## Men Learn War Arts At Niantic

A collection of some 550 carpenters and salesmen, insurance agents and teachers, businessmen and students are scrunching through the woods and fields around Niantic this week, trying to learn as much as possible of the basic arts of war.

Although for 50 weeks of the year as peaceful and unwarlike as the man sitting at the next desk or working on the next machine, they have since Aug. 7 been learning how to take and hold an enemy strong point, how to protect themselves in combat and how to kill and destroy with rifles, mortars and rockets.

They are the men of 166th Regiment of Connecticut's 43rd National Guard Division, and among them are two Manchester companies—Company A and Headquarters and Headquarters Company, First Battalion, which number in their ranks about 50 men from this and surrounding towns.

Two weeks ago tomorrow, the men of the 166th kissed their wives and families goodbye and boarded trucks in front of state armories throughout the state for two weeks of summer training at Camp Lodge, Niantic, a handsome, well-kept base with rich green parade grounds and rows of neat white barracks bordering the road that winds around the post.

Heading Home Tomorrow  
The men today are winding up their training and preparing to leave, and tomorrow they will be heading for home. For most of them, these two weeks have consumed the only summer vacation they are going to get from their jobs. Others, who were unable to pick their vacations when they wanted them or who weren't given two weeks off, actually had to attend summer camp.

But to the Guardsmen, generally, it's been worth it for the training, which has been conducted in grim earnestness, has been good—both officers and men agreed to that, although the intensity of it has produced the gripes without which no military establishment could be complete.

"They are trying to do in two weeks what a soldier takes a month," one non-com, a seven-year veteran, said. "It's tough on the new men, giving them training like that to start with."

Despite these intermittent grumblings and rumblings, however, morale among the men has been high, according to Major Ernest Larson, 19 Rosemary Pl., who is regimental intelligence officer. "Those I talked to have enjoyed camp," he said. "They have plenty of free time—from 4:30 to 6:30."

Drill and Lectures  
The outfit's stiff training regimen started last week at Camp Lodge with plenty of close-order drill and open-air lectures and demonstrations on the things a soldier has to know. The line outfits were taught how to wield a bayonet, how to creep and crawl under fire, and how to protect themselves.

Meanwhile, the headquarters units, whose work is more specialized, were getting training in communications—how to lay wires and use field telephones and operate field switchboards.

the afternoon when they finish training, to revivify the next morning at 6 a.m.—and, he added, "the show has been excellent."

Larson, who is a veteran of World War II, and saw service in Germany when the 43rd was federalized in 1950, agreed that the men have been working hard in their training, but said the experience would be beneficial.

And a 22-year-old sergeant, first class, Charles E. Marcel, of 47 Avondale Rd., agreed with this view during a break in a lecture on rifle-squad tactics that was being held in the bivouac area of Stone's Ranch, about six miles from Camp Lodge.

"We've been getting quite a bit accomplished here," Marcel, who is a tool-maker by trade, said. "We've had a lot of instruction, and here, on bivouac, we're getting a chance to apply it."

Drill and Lectures  
The outfit's stiff training regimen started last week at Camp Lodge with plenty of close-order drill and open-air lectures and demonstrations on the things a soldier has to know. The line outfits were taught how to wield a bayonet, how to creep and crawl under fire, and how to protect themselves.

Meanwhile, the headquarters units, whose work is more specialized, were getting training in communications—how to lay wires and use field telephones and operate field switchboards.

Monday and Tuesday of this week, the Manchester units moved out to a firing range in East Haven where they actually fired the weapons they had been discussing and learning about during the first week—the M1 rifle, the 50 cal. machine gun, the 57 and 75 mm. recoilless rifles which are used against armor, and the 3.5-inch rocket launcher.

After returning from East Haven, the Manchester Companies, on Wednesday morning, hiked the six miles to the state military reservation at Stone's Ranch, 1,700 acres of heavily wooded terrain and rolling fields for two days of bivouac and field training.

Here they attacked "enemy" positions and when the charge was over, were told what they had done wrong, as well as right; they slept in the open in pup tents and ate at field kitchens.

They dug foxholes with their short-handled, sharp-edged spades to set up defense perimeters to stand off an aggressor's attack; and Wednesday night, after a day of work in the field, they were out on a night problem, from 8 until 11 p. m., scouting the heavy woods of Stone's Ranch for signs of an "enemy."

## State Taxes Total Over 121 Million

Hartford, Aug. 20 (AP)—Connecticut collected \$121,653,176 in taxes during the fiscal year which ended June 30, 1953, but the rate of some taxes, notably the sales tax, was higher last year.

The 1953 Legislature increased the rate of the sales tax from two per cent to three per cent.

Commissioner Connelly also reported tax collections of \$7,202,455 for last month, an increase of \$172,229 over July, 1953. The monthly report does not include sales tax figures since they are reported quarterly.

## Quintuplet's Death Ruled Accidental

St. Agathe, Que., Aug. 20 (AP)—The coroner's jury investigating Emile Dionne's death has sent Quebec's attorney general a report which reportedly makes recommendations about proper medical care.

The jury ruled last night that the 20-year-old quintuplet died accidentally.

The report was not published, but Coroner Thibault said it contained recommendations dealing especially with the Roman Catholic hospital for the aged where Emile died Aug. 6 while preparing for entry into a Catholic lay order.

Emile died intubated in his bed after suffering three epileptic seizures. The third came while the hospital personnel were discussing the case.

The jury found that death was due to suffocation during a seizure after hearing testimony from nurses at the hospital and from the provincial medical-legal expert, Dr. Reneau Fontaine, who agreed there was no criminal responsibility. The doctor said he "accidentally suffocated in his pillow."

## West Berlin Police Arrest Red Judge

Berlin, Aug. 20 (AP)—West Berlin police announced today they have arrested an East German judge who fled to the Communist zone and applied for asylum.

They identified the fugitive as Willi Bostelmann, 47-year-old "people's judge" and prosecutor for the last seven years at Greifswald.

He left the Soviet zone to avoid arrest by the Communist State Security Police, the West Berlin police said.

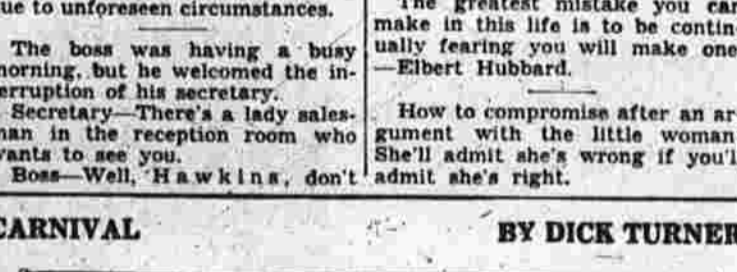
