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Yoshida Cautions U. S. on Red Peace

New York, Nov. 6 (AP)—Prime Minister Shigeru Yoshida of Japan says the United States should not be deceived by the Communist peace offensive in Asia and that the Reds regard Japan as the "ultimate prize of their Pacific conquests."

In a speech to the Japanese society last night, Yoshida also said a "rumbling block in his country's economic expansion is widespread use of tariff barriers and import restrictions."

Yoshida was impressed by Japanese authorities during World War II at a pacifist and liberal. The Prime Minister was scheduled to leave today by plane for Albany, N. Y., to be a luncheon guest of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey in the executive mansion.

The "American Dream" was evoked four times in the Connecticut campaign.

It first appeared at the Democratic State Convention, and the United Nations, expressing hope for their admission in the not too distant future. And it is to be hoped that this consideration will swing American diplomacy away from its hitherto consistent policy of preventing any new admissions to the United Nations, and any kind of opposing any admission of any Communist nation, which, of course, has left Russia the only source of the veto for all the admissions we would like to see.

Early in the cold war, we were the ones to demand that Russia be a member of the United Nations, and we were the ones to insist that each new member be approved by the unanimous vote of the Security Council. But when, later on, Russia favored its stand, and came out in favor of a package deal, which would admit both the Communist and the non-Communist nations waiting outside the door, American diplomacy also switched, and now insists on a simple majority vote for each applicant nation must be acted on separately.

Now, it is quite true that the United States has a right to demand that each applicant nation be acted on separately. 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U. S. Files Protest With Moscow over Plane Destruction

Washington, Nov. 6 (AP)—The United States strongly protested to Russia today against the shooting down by a Russian MIG fighter of an American B-29 "Superfortress" bomber over Japanese territory in the Hokkaido area, and called for reparations. The terse note was delivered by Ambassador Charles Bohlen to the Soviet Foreign Ministry.

Peace Hopes Bright, Eisenhower Asserts

Boston, Nov. 8 (AP)—President Eisenhower declared today prospects for enduring peace are the brightest in years. And he again voiced hope his "atoms for peace" plan will inaugurate a "new phase" of United States relations with Russia.

"To attain... enduring peace must be a permanent foreign policy," the president said in a speech prepared for delivery at a meeting of the National Catholic Welfare Conference in Boston.

The chief executive sounded a note of optimism on the heels of another incident straining relations—the shooting down of a B-29 bomber by a Russian MIG-17 fighter.

The Air Force described the attacking bomber as a B-29 Superfortress, the largest bomber in the world, and said it was carrying a full load of bombs.

Eisenhower made no mention of the incident in his prepared text. He said the attack was "a serious violation of international law."

The president noted he was speaking on the anniversary of the landing of the first American troops in North Africa during World War II.

The attack took place on that day, and on the most terrible war in human history, we again resolve that we will not permit such a violation of international law to occur again."
