At this stage in the proposal, there is perhaps only one idea about the cost and financing of the project which ought to be put out for discussion and consideration now. This is that this would be a project in which it would be practically obligatory—and the only fair way of proceeding—for the town to make an assessment of the benefits and damages to the town's course of action.

The project will force the town to acquire some property, for which it will have to pay a fair price to the owners. But beyond this, the project will have two effects on property values in the area it concerns.

In some instances, it may decrease the existing value of some piece of property. This could happen if the new development left a piece of property in a less favorable position than it now occupies. This would not happen very frequently in this particular project, but when it did the town would rightfully own some compensation to the property owners affected.

In many more instances, this proposition would increase the value of existing properties in varying degrees. At the present time, for instance, a lot on Main Street would be considered worth many times as much as a lot on Cottage Street. But at the present time, Cottage Street had been completed, a lot there would be increased in value many times over. In such circumstances, the proper standard practice for municipalities to assess benefits against the property in question, "Not to do so, in fact, would mean that a project financed by the taxpayers for the benefit of the whole town would have a by-product of handsome special benefits for those few property owners who happened to be in the right location. When a town improves its streets, it increases the value of certain specific properties, many times over, the town

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**Case Takes His Stand**  
 The war between the two wings of the Republican party, the conservative wing and the liberal wing, is now in full and open view in New Jersey.

As in many states, the routine nomination of a Republican candidate for the party, or at least, consider that McCarthy is somebody to be treated with political deference. But New Jersey voters have, in recent years, shown a remarkable talent for defying routine organization. Elections, when they run for office, and for electing Eisenhower to the White House, when they run in this year's Senate election, New Jersey Republicans with some urging from Washington, have nominated an out and out Eisenhower Republican, the intelligent, liberal, decent Clifford P. Case, former member of the House. He was persuaded, reportedly by the White House itself, to leave his post as head of the Foundation's Fund for the Republic in order to accept the Senate nomination.

This was fine with New Jersey Republicans who wanted to win. But the selection of Case has incurred the savage displeasure of the McCarthy forces. And there have been many reports that they are out to bring about the defeat of this Republican candidate, if they can, much as they brought about the defeat of Henry Cabot Lodge in Massachusetts in 1942.

Under these circumstances, some New Jersey Republican leaders have been advising Case to be certain to be accepted or rejected in a public statement issued last Wednesday.

The statement began with the following words:

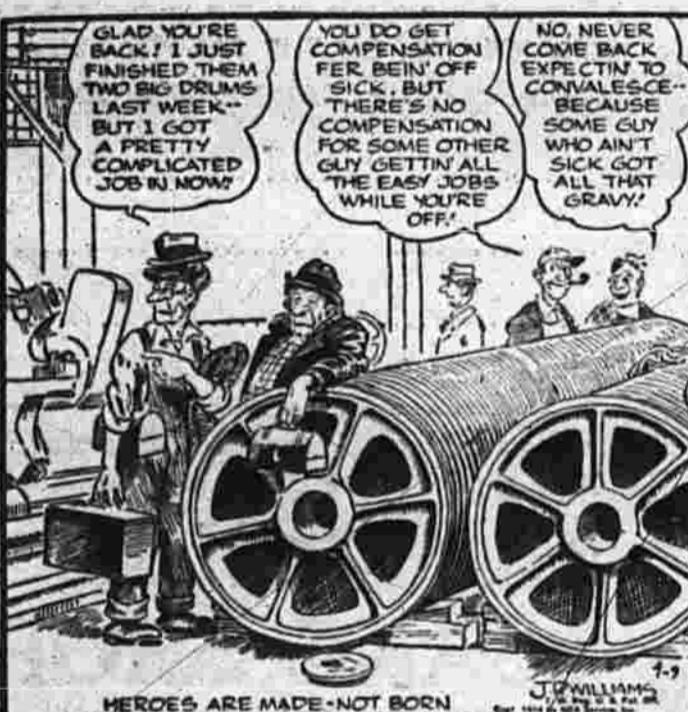

The bill, introduced by Sen. Charles McNary, R-Or., would reduce the total amount of aid to \$1.4 billion over the next five years.

Sen. McNary said the bill was necessary to reduce the federal deficit and to ensure that the aid program was self-sustaining.

French advisers are leaving the city in a hurry, and many are expected to return to France.
