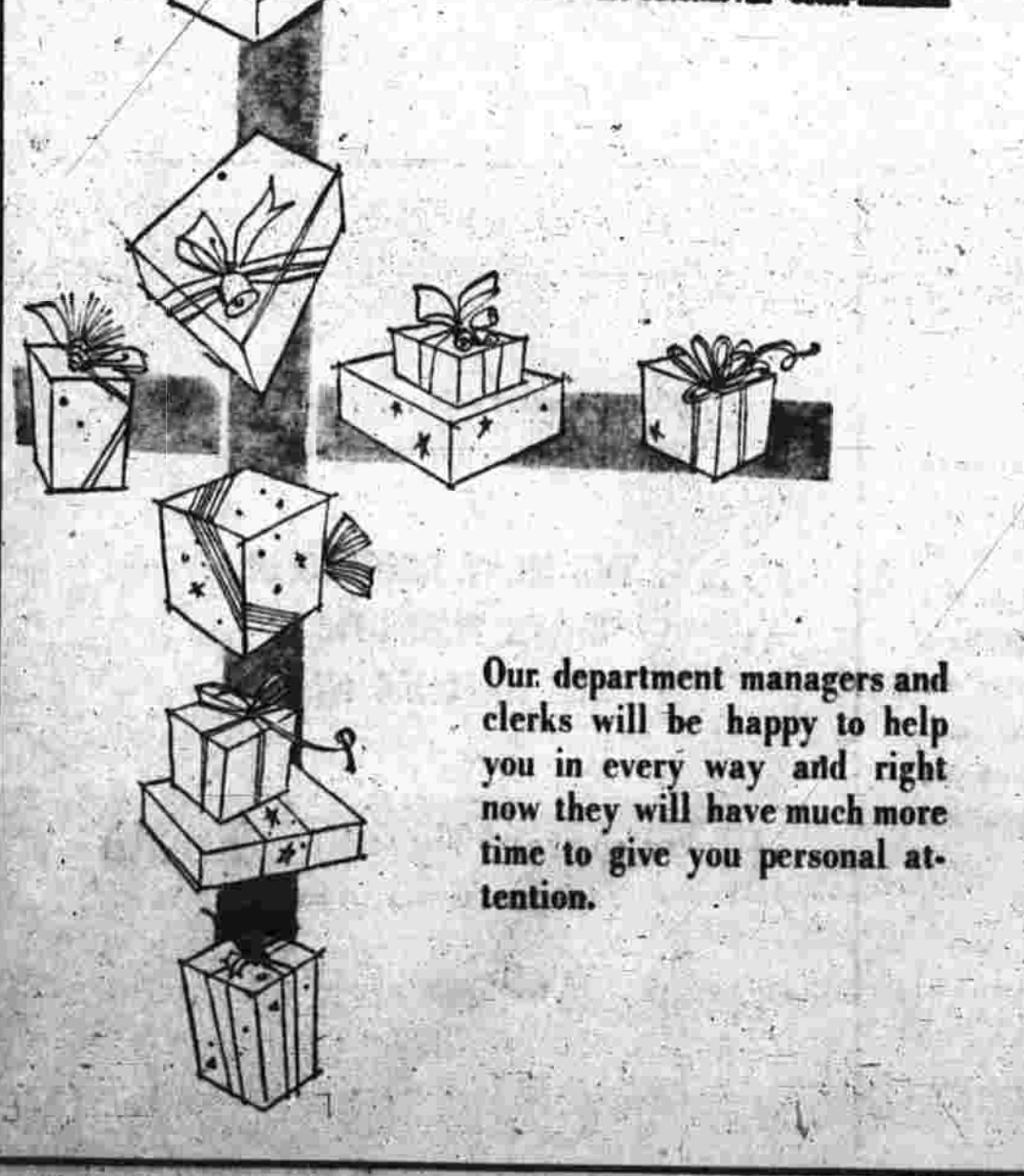

originally proposed by administration Republicans. Republicans argued that corporate profits are taxed twice—first under regular corporation income taxes and again under individual income taxes as profits are passed out to stockholders in dividends. They said the tax cut would be a spur to business investment and help long-range economic growth. Many Democrats attacked the move as special relief for the wealthy. And some of them made this an issue in the recent election campaign.

The fact that three Democrats on the key Tax Committee already have taken a stand against repeal, they could still fall one short of a committee majority. Five additional Democrats will be added to the committee when the House takes up the bill on Monday. It is expected that the bill will pass by a vote of 15 Democrats and 10 Republicans. But all the Republicans have indicated they will vote against the bill.

Greatness Grown Timid?

President Eisenhower's project for an international pooling of atoms for peace is, at first glance, being subjected to both fishing and fiddling.

Russia, which does not quite dare let the project get away, and which has an irresistible instinct to try to hook into it, has been self with it. This is ample tribute to the original power of the Eisenhower proposal, and a prime example of the way a good positive proposal can put Russian diplomacy back on its heels much more conclusively than any of the more habitual strokes of cold war diplomacy.

The fiddling has been on the part of American policy itself, which has become a little bit afraid of the great proposal it is supposed to implement, and which has, therefore, been giving it a treatment, and exposition, more than below the level of the President's original proposal. It has been hedging, and watering down, and reneging somewhat on the original promise that this would be done through the United Nations. Although the original high object of the President's proposal was exactly to bring Russia out of the world atomic straits, the policy has now succumbed to some fear over the prospect that Russia may do exactly this. This has been reflected in the way we have now tailored the proposition away from direct subordination to the authority of the United Nations, and presented it, more as an American than as a world program, and, at the same time, cast down on what was originally considered the likely scope of the experiment.

This has enabled Russia, even while it still feels impelled to hitch into the project, to chide and taunt us for what we have done to our own original proposal. And it has done this with the enthusiasm and hope of some of the smaller nations who originally thrilled to the Eisenhower proposal as the great stroke it was.

The representative of one of these small nations, General Carlos P. Romulo of the Philippines, made a plea at the United Nations Wednesday which was essentially a plea that we head back, unafraid, to the bold grandeur of our original proposal. His suggestion was simple and direct—that both the United States and Russia recognize the United Nations as a unique in the peacetime world development of the atom by contributing to the United Nations enough atomic material to set the United Nations up as a reactor, laboratory, and scientists of its own.

This may seem a naive, too simple, too direct approach to the problem, but it still has the merit of coming close to the President's original proposal than the detailed proposition American policy has offered. We have brought doubt and suspicion to the implementation of a proposal which was bold and generous. That proposal, still in power and possibilities, as can be judged from the fact that even now Russia does not dare reject it. But the only states which stand between its present estate and one which more dynamic are largely fearful. Let us hope American policy listens, and keeps itself simple.

Target The Senate of the United States, the other day, was highly conscious of two things about Senator Arthur Watkins, the great Republican who is chairman of the

special committee which appointed charges against Senator McCarthy. First, it was conscious that he had by no means sought the position he now holds, but had taken it merely as a high senatorial duty he could not in conscience refuse.

Second, it was aware that he suffers from a physical handicap—a condition which makes his doctor warn him against undue emotional stress or strain.
