specifically has proposed creation of a State commerce department. Republicans have insisted that Lodge, assigning for reelection in light of the problem and that the development commission has been given a good job.

Arguing Non-Partisanship
On the subject of politics, Collins urged a policy of non-partisanship and said that the federation has "received good treatment from both parties at the State Capitol."

During the past year, Collins which has drawn its population from all parts of the nation, has been a barometer of what has followed in the national elections. "Voters will be choosing a delegate to Congress, a legislative labor commissioner, a treasurer, and nine members of the 16-seat Senate."
Two opponents for the non-voting seat in Congress are E. L. (Bob) Bartlett, the incumbent Democrat, and Mrs. Barbara D. Deming, a Republican legislator.
Democrats have held the Congress seat continuously since 1932, with the margin of victory varying along with the political trend of the legislature.
Prominent issues in the Bartlett-Deming contest have been over which party has done the most for the statehood issue and which has done best in Alaska in allocation of Federal funds.

most due northward toward the eastern and of Cuba about 100 miles away.
Hazel now is 670 miles southeast of Miami. The Weather Bureau said there is only a slim chance that it will curve toward the mainland, but the possibility has not been ruled out.
After Cuba, the next land area in the path of the hurricane, if it continues its present course, will be the southeastern Bahamas Islands. These islands were warned to prepare for winds ranging from gale to hurricane force tonight or tomorrow.
Forecasters believe the mountain ranges of Southwestern Haiti may have disrupted the circulation of the hurricane to some extent. It is expected to reform and regain its power over the waters of the windward passage. The mountain ranges will interfere with the "whirling" movement of the storm.
A heavy rain was reported by the hurricane and some rain turned out of its path.

Through the night, only sounds heard from the cell block were occasional shouts, the faint of breaking glass, and the steady clanging of a typewriter.

Coventry, Oct. 12 (Special)—The revision of the town's insurance policy is expected to be completed by the Board of Finance with consent and cooperation by the Board of Education and Board of Selectmen.
The town-wide insurance survey has been completed. As a result, the Board of Finance will be able to present a revised policy to the Board of Selectmen.
The survey was conducted by C. C. Goodrich, a professional insurance advisor who is well known for his work in other towns. He was engaged to analyze the current status of the town's insurance coverage and to recommend the proper handling of the insurance program.
The results of the survey, according to Goodrich, indicate that an insurance advisory committee should be formed. This committee would consist of one member each from the Board of Selectmen, education and finance, and two career insurance men. They would be charged with the full responsibility of seeing that the town's insurance coverage is adequate, that insurance policies be revised as needed, and that the town's insurance program be handled directly with the insurance companies involved.
