### 1,100 Miners Vote To Return to Jobs

Washington, Pa., Oct. 13 (AP)—Eleven hundred miners at the U.S. Steel Corp.'s Robena Mine voted unanimously to return to work today, ending a two-day walkout which ended a dispute with the company over seniority.

A three-man United Mine Workers committee, headed by UMW President John L. Lewis, Monday in a dispute with the company over seniority will be active with the company.

The strike ties up 14 other mines in southwestern Pennsylvania as workers from Robena set up picket lines at the other pits. Nine mines owned by U.S. Steel were closed. The company said it produced about 48,000 tons of coal daily. The six other pits turned out an estimated 20 to 30 thousand tons a day.

Most of the mines were scheduled to work five days this week. A few of the mines are scheduled for four days of work.

Albert J. Cavalcante, president of the Robena Local, met with the three UMW commissioners and William Ryan, president of the UMW district 4, which has jurisdiction over most of the affected mines.

The dispute over which the Robena workers struck involved transfer of workers to Robena from other U.S. Steel operations in the area. The Robena Local said the company violated the provisions of the contract in recent promotions. The company denied the violation.

Robena is the world's largest mechanized coal mine.

# Behind School Bus Wheel 10 Years Mrs. Lee Knows All Her Passengers

Bolton (Special)—Back in October of 1944, an energetic mother thought it would be interesting to take a trip at driving a school bus. After ten years behind the wheel of the familiar yellow and black vehicle, Mrs. Laura Lee has not lost one iota of her enthusiasm.

"It doesn't seem as though it has been 10 years, but when I look around and realize that many of my first passengers are now mothers and fathers themselves the proof is before me."

Each day Mrs. Lee makes three round trips to and from the Elementary School and covers nearly 50 miles a day. Her bus holds 45 passengers and is filled on every journey.

Children Wonderful  
Mrs. Lee describes the children of town with one word, "Wonderful." Discipline is never a problem for her. The children are always little ladies and gentlemen.

She recalls that only once during her long term as a driver did she call a parent to report on a child. "He quieted down after his parents spoke to me and we didn't have any more trouble."

Though most of the youngsters today look forward to entering first grade, Mrs. Lee tells about one little fellow who was a problem for her. "The first morning when he got on the bus, he cried every morning the first few weeks and that when it ceased at the end of the first week. He was getting adjusted to the change in his life. He got a black eye while playing at home. The tears started again. He didn't want the others at school to see the eye and he cried every day. Only this week has he come aboard silently."

And Laugh Too  
Mrs. Lee, though not obliged to, often picks up students who are in clubs and stay in her house. She does this when returning home past the school after her final afternoon stop.

To one and all, the friendly driver is "Mrs. Lee." She has a black one of her nephews said.

"Miss Lee if you are my aunt, why isn't 'Swank' my uncle?" The child referring to Eino Swanson one of the other veteran drivers who is no relation to Mrs. Lee.

When Mrs. Lee started driving the school bus in 1944 the town had four small schools. The amalgamation to one school in 1949 has helped her as well as the students and educators.

While other women might shy away from wheeling a bus around town every day, it is nothing extraordinary to Mrs. Lee. One of a perfect driving record, she drives in "Mrs. Lee" style. She has been back to when she was 10 years old.

At that time she drove her father's truck and has been driving carefully ever since.

Good Morning  
"Every child who boards the Lee bus politely says, 'Good morning, Miss Lee' and at Christmas the children show their appreciation for the female pilot by showing her with all kinds of gifts."

Last year she received more than a hundred Christmas cards from the voters and proudly put them on display in her home. She does not account for the fact that she is able to call every one of her passengers by their first name.

One dismal note struck by the cheerful lady was the failure of cars to obey the law to stop when the school bus is stopped. She reports that on the side roads in town where lawbreakers are trying to pass her.

Mothers welcome the bus every morning and are happy to see Mrs. Lee in the driver's seat. One summed it up by saying, "I feel safer with her driving my child."

### World War II Ace Is Killed Testing Plane

Lancaster, Calif., Oct. 13 (AP)—Quiet, self-spoiled George Welch, World War II triple ace who shot down four Japanese planes at Pearl Harbor, lost his life yesterday while testing a new plane high above the Mojave Desert.

Just what happened to his P-10C jet super Sabre isn't known. Witnesses said it exploded with a terrific blast and plummeted to the ground like a ball of fire. But officials at North American Aviation, Inc., where Welch was chief pilot, said the blast might have been a "mishap" caused when a jet pulls out of a dive at high speed.

Welch, 38, managed to eject himself from the plane and parachuted, landing about two miles from where his plane crashed. But he was suffering from multiple injuries and was dead on arrival by helicopter at Edwards Air Force Base.

The plane crashed about 45 miles north of Los Angeles.

It was the same design that another triple ace, Capt. Joseph McConnell, was killed in a plane crash last Aug. 25 during a training mission. McConnell has shot down 18 enemy planes in Korea to become the nation's first triple ace with jets.

When the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor Dec. 7, 1941, Welch, then a 23-year-old second lieutenant, became a national hero. He drove 10 miles from his home town, Wilmington, Del., to the field to join an auxiliary field, commanded a P-40, took to the air and shot down four Japanese fighters. Only five other American pilots were able to get into the air that day against the enemy.

Welch's Pearl Harbor valor brought him the Distinguished Service Cross, presented by President Franklin D. Roosevelt. His home town, Wilmington, Del., fashioned a special medal of honor for him and his portrait hangs in the State House at Dover.

Ragged 18 Pounds  
From Pearl Harbor the sandy-haired hero went on to become a triple ace during World War II, with a total bag of 18 planes. He also won the Distinguished Flying Cross, Silver Star, Air Medal and a Presidential Unit Citation during 33 months of combat duty in the central and southwest Pacific. He became a major in the U. S. Air Force.

Welch, slight, easy-going and weighing only about 140 pounds, had been testing North American planes since 1946. He test flew a P-100 in May last year and twice

being about Puerto Rico's independence from Spain and violence and armed revolution.

In his summation before the jury, U. S. Atty. J. Edward Lumbard declared, "Every one of these defendants has his moral responsibility on the guns that were used in Washington, and those who participated were praised as martyrs."

Defense attorneys claimed that the Congress shooting and the attempt to assassinate Truman were actions by individual Nationalists and not a conspiracy. They said the prosecution used the congressional shooting to "infect the minds of the jurors."

Several defendants had testified during the trial that they had no idea when they joined the party that it intended violence or gunplay.

In his charge to the jury, Walsh said any defendant must be acquitted if the jury believed he did not know that force and violence were to be used.

He added, however, that if the jury was satisfied beyond reasonable doubt that a defendant conspired to use force and violence in securing Puerto Rico's independence, he must be found guilty.

The jurors returned their verdicts about four hours after they left the courtroom to deliberate the case. The trial started Sept. 6.





### Lattimore Case Judge Accused Of 'Prejudice'

It has been tentatively set for Jan. 10. He is accused of lying when he swore to a Senate Committee that he was never a follower of the Communist party line or a promoter of Communism.

Youngdahl declined to comment on Rover's action. Court officials said they will wait until the judge has decided for himself whether to take himself out of the Lattimore case. If he should fail to do so, Rover could ask the U.S. Court of Appeals for an order directing Youngdahl to disqualify himself.

Youngdahl is a former State Republican governor of Minnesota. He was appointed to the Minnesota Supreme Court when he was appointed to the federal bench by former President Truman.

Rover has filed an affidavit on Youngdahl's rulings and comments several months ago on a defendant's motion to throw out the original indictment against Lattimore.

Youngdahl dismissed four of the seven counts of the original 1952 indictment. Two subsequently were reinstated by the court of appeals.

Last week Lattimore was indicted again.

Rover said he "has the greatest respect for the honor and integrity of Youngdahl but said Youngdahl has a fixed opinion that Lattimore is innocent of the charges."

Rover particularly objected to Youngdahl's statement that the three counts against Lattimore which he sustained were of doubtful merit.

Statement Defends Judge

The Arnold - Fortas - Porter statement said the Lattimore case was a "prejudice-free" case. "We are immediately filing a motion for the return of the case to the U. S. Attorney against Judge Youngdahl. The motion will state: 'The affidavit is a bald and undignified attack on the decision of Judge Youngdahl dismissing the first count in the original indictment of Owen Lattimore. That decision was affirmed by an 8-1 vote of the judges of the Court of Appeals.'"

The statements in the affidavit concerning the alleged bias of Judge Youngdahl are scandalous.

The affidavit is in plain defiance of the federal laws, which hold that a judge may not be disqualified because of personal bias or prejudice. It is an attempt to manipulate the administration of justice and an effort to subordinate the judiciary to the prosecuting arm of the government.

"Our motion will also ask that the court admonish the United States Attorney for abuse of process."

"Because of the grave implications to our legal process of the United States Attorney's action as set out in our motion, we are requesting an immediate conference with the Attorney General."

The Philippine proposal would duplicate a procedure followed in 1953 when the U.S. Navy released its arms debate for two weeks while a subcommittee composed of Assembly President J. Paddis, Nervo of Mexico and the Big Four delegates studied the various proposals then before the assembly.

The chief new proposal under consideration at present is Russian insistence on the disarmament of the British-French command in the disarmament.

The western powers have been pressing Vishinsky to clarify the proposal in an effort to find out how far Russia plans to go toward agreement with western proposals. Vishinsky has declared that Russia will not begin a disarmament until an immediate ban on nuclear weapons.

But he also has voiced disagreement with U. S. insistence for interim action by the U. N. Security Council, in which the Russians are a permanent member.

Vishinsky has veto power. He has also vetoed making any final committee on how far Russia would be willing to go in allowing on-the-spot inspection of the arms.

"When pressed on this point yesterday by U. S. Delegate James A. Wadsworth, Vishinsky said Russia favored inspection 'to the point necessary to insure the implementation of the disarmament plan.'"

Wadsworth retorted that in the light of Vishinsky's earlier remarks, any country could frustrate disarmament inspectors by making "off limits" signs on any factories they chose.

### Rodeo Test of Athletic Skill; Contestant Must Win to Eat

New York (NEA)—I got nervous," Willie Ketchum, the fight manager, was saying.

"I'm standing here, like I always do, holding down the side of the hood of my overalls and thinking I'm far from home. Out in the west some place. I'm a little nervous."

But it takes little questioning to find out that wrestling a steer, holding on to a wild bucking brabham bull or roping a calf is as fine a test of athletic skill as can be found.

"We are in this for a living, 50 weeks a year," points out Lex Conley, who is an officer of the Rodeo Cowboys Association and a contestant in every Rodeo he can get himself to.

The life of a contestant is the same as that of a tournament trail rider.

It starts, as a rule, in Denver during the first week of January. From there, the trail and lean cowboy hit a trail which takes them to Houston and Amarillo and Fort Worth and El Paso, then up to such spots as Sydney, Ia., and Caldwell, Id.

**Big Indoor Season**

After that comes the big indoor season. It opens at Madison Square Garden, Boston, Chicago, Detroit and San Francisco indoor arenas are on the list.

"We go along," Conley says, "winning here, losing there. When you are losing, you borrow. If you don't win in this business, you know, you don't eat. We pay all our own expenses to the contest and the only way we make anything is by winning. You've got to win."

Some of them come out of it with big money—for a time, anyway. Take Bill Underman, for example. He has held the world title for as long as 15 years. He has won 15,000 times and earned as much as \$50,000 in one season.
