

Government will seek a better solution to unemployment. "We won't go to war to get it." The President flew to Cleveland Tuesday to discuss the problem of a four-state tour to get out the vote for next Tuesday's election. He came into Ohio to help GOP Rep. George Bender in his contest for U. S. Senate seat against Democratic incumbent Sen. Thomas E. Dewey, who was appointed to succeed the late Sen. Robert A. Taft, a Republican.

Elected President

Also at stake in Ohio are 23 House seats. Republican James A. Rhodes is running for governor against Democratic incumbent Frank J. Lausche. Police Inspector Patrick J. Lynch estimated the crowd, which gathered at 2:30 p.m., was smaller than the one at the presidential address in Ohio. Republican leaders had hoped would turn out. The temperature was a chilly 41 degrees.

It was a hot day in the city, but the sun was out with a few clouds stepped from his private plane. In turning all citizens to go to the polls Tuesday, the President sounded the same theme he did in Washington last night, when he declared: "Let's all get up and vote."

"Let's roll up our sleeves and get ready to work" for election of another Republican-led Congress. In his Cleveland speech, the President said the American people had elected an administration, have got the kind of government they wanted.

"We were tired of hearing the word Communism," he declared. "I had every time it was mentioned it was called a hot herring."

That was an indirect jab at the Truman administration's handling of the subversive activities of President Truman, in reply to a newsmagazine question, once said to have been designed to draw attention from his legislative program.

He told the Cleveland audience that Republicans in the state have nominated a great, big, strong, and confident administration. He added that having that kind of group on the state there can be no question as to who will lead in Tuesday's election.

He predicted that if party workers will go to work to persuade the friends to get to the polls, there will be a Republican sweep in the congressional and state elections.

"Your vote is important," the President declared, adding that every citizen owes it to himself to vote on Tuesday.

Speaking in the cavernous hangar on the west side of the municipal airport—site of the new laboratory—the President was heard to say that he was glad to see his voice reverberated on in the huge building. Newman sitting directly in front of him were heard to call such much of what he said.

Annals Under Apaty. "I'm going to dispel what has called the word apathy," the President said, "and I'm going to dispel it by a minority vote," he declared.

"Despite the police estimate of 2,000 in the crowd, between covering the tour said the figure would be closer to 1,000.

The President was accompanied by press secretary James C. Hagerty, a few White House aides, and Mrs. Eisenhower did not make the trip.

If the Democrats reach the legislative branch, Eisenhower said, the government will be a "hopeless jam." He added: "I let's roll up our sleeves and get ready to work for a stronger America, good government, and a world at peace. Let's have another Republican-led Congress."

The President called on the Eisenhower Citizens committee to work up "the same enthusiasm and fervor with which we burned two years ago." He said that means "talking to your neighbors, using the telephone, ringing doorbells" to get out the vote.

The citizens organization made up of solidly established independent voters and disaffected Democrats—political elements which contributed to Eisenhower's 1952 victory.
