Rocky Mountain Region Seen Costing GOP Seats

(Editor's note: This is another edition of a series of summaries of reports by voting associates of the Rocky Mountain region in various sections of the country.)

Denver, Oct. 28 (AP)—President Eisenhower's popularity and campaign effectiveness are matched against apparent economic disquiet in what now looks like an uphill Republican battle for Senate and House seats in eight southwestern and Rocky Mountain states.

The Appeals Needed

These unimpaired appeals by Eisenhower for a Republican Congress change voted sentiment in the few days before the Nov. 2 election. Democrats could gain two Senate and four House seats in these states Eisenhower carried handily two years ago.

The eight states are Oklahoma, New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado, Wyoming, Utah, Idaho and Montana. All except Utah and Arizona are electing Senators this year, with four Democratic and two GOP seats at stake.

Twelve Democratic and nine Republican House seats are being contested as are five governorships held by Republicans and one by a Democrat. Democrats now are reported leading in all but one of the governor contests.

Eisenhower evidently retains most of the strength he demonstrated in this area in 1952 when he swept all eight states by a margin of 500,000 votes over his Democratic opponent, Adlai E. Stevenson.

Republicans in all of these states have been leading heavily on the demonstrated Eisenhower popularity.

But if remains doubtful whether the continued high tide prestige of the President—which has disrupted seriously by the Democratic effort which seems on the wane to be a Democratic trend.

Some Republican politicians say privately they are convinced they could have pulled the situation out of the fire if Eisenhower had done even a limited measure of the kind of on-the-spot personal campaigning that former President Harry S. Truman did in 1948.

Eisenhower's \$200,000 campaign and what vacation in Denver gave Colorado Republicans a new point of view as they talk up the possibility of a Senate seat for the state, which was won by the late President.

Republicans everywhere in the area have been drumming the results on the radio. They are limited to the radio in the Rocky Mountain area reached by television. This "don't-care" attitude could be translated into a relatively few votes which would seem to favor the incumbents. On the other hand, it may represent a reluctance—starkly displayed by farmers in some areas—to talk about what they are going to do at the polls.

At this writing, five days before the election, here is the consensus of professional political opinion in the area to which he calls the virtues of the administration's attack on price support program. He has been under strong attack by Democratic Sen. Robert S. Kerr, who seems well on the way to reelection in Oklahoma.

Montana Republicans, including Gov. J. Hugo Aronson, regard Benson's appearance in that state as likely to be greatly beneficial to GOP candidates there. Benson's prestige is high in Utah and in some parts of Idaho.

But the Agriculture Secretary was among the missing when Republican speakers were invited into New Mexico where Democratic Sen. Clinton F. Anderson is given the edge over Republican Gov. Edwin L. Mechem in that state's Senate race. However, Anderson is one Democrat who supported the flexible support program when it went through Congress this year.

While there have been charges about "codding Communists" in the bitter Montana senatorial battle, the Red-in-government issue nowhere seems to be dominant. Republican Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy of Wisconsin seems to be pretty much the forgotten man of the campaign in this area, although he evidently has strong support in such states as Montana.

Democrats Better Known

Democrats on the whole have candidates with better-known names than Republicans and many of the races are revolving around personalities and local issues.

Without openly forecasting an economic downturn, Democrats in all of the states have been talking about what they claim is a somewhat lower level of business, employment and farm income this year than last. As one politician put it in talking to this reporter: "Everybody seems to be getting along pretty well but thinks he ought to be getting better."

But President Eisenhower and Secretary of Labor Mitchell this week asserted that 1954 has been the most prosperous peacetime year in our history.

Jury Awards Trio \$12,500

Chappans Injured in Two-Car Crash Five Years Ago in Vernon Three members of a local family were awarded \$12,500 by a Superior Court jury yesterday at the conclusion of an eight-day damage suit trial that resulted from a two-car accident in Vernon five years ago.

Mrs. Betty Chapman of 44 Duane St. was granted \$10,000 for her 11-year-old daughter, Nadine, 27, and Mrs. Chapman's brother, Floyd Mayo, of Vernon, \$200 after five hours of deliberation by the jury.

All three, who claimed to have suffered injuries in the accident, brought suit against Harry Street of 28 Putnam St. and William H. Letton of Vernon. Mrs. Chapman and her daughter were in a car being driven by Mayo when it crashed head-on into one operated by Letton on Putnam Road in Vernon, July 19, 1949.

Street was brought in as a co-defendant on the ground that he was considered an operator of the car at the time of the accident. He had parked his truck on the highway and Letton was forced to swing his car around it.

In doing so, he crossed over into the opposite lane of traffic and caused the accident. Street, Floyd Mayo's father, Alfred, who was driver of the other car, was awarded \$250 damages by the jury. The claim injuries Mrs. Chapman reportedly led to a cerebral hemorrhage which resulted in her death and then while Mayo injured his nose.

Because of the large number of plaintiffs and defendants, the jury was faced with 19 possible verdicts. The largest number any juror had to pick from in the memory of the court was 19.

The case was tried before Judge John Thim. All of the plaintiffs were represented by H. W. B. Robinson of Rutland and LaBelle, and the defendants were represented by Atty. S. Victor Paigold of Hartford and the Hartford law firm of Day, Berry and Howard.

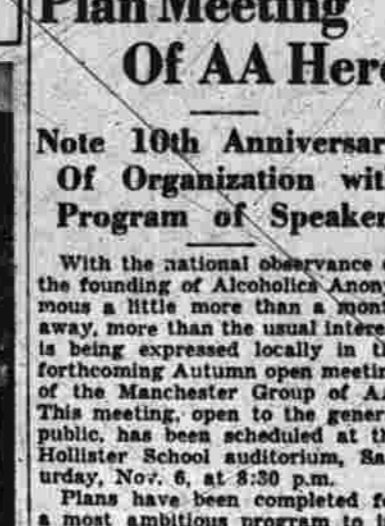

Board Tables Hike in Rates



Faced with a legal opinion by Town Counsel Charles H. Crockett which inhibited the Board of Water Commissioners from approving an interim hike in water rates pending more study of the rate structure, that group tabled the increase question last night at the meeting of General Manager Richard Martin.

The Board also passed a motion requesting further study of the rate hikes by Martin and town personnel and asked the manager to report to the new Board of Water Commissioners at its second meeting.

The action came at an adjourned special meeting which got underway at 7 p. m. at the hearing room of the Municipal Building.

The meeting was a continuation of one Tuesday night at Vespianck School when the group adjourned after a question was raised as to the legality of setting an interim hike in rates after a public hearing had been held on a general vote of 40 per cent in water charges.

The Town Council Crockett ruled late yesterday that the lower interim hike out of the question. The Board tabled the matter. Director Helen Fitzpatrick, Matthew Paton, and Sherwood Bowers opposed tabling and argued in favor of increasing the rates, a move they felt was necessary.

No specific mention was made last night of joining the Metropolitan District, a subject which dominated the public discussion at the hearing Tuesday.

After the formal action had been taken, the Board continued informally to discuss the rates. Martin again reviewed the proposed tabling and their effect on customers. Directors Fitzpatrick and Kennedy repeated their assertions of Tuesday that the increases are inevitable since the town would build a new sewage disposal plant or face action by the State Water Commission.

While the proposed rates provide in general for a 40 per cent increase in the water bill, they also call for an increase from 20 to 50 per cent of the amount computed on the water bill as a sewer rental.

For most customers who buy water from the town and use its sewer service, the "best" in that combined bill would be 62 per cent. For some large users the increase would be greater.

The schedule also calls for some charges which are not now made.

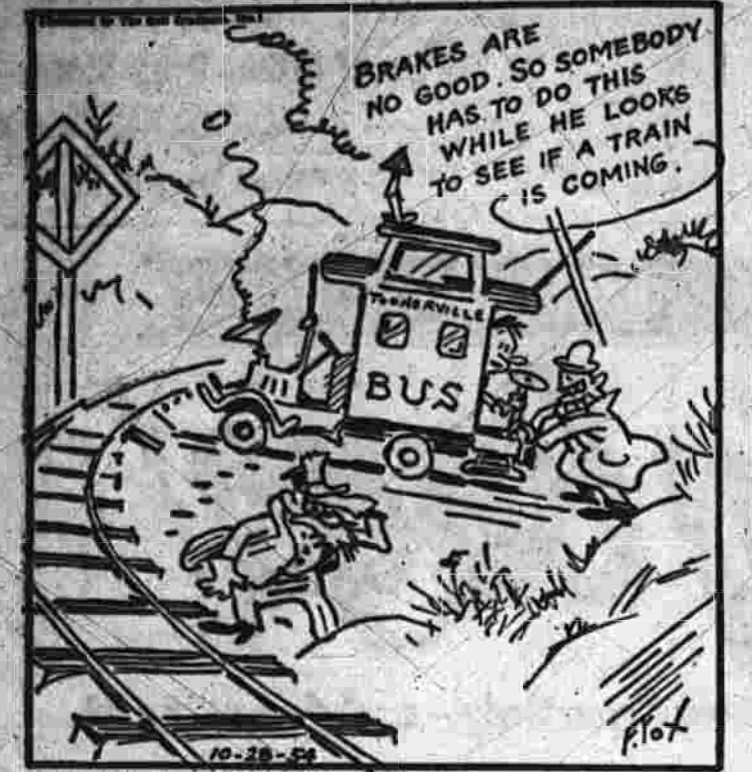

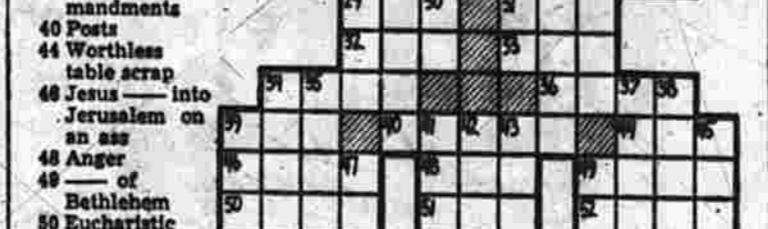
