Dulles Charges Chinese Reds Against Peace

The way for speedy action after the new Congress meets Jan. 3, Dulles leaders hope to continue the present session to the move to reconvene Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.).

The Secretary said the Manila Pact marks a "major further step" in the free world's efforts to establish peace in the Pacific as elsewhere. Significant also, he said, is a companion document—the Pacific Charter which emphasizes the right of peoples to choose their own governments.

Like Trouble Areas
Dulles ticked off places and situations which he said showed Red China's aggressive intent. Among them he listed:

1. Extension of a "free Thai" movement inside China, just across the border from Thailand.
2. Doubling since the Geneva Conference of Vietnamese forces in

the Philippines and Japan. But he said the Manila pact was these key references.

1. The treaty area is closely defined not only in the past itself but also in a separate protocol which promises that the Indochina states, although not members, will be brought within the mantle of the protection.

2. For the first time, subversion is stated out as a danger to the area. Dulles called for an early meeting of pact nations to search for "ways and means" of ending the threat of subversion.

The treaty, binding the eight nations together militarily and economically in the Pacific, declares each will "act to meet the common danger in accordance with its constitutional processes."

So far as the United States is concerned, Dulles said, the "common danger" means Communist aggression.

Dulles paid tribute to Philippine President Ramon Magaya, saying what he said was the chief architect of the Pacific charter.

In brief, the new 8-nation treaty, signed at Manila last Sept. 8, commits the United States to consult with treaty nations on ways to meet the common danger growing out of any Communist armed attack within the treaty area. Consultation whenever the integrity of the treaty area is threatened by other than armed attack—in other words, internal subversion or "indirect aggression."

This area encompasses the Philippines, Pakistan, Thailand, Australia, New Zealand and the territories of Great Britain and France in the western area of the South Pacific.

Manila was a member of the U. S. delegation which wrote the treaty in Manila last summer. In an interview today he described it as "the second-best step" toward collective security in the Pacific area. "The best," he said, would be a pact including also India, Burma and Indonesia.

Manila also said operation of the treaty would be questioned in the case of Laos, Cambodia and Free Viet Nam, considered one of the Asian areas most exposed today to possible Red infiltration.

Dulles has said that even though these Indochina nations are not signatories, the treaty assures direct or indirect attack on them "will bring into operation the obligations" of the signatory nations.

Revision of UN Charter Favored by Dr. Habicht

Says Only World State Can Preserve Peace In Speech to Chapter

Dr. Max Habicht, an internationally known advocate of world government, last night called for a revision of the United Nations charter along federalist lines to preserve the world organization from destruction.

Speaking at a public meeting of the Manchester chapter of the World Federalists at Watson Memorial auditorium, Habicht said that with the power of world destruction possessed by both the United States and Russia, only a world state could preserve the peace.

Habicht, a Swiss who was an official of the old League of Nations, said that that system failed because "the law of the jungle" prevailed and predicted that the UN would be "blown up" too soon unless nations yielded some of their sovereignty to a world government.

Christians' Movement over atomic and nuclear weapons. Habicht said a groundswell of public opinion would have to be built up before the General Assembly next year, and Habicht said the people of the world should request their leaders should take steps to bring about the organization.

The danger regarded by Habicht of the treaty would be the "bomb." He said that the major governments would have to surrender their power of the veto at least in questions of disarmament.

He said that atomic and nuclear weapons constitute a universal problem since they could wipe out civilization, but added that the danger could be eliminated if negotiation would submit to majority rule.

Limit Principle
Habicht conceded that many nations would find this "remedy for peace" like any medicine, difficult to swallow, but he said, "we must continue them if we don't poison us." He said also that, at first, the principle of majority vote should be limited to questions of disarmament.

Habicht, basing his recommendations for charter reform on proposals adopted earlier this year in London by the conference of the World Area of Parliamentarians for World Government, then went on to outline a world government structure based on federalist principles.

He called for a World Executive Council to replace the UN's Security Council and a bicameral legislature to replace the General Assembly. Representation in the upper house of the proposed legislature would be based on equal representation, as in the United States Senate, and in the lower house on population, as the House of Representatives.

He said further that the peoples of the world should be permitted to elect their own representatives to the world legislature. He said elections to this legislature could be held on the same day that state and national elections are held.

Habicht also said that a trust international police force would be needed to enforce the laws of the legislature, but added that the number of men the nations of the world now have under arms if the nations agree to disarm, he said, the need for a massive army to keep the peace would cease.

LABORERS FOR FACT
London, Nov. 11 (AP)—Laborite members of Parliament decided at a closed caucus today to accept the nine-nation agreement on the rearmament of West Germany.

Parliamentary correspondents said the vote was 28 to 12. The decision meant that any Laborites who vote against arming the West Germans make themselves liable to disciplinary action and possible expulsion from the party. The issue will be debated in the House of Commons next week.

1,600 Tax Delinquents Reported by Cervini

The names of some 1,600 Manchester residents who have failed to pay car taxes on the 1953 tax list will be sent to the Motor Vehicle Dept. Monday by the office of Paul Cervini, collector of revenue.

State law requires that the names be posted so that MV personnel can refuse to give new registrations to persons who have failed to pay their tax.

Bolton Rothwell Outlines School Building Program to PTA

Bolton, Nov. 11 (Special)—John E. Rothwell was a surprise speaker at the PTA meeting at the Elementary School last night. As chairman of the School Building Committee, he spoke on what that committee sees as its job and sought the ideas of individual PTA members on school expansion.

Rothwell said the committee has the plan that the site of more rooms authorized by the town are not to be just that but they should be part of a plan for a complete school and "in the event we continue to grow as we have been growing, we won't find ourselves with a group of buildings that don't fit together."

Jack Barwick's seventh grade displayed some of the sculpting and modeling now being done by its members in preparation for an art exhibit they hope to have in the room. The teacher discussed with the parents plans for the year and application in classroom of his theories of self-help and cooperation in the group as a system of its own to help the committee and the architect in learning what would be needed, the committee called in the Board of Education for the counsel needed in deciding that type of plan was needed to carry out the educational objectives of the board. In a very cooperative and comprehensive four hour discussion last Thursday evening, Rothwell said the board and the building committee, explored questions of classroom size, group assembly areas, inclusion of industrial arts facilities, teachers' room, principal's and management offices, health unit, heat and service facilities, toilet, library and storage.

He pointed out to the meeting that the town is working on a very tight time schedule if the additional plan is to be ready for occupancy in Sept. 1955. "Fast decisions are going to be necessary," he continued "and it looks like we're pushing anybody, it's because we've got to get it done."

The speaker told the group that an overall plan would be presented to the town but not with the expectation that it would be approved in its entirety at that time. He emphasized the stand of the building committee that it was unable to plan with an overall objective in mind in order that the town may build with an integrated, efficient and economical school plant.

The committee said after its meeting with the Board of Education, it feels some of the ideas which will be suggested might be part of a future building program and that planning for the immediate future should be a step toward the ultimate expansion of the school.

He concluded his remarks last night with the statement that the building committee was "trying to come up with a plan that will suit the needs of next September and at least five Septembers after that."

He also mentioned that the meeting attended by about 100 parents and teachers who toured the building or visited the classrooms of their children.

The first grade classroom, Miss Egan's, the church had in a many displays in graphic design, the use of all activities such as music, play and project work in the learning process. The children had the opportunity to see the mountains and amber waves of grain, actually represented by sticks of wheat.

A hand loom which the children were using actually helped them develop the co-ordination and the muscle control they will need for lettering, Miss Church said.

After Josephine Leao, who also teaches first grade, spoke to her parent group on reading, a field in which she has done considerable advanced study. Examples of art work and writing done by third and fourth graders were also on display.

Both second grades, taught by Miss Janet Tracy and Miss Dorothy, featured displays of class work. Original stories done by the District group included three on the recent election, one by the teacher's assignment and one by the PTA group. The teacher will show the Pilgrim story to their decision to leave England up to the first Thanksgiving.

Third grade classrooms taught by Mrs. Sylvia Patrick and Mrs. Bertha McCarrah were bright with art work and study papers of the students. The teacher explained the transition from manuscript to cursive writing now being introduced in this grade and discussed other work in general. A diorama depicting the three heavy seas and which had been exhibited at the recent District Conference for teachers was on display in Mrs. Patrick's room.

Parents who visited Mrs. Elizabeth Pender's fourth grade room saw the children's work on the election and discussed with the teacher some of the emotional problems of that age, the adjustment to the more group work and the fourth grade instruction being used. Foldouts on each desk contained sample papers from each of the weeks school had been in session as well as graphs which aid both the teacher and pupil in determining the need for extra help in some areas.

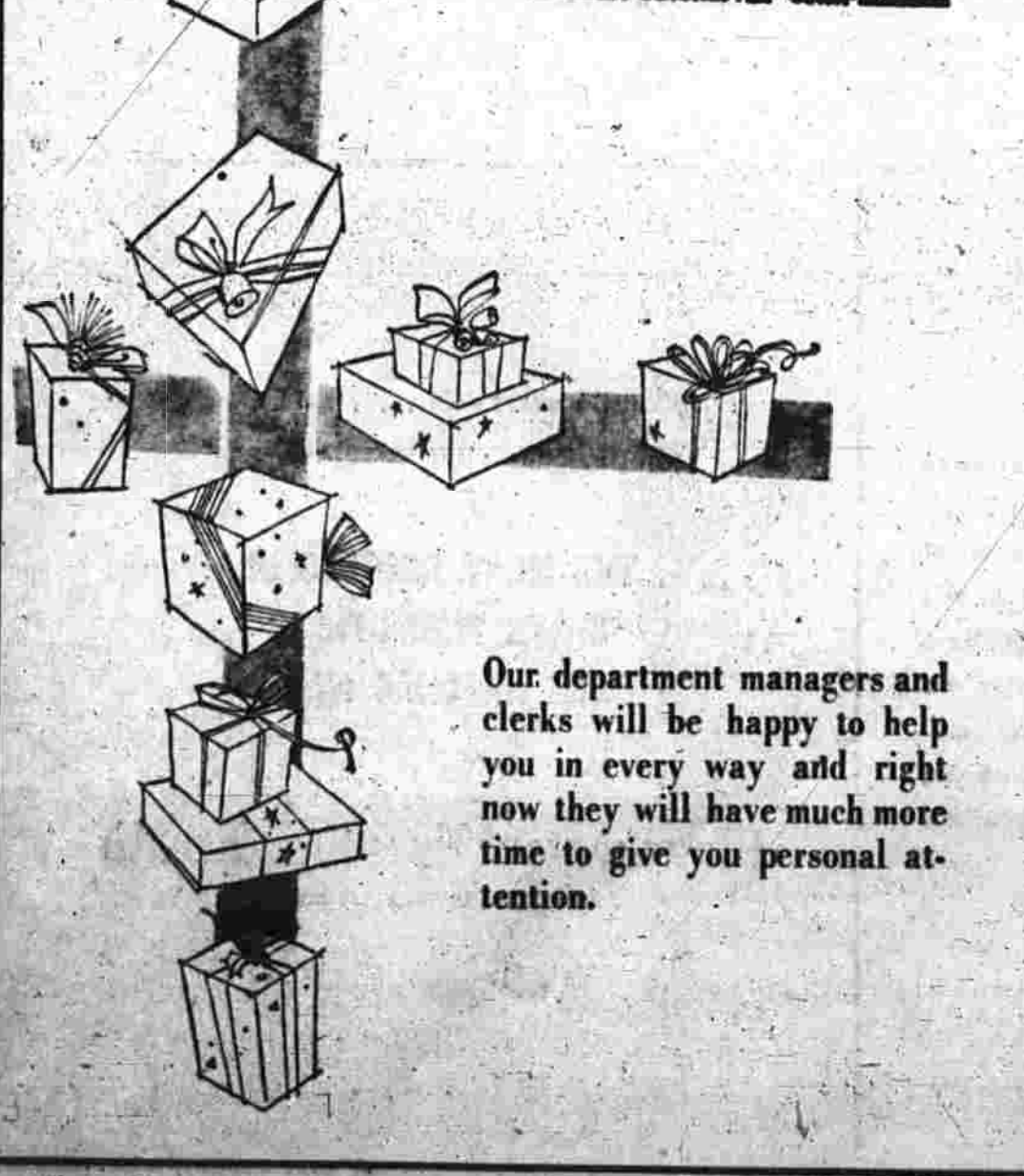
