The voters of Manchester are entitled to know exactly what programs the political parties support for the Town of Manchester. The Democratic Party pledges a progressive, intelligent, alert and planned administration.

1. We favor the adoption of a merit system whereby employment and promotions are made fairly and justly without regard to favoritism and without thought of political gain.
 - a. A personnel Appeal Board should be established as the final authority on employe relations.
 - b. At the present time, political activity is prohibited on the part of the police department employes only. It should be extended to include all town employes.
2. We believe that the long term capital improvements plan for the Town of Manchester should be revaluated immediately and actively accelerated to keep pace with the growth of the town.
 - a. A lack of foresight on the part of and lack of coordination between the Town Planning Commission, the Zoning Board of Appeals, the Town Development Commission and the Board of Directors has hindered the economic growth of the Town of Manchester and has already caused costly solutions to such problems as parking, street widening, sewage disposal, water facilities and drainage.
 - b. We recommend an intensive study of the water, sewer and fire protection problems for the Town of Manchester.
 - c. We recommend that a separate bi-partisan water and sewer commission be established to do the work now done by the Board of Directors sitting as a Water and Sewer Commission.
3. We favor the adoption of a merit system whereby employment and promotions are made fairly and justly without regard to favoritism and without thought of political gain.
 - a. To keep the necessary water rate increase to a minimum an examination should be made of the possible savings to be had in meeting with The Manchester Water Company, incorporating into the Metropolitan District and acquiring other sources of water supply.

 - c. The consolidation of the fire districts is closely related to the solution of the water problem and should be planned at the same time.
4. We advocate placing the office of Town Clerk on a fair salary basis instead of the present outmoded fee system.
5. No town auditor should be appointed to serve for more than four consecutive years. Manchester will benefit from other financial analyses.
6. We believe that many of the departments now doing similar or correlated work should be consolidated into one department.
7. We favor a change in the Town's fiscal year so as to eliminate the annual borrowing of money in anticipation of taxes.
8. We believe that our school building program has been unduly delayed. We favor an aggressive and intelligent administration of an economical school building program.
9. The manager, form of government is based upon a division between the executive and legislative functions. This division should be recognized.
10. We advocate minority representation on all local boards and commissions in order to obtain a broader outlook on the problems confronting Manchester.

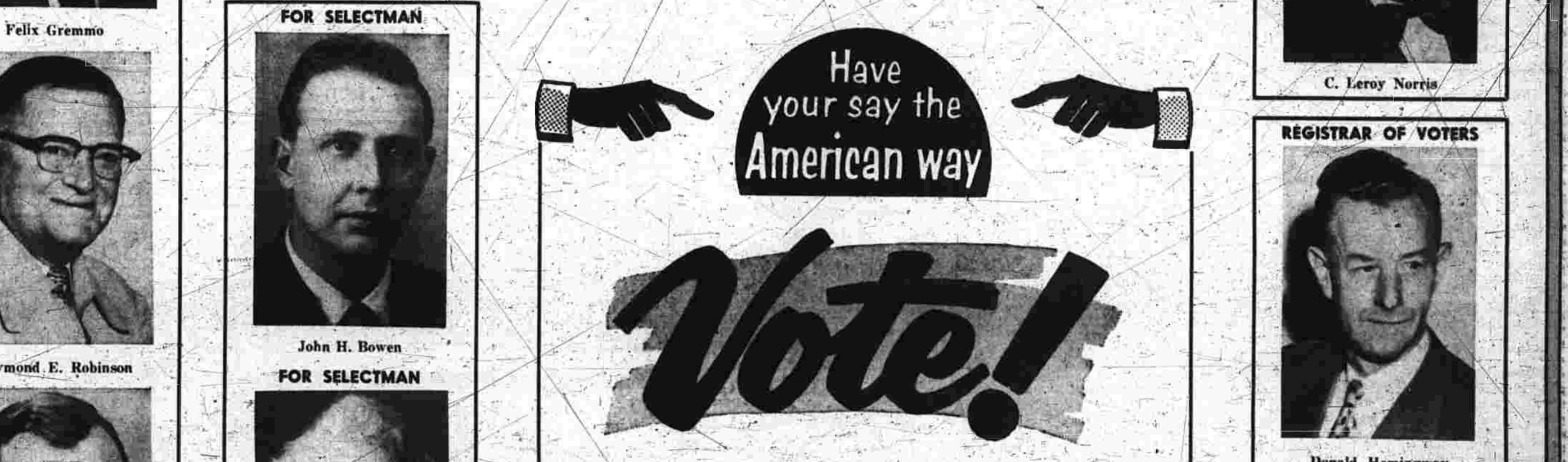

Cordeil Hull Notes 83rd Anniversary

Washington, Oct. 2 (AP)—Former Secretary of State Cordeil Hull observes his 83rd birthday today in the quiet of a hospital room—his 83rd birthday and the 10th anniversary of his retirement from the cabinet of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Hull, who Roosevelt once called the father of the United States, left his State Dept. desk on Oct. 2, 1944 for what he believed would be a year. He never went back to work. After some weeks Roosevelt accepted his resignation.

Hull's health grew worse and friends doubted then he would survive for very long. But he recovered to leave the hospital after many months.

Since then, he has passed through several periods of severe illness. He suffers from high blood pressure and other ailments of advancing age.

Mrs. Hull died last March. Hull continued to live in his hotel apartment until June when he entered the Naval Hospital at Bethesda, Md.

He had a slight stroke there on July 11 and in recent weeks had been too weak to receive visitors.
