"This responsibility for ade-quate improvements in federal-state unemployment compensation programs .... cannot be accom-plished by urging states to take action individually..... "In the 19 years that this law has been on the books, the states have failed to maintain standards adequiate to meet the newblem adequate to meet the problem. "The result has been a burden to the taxpayers by increases in the relief rolls, the exhaustion of the savings and assets of individual employes, and the lowering of individual living standards and

purchasing power." The bill, passed by the House last year, would specify for the first time that all proceeds of the federal unemployment compensa-tion fax-three-tenths of one per cent of payrolls be used for the jobless aid program. This levy in the past 19 years has yielded about a billion dollars over administrative costs. This excess has gone into general treasury funds. The bill provides that the excess, which has been running about 70 million dollars a year,
