Hartford, July 9 (A) - The president of the New England Asan. of Food and Drug Officials has charged the Federal Food and Drug Administration was not de its job, and he threatens to seek a congressional investigation. Harold Clark, who also is chief of the foods division of the Connecticut Food and Drug Commission, said yesterday the federal agency recently issued permits to manufacturers authorizing them to ship sub-standard and misbranded foods inter-state. Many of the foods, he said, did not meet accepted federal stand-

Clark questioned the federal authority to grant such permits and said the federal commission's relaxed regulations place a heavy bunden on the state food and drug

commissions. Asserting that many of the federal agency's functions have been curtailed by cuts in appropria-tions by Congress, Clark said the New England Asan, will pressure Representatives and Senators to get back the food and drug administration's funds.

"We will attempt to get the administration back on an even keel," he said. Clark aid New England Assn. officials will meet in Boston July 19 with M. K. Stephens, associate commissioner for the Federal Food and Drug Administration. "We will see if we can icon out some of the differences of opinion in food and drug enforcement," he

"If that fails," he added, "we will seek a congressional investigration."

WALKER URGES NEW PRISON Hartford, July 9 (P)-Ralph H. Walker, who retired last week after serving 18 years as warden of Wethersfield State Prison, is starting a campaign to bring about construction of a modern state prison. Walker says he is working on a report which will shortly be released to the public. The campaign which he will head is aimed at the 1955 State Legislature which will have to appro-priate funds for an authorized bond issue. The prison board of directors, of which Walker was a member before retirement, has retained him as consultant on plan ing the institution.
