

John Lodge a happy birthday and gave him a Presidential pat on the back in his bid for reelection today at the governor's mammoth, outdoor birthday party at Bushnell Park.

The President. The President of the Park from Trinity College where he received an honorary degree, appeared relaxed and cheerful when he stepped to the public address system microphones. "After that introduction." he said, "my natural question is, Well, whose birthday is this any-

Bushnell Park.

"I came up here to tell you what a great governor you have," the President told the crowd, estimated at 60,000, which had assembled in the park across from the Statler Hotel.

Then, looking over the crowd, he said that this outpouring of Connecticut residents "means that in the estimation of all these people he, as the first citizen of your state, does a worthy job in your service.

President Eisenhower, speaking off the cuff in a ceremony that lasted just under half an hour, said the governor had been given something more valuable on this, his 51st birthday, "than gold or silver or anything material."

"The affection that inspired this gathering I venture to say, is the most valuable commodity—unseen."

He was greeted warmly by the crowd and received another burst of applause when he said: "I came up here to tell you a little bit of what a great governor you have."

Then he added, "I never, I think, said happy birthday to anyone in front of such a big crowd, and I can't sing happy birthday, so I have to stick to the woords."

He also paid the governor a compliment on his youthful appearance, saying he was "astonished that Gov. Lodge is 51. He looks to me, 41."

In his introductory remarks, Gov. Lodge said he was "deeply touched" by the turnout and added, "I can live a long time and never have another birthday like this one."


