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Farm Price Issue Key To Iowa Election Race

Des Moines, Oct. 18 (AP)—The price of farm and agri—ham on the farm is the key issue in the important election day factor in Iowa.

In the nation's greatest hog producing state, the farmer is getting for his hogs what his cost stay up. His wife frequently can't break even on the acre she uses to raise corn and household money. Most eggs are bringing 16 to 18 cents a dozen and that's far less than the price of a year ago.

Farmers' groups are talking even though they aren't grumbling loudly or saying much about politics or political reprisals, neither farmers nor farm wives are exactly happy about this turn in their financial affairs.

As a result the Democrats expect to profit at the polls and GOP losses are expected to be heavy.

Some Democrats are signs that some sort of a Democratic trend may be under way in this part of the farm belt.

It might do no more than cut down the margins of victory. A tide of unpopularity and some real political upsets would be needed for the Democrats to shake any Republican out of office in the House seats and the gubernatorial mansion.

Yet some Democrats do profess a glimmering hope for electing a Democratic House in 1954.

They are no longer the expect to keep Democrats out of the House. They are now hoping to win the seat of a former governor and U.S. Senator; though is the State's economy general.

London Act Gives Bonn New Fleet

Bremen, Germany, Oct. 19 (AP)—West Germany may be able to take to the seas 24 hours after final ratification of the London rearmament agreement—thanks to the U. S. Navy.

Library Aid Boost Urged for State

Hartford, Oct. 19 (SP)—Greater State and local financial aid for libraries was recommended today by a special State Committee on Rural Public Libraries. The committee, headed by State Senator Charles McKone of Cheshire, said the present program is hampered by a "scanty" \$400,000 annual budget and by restrictions forbidding towns from contributing more to their libraries. A trial \$500,000 State-supported supplementary library service in the Middlesex County area to assist the 26 libraries and the 40 schools. He concluded his speech by expressing his confidence in the future of the United Nations, and by calling for a renewed commitment to the principles of international cooperation and peace.

Ormsby-Gore's speech was well received by the audience, and he was applauded throughout. He is expected to return to the United Kingdom shortly.
