London, July 14 (AP)—Prime Minister Churchill clashed bitterly with Clement Attlee, former Labor prime minister, today in a House of Commons debate over the seating of Communist China in the United Nations.

Tail Chasing Gives Way To 'Lead Collision' Firing

Pursuit-Style Aerial Combat, in which pilot streaked up on enemy's tail, is being replaced by "lead collision" firing. Experts for speed of modern jets like this. It stayed in style in World War II and Korea.

Yuma, Ariz. (NEA)—Every high school student with the rigor of geometry remembers early in the book this hypothesis: "Two straight lines can intersect at only one point."

Here at the Yuma Weapons Training Center, the Air Defense Command is continuing teaching along the same lines—but it is a whole new philosophy of combat called "lead collision course firing."

It involves application of the old geometric axiom to targets moving from 200 to 450 miles an hour, and planes that go 800 feet per second which launch rockets that close at 2,600 feet per second.

There is no time for blackboard pondering.

Col. Robert F. Worley, of Chino, Kan., has converted Yuma to rockets in less than a year, and the USAF has just run its first rocketry competition in history here. As commander of the Weapons Training Center, Col. Worley explains "lead collision course" this way:

"It's the same basic idea as that employed by the third baseman when he catches a hard hit ball and makes the play to first," he says. "He throws to the bag because he knows the first baseman will be there when the ball arrives."

"One day the days of old when the intrepid aviator snatched on the tail of his enemy, and made a Swiss cheese out of him from an easy rearward position.

Now, the jet approaches from right angles to the course of the target, which protects the attacker by providing a bare minimum of exposure to the weapons of his target."

The switch came about to meet the requirements for "all-weather and day-night fighter-interceptor," as the U. S. has become more and more concerned with the ever-the-North Pole highway route available in the 30's. The Union and pointed painfully into the vitals of this country.

The 2.75 rocket, a slightly blast-rod, yard-long gas-pipe pointed at one end and fuser at the other, is the weapon. A hit from one of these will destroy any aircraft in the world. It has the blast equivalent of a 75-millimeter artillery shell, and is referred to as the barely subsonic world of its employment as the "Mighty Mouse."

Major James Jabara, the world's first jet ace and No. 1 MIG-biller in Korea, is on the staff of the Yuma Weapons Center and remembers his geometry days in Wichita, Kan., high school as something like pure torture.

The Doctor Says

New Methods of Treatment Aid Osteomyelitis Sufferers

Osteomyelitis is an infection involving the bones. Several kinds of germs can cause osteomyelitis, but those known as "staphylococci" are the most common agents.

Generally, these germs are believed to be carried from other parts of the body originally; injury to the bone sometimes appears to weaken it, allowing osteomyelitis to get started.

We know that osteomyelitis has plagued human beings since before the days of recorded history. Although osteomyelitis is still with us, improved surgical methods and the use of the antibiotics and sulfas drugs have proved an enormous value in successful treatment.

At this point, it is well to reply to Mrs. P. and say that osteomyelitis is not contagious and that cold weather has little or no effect on the course of the disease.

Until a few hundred years ago severe osteomyelitis held its own in one limb, which was often the case — was usually treated by amputation.

In these days, also, the disease was surrounded by superstition, and repulsive applications were commonly used in the way of treatment.

Maggots were commonly used in the treatment of osteomyelitis in the past because maggots eat only dead tissue and, therefore, were used to clean up the dead bone.

No one is attracted by the idea of maggots eating on the flesh, even when the flesh is dead, but even today this treatment is occasionally employed.

The many surgical treatments used over the years all were aimed at destroying or removing the dead bone and putting in a newly-formed pus to drain to the surface. Ingenious instruments for boring into the bone and scraping out all of the infected matter have been devised.

By using the new antibiotics it has become possible to save many people with osteomyelitis from months or even years of hospitalization and repeated surgery.

Like so many other diseases, early treatment is of the utmost importance. Surgery is still necessary for some and the disease may drag on with discouraging persistence or flare up without apparent reason.

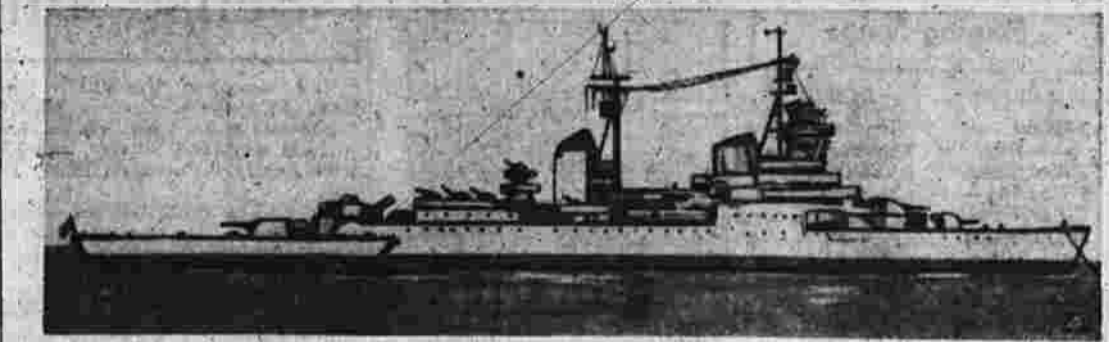
