In meetings there yesterday, some 3,500 CIO workers here already had done so Monday and earlier yesterday.

The two plants produce the nation's entire supply of fissionable uranium-235 for atomic and hydrogen weapons.

Another 4,500 AFL workers, represented by the Atomic Trades and Labor Council at two other less critical but nonetheless vital plants here, had approved the 6-cent increase last Aug. 18. In parallel negotiations with carbide, they approved the extra four cents Monday.

This gives both unions scale ranging from \$1.64 to \$2.48 an hour with automatic boost to \$1.68-\$2.50 hourly range on Jan. 15 and in line with Carbide's established practice of paying both unions the same scale, regardless of which union wins the increase in this case the CIO.

50-hour session held

Federal mediators hammered out the compromise package in a marathon 20-hour session ended at 6 a. m. last Sunday and involving several million taxpayers and Carbide officials.

April 15—parallel negotiations involving both the AFL and CIO collapse. A threatened strike is averted by intervention of President Eisenhower's atomic energy labor relations panel.

President Eisenhower's revised budget forecast a deficit of about five billion dollars for the fiscal year ending June 30. The President has said this situation, along with continued heavy defense spending, makes it imperative to bar any big tax cut at this time.

Democrats used the tax issue in the recent political campaign, declaring a tax revision program would be a "tax cut for corporations and wealthy persons, but did not give enough help to the average taxpayer."

In this matter of keeping the flavor of the past alive, we have to take a hard look at our British cousins. Nobody can tear down their traditional haunts in the ridiculous name of progress.

The British not only preserve Westminster Abbey and their cathedral. The government also protects against change or destruction 5,000 pubs, including one in which the first Queen Elizabeth quaffed nutbrown, ale and another in which Henry VIII took a farewell nip before hopping the channel ferry to France and the Battle of Agincourt.

The government, explaining that the events that occurred in these pubs would make a history of England, plans to list all historical monuments several thousand more.

The British lean to the theory that any great man makes his thirties a place in history.

Americans are loathe to make monuments of their saloons, even though some of modern society's bluest blood has been shed in them in recent years, and despite the fact George Washington made his Farnwell address to his officers in a tavern. But, after all these years, Gen. U. S. Grant perhaps deserves a memorial marker? Any Southerner will confirm that it was only brave to take on the peerless Robert E. Lee.

How about the bar of Cranberry Park, New York, where Josiah O. Henry dreamed up his stories?

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### McCarthy Defense Speech Surpasses Previous Claims

By JAMES MARLOW  
Washington, Nov. 10 (AP)—The speech which Sen. McCarthy prepared for the Senate today—in his own defense against charges—goes far beyond anything he has ever said or claimed before.

This speech, which he released yesterday, is a masterpiece of his attitude and tactics toward criticism of himself over the past four years. History may remember it as an extraordinary document.

The speech goes so far in its implications it is difficult to believe McCarthy can surpass it. He holds up himself and those who go along with him as the country's chief defenders against Communism and links the fate of a nation to his own fate.

"Without the word 'martyr,' he clearly suggests he is a man persecuted.

Senate debate started today on recommendations of a special committee created to consider charges of misconduct against McCarthy. This committee of three Democrats and three Republicans was headed by Sen. Watkins (R-N.H.).

Recommended censure was investigated, but hearings. In McCarthy reply to the charges and recommendations of the Senate censure him on two counts: (A) that he ignored requests to testify made upon him by a previous committee which investigated him and (B) that he treated Brig. Gen. Ralph W. Zwicker adversely.

The first count termed contemptuous his treatment of the earlier committee. The second said, in effect, he had acted like a bully toward the general. On both counts the Watkins committee considered his conduct unfit for a Senator.

This is how McCarthy responded in his speech:

He brushed aside as inconsequential the Watkins committee charges. The same attitude he has taken toward all previous charges. "Pettty," he called them.

Concerning his violation of a victory for the Communists who want to destroy him, he said: "He described himself as 'hard' on Communism and those opposing him as 'soft' on Communism. Who are they? In this group, which he called 'traitors,' he included radio commentators, educators, writers, a majority of the press."

Watkins, who had been reading from two newspaper stories in North Carolina papers to support his contention that Ervin had a broad bias against McCarthy.

Ervin jumped up and demanded that the entire newspaper account be read, not just excerpts which he said would "pervert" the full meaning. McCarthy said he was doing just that.

Watkins, who technically had the floor, read into the record the entire newspaper stories.

Watkins delivered an emphatic defense of the special committee and called it "very distasteful" to himself.

He said it was "doubly distasteful" to himself. He recalled that both he and McCarthy were first elected to the Senate at the same time, in 1946, and that they had been sitting next to each other in the Senate for years.

Of his committee, Watkins said: "I've never sat with men before... than this group." He said that "never at any time" had politics entered into it.

### Notables Hail Marine Statue

Several hundred yards away from the memorial site near the Potomac River stands the tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery. Across the river is the majestic Lincoln Memorial.

The statue costs \$250,000. The expense was met by contributions from individual Marines.

The three survivors of the flag raising episode posed for De Weldon. Other Marines stood in for the fallen heroes.

The statue, above which rises a 100-foot flagpole, is painted antique green to match camouflage of World War II uniforms. It weighs about 850 tons.

"To all who shall ever view this memorial — it will speak of the courage, the spirit and the greatness of the American people — people from whom these men and their agonies came."

Robert R. Anderson, deputy secretary of defense, said in his prepared talk to the United States Marine Corps in the Lincoln Memorial on Nov. 10, 1954, was in town for the dedication to the three survivors of the World War II flag raising.

The survivors are former Marine Pfc. Ira Hayes of Phoenix, Ariz., and former Navy pharmacist mate John R. Bradley of Anzio, Italy.

The other three men represented in the statue died in the bitter fighting for the Pacific Islands. Their names were here for the ceremony.

Each of the six figures in the statue stands 32 feet high. A man could climb into the pockets of their uniforms. Beneath the figure is a solid block of black Swedish granite, on which is inscribed these words:

"Unknown valor was a common virtue."

These are the words of Fleet Adm. Chester W. Nimitz in saluting the Marine heroes of the two Jima fighting.

The memorial is dedicated to all Marines who have died in battle.

### Jury Finds Roche Guilty of Murder

New York, Nov. 10 (Special)—John Francis Roche, 27, confessed killer of five persons, has been found guilty of first degree murder, a verdict that grants him his wish to die.

An all-male jury convicted Roche late yesterday without recommending a death sentence mandatory under New York law. The state's highest court is required by the sentence can be carried out.

Roche, a plumber's helper, was convicted of the murder of Dorothy Westwater, a 14-year-old school girl, last June 17. He was the last of a series of murders which police say Roche confessed. Court-appointed defense attorney got little help from Roche, who refused to testify in his own behalf and told his lawyers he had no desire to live.

Roche, clad in dark slacks and a dark blue sweater, showed no emotion when the jury verdict was announced.

General Sessions Judge Jonah J. Goldstein set Nov. 30 for sentencing.

In finding Roche guilty, the jury rejected a defense claim that he was insane. It deliberated 90 minutes.

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# Youngsters Learn the Language Arts

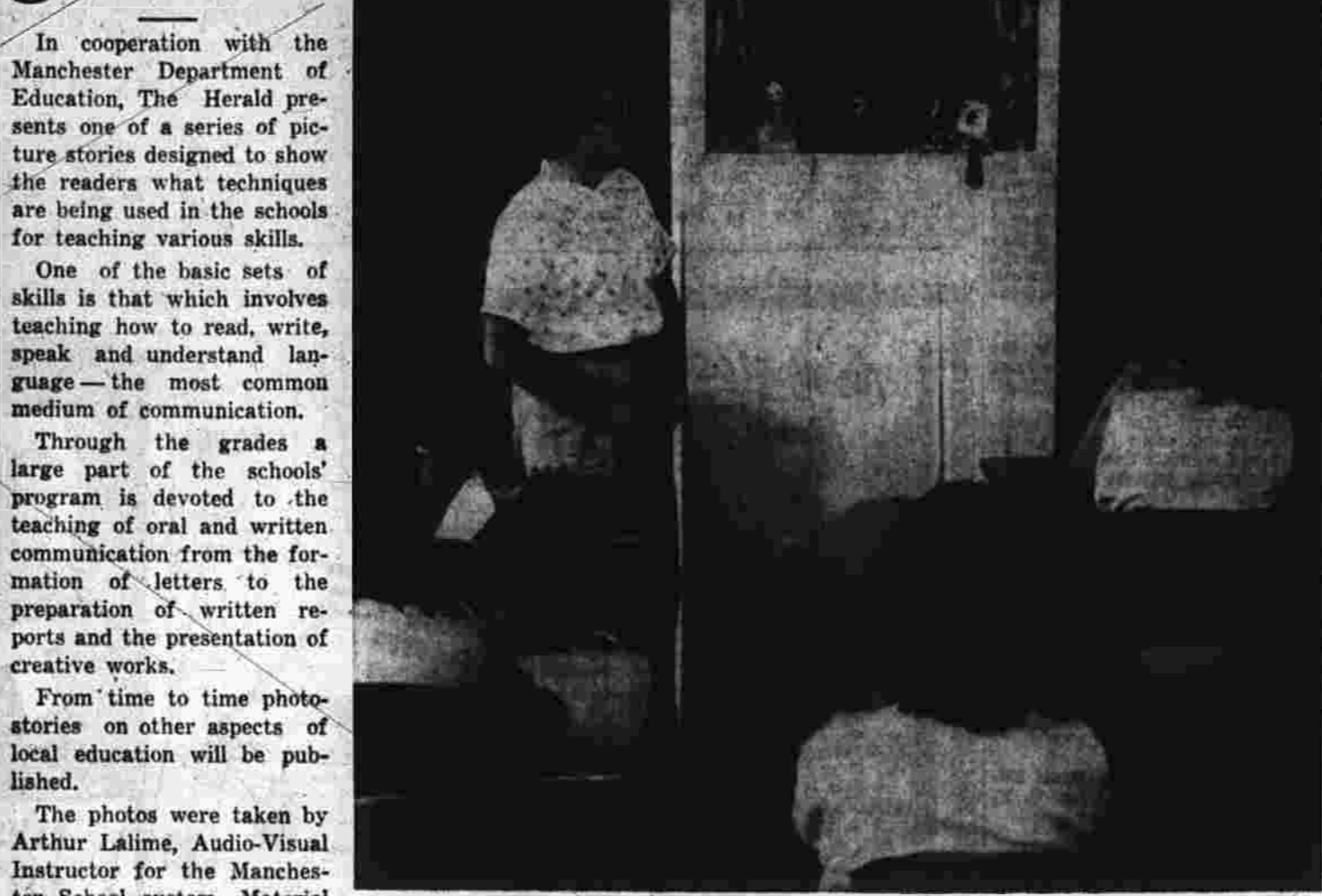
In cooperation with the Manchester Department of Education, The Herald presents one of a series of picture stories designed to show the readers what techniques are being used in the schools for teaching various skills.

Through the grades a large part of the school's program is devoted to the teaching of oral and written communication from the formation of letters to the preparation of written reports and the presentation of creative works.

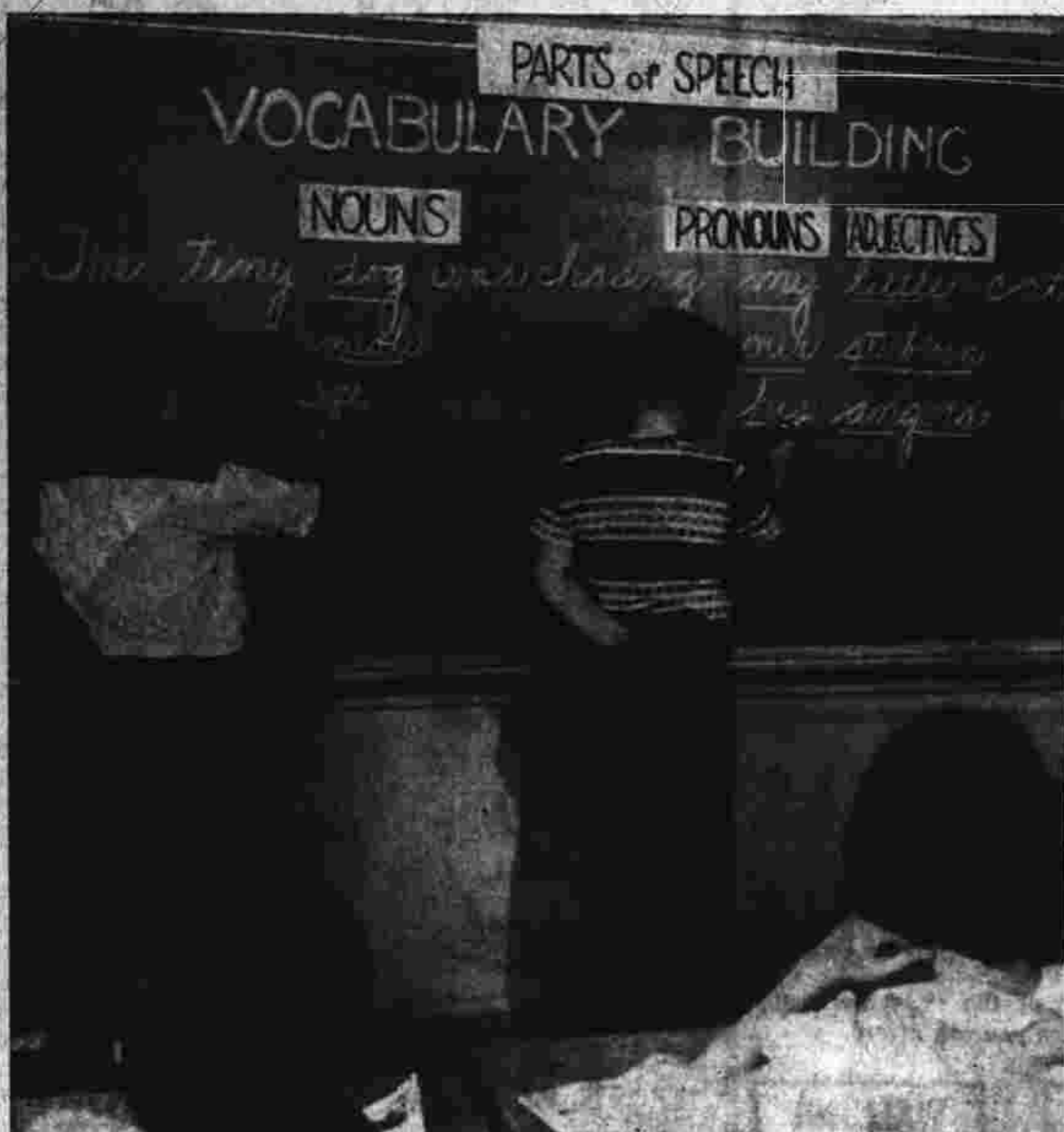
From time to time photographs on other aspects of local education will be published.

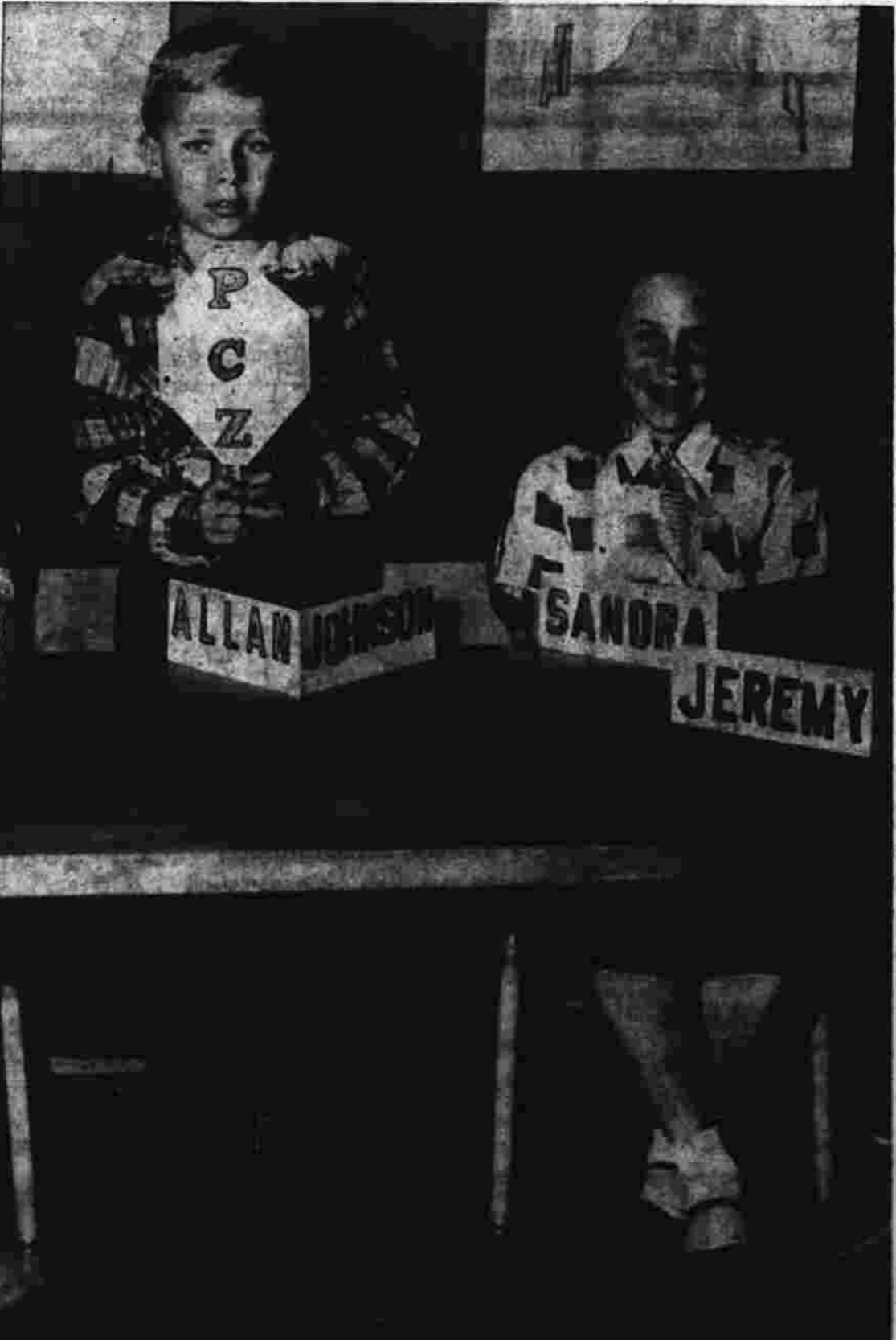

## UN Reactor Suggested By Romulo

(Continued from Page One)

The U. S. plan—also sponsored by six other countries—provides that the proposed international body would merely serve as a clearing house for requests for fissionable materials to be used for peaceful purposes.

Pressing for direct U. N. action, Romulo said:

Except U. S., Red Aid (The Soviet Union and the United States) which have been setting off so many atomic weapons, should be willing to contribute at least the equivalent of one atomic weapon, say, 250 pounds of fissionable material, which was the maximum size the first scientific report of the United Nations Atomic Energy Commission estimated as possibly needed for a single bomb.

Such a reactor could be used to produce radiolopes; it could train international technicians; it could study routes to atomic power; it could spark efforts in national institutions by the brains it had brought together from many nations.

Final admissions to mental hospitals due to syphilis have dropped from 8.6 per 100,000 population in 1939 to 2.1 in 1951. The number of reported cases of congenital syphilis has gone down from 17,600 in 1941 to 8,021 in 1953.

Finally the rates for reported primary and secondary syphilis have dropped from 7.56 per 100,000 population in 1947 to 6.27 per 100,000 population in 1953.

So much for the favorable aspects of the campaign against syphilis. But this is a disease of youth with the risk greatest in the age group of 15 to 24, and in one study of early syphilis in this age group in a large city the rate was found actually higher in 1950 than in 1940.

Furthermore, in the list of reportable communicable diseases (catching diseases) gonorrhea ranks second and syphilis third—not a very satisfactory record.

It is estimated that at this time in the United States there are two million persons who need treatment for syphilis and approximately 61,000 civilians who acquired that disease last year. It is a costly disease because of the risks from the disabling effects of late syphilis.

The annual cost of maintaining the syphilitic blind is estimated at \$12,500,000. In 1950 it was estimated that the loss of income from persons dying of syphilis was \$100,000,000.

So far as gonorrhea is concerned there is even less evidence that the problem is nearing solution. In 1952, for example, over 500,000 persons were reported to state health departments.

Furthermore, it is estimated that unsupported cases far outnumber those which are reported after a brief illness.

Since this disease can now be treated quite successfully if found early, the great problem remains that of finding all cases, beginning proper treatment promptly, and avoiding the spread of the disease to others.

The seriousness of the venereal disease problem cannot be exaggerated. While encouraging progress has been made, any relaxation of effort to combat these two diseases will bring about untold trouble, suffering and unnecessary expense to the entire community.
