German Vet Sells Malmedy Photos

Malmedy, Belgium, Nov. 17.—Nearly 10 years after Adolf Hitler ripped the Allied western wall in the "Battle of the Bulge," a German war veteran now sells postcards at the site of the famous Malmedy massacre.

The scene is a junction of five roads about three miles south of here where on Dec. 17, 1944, breakthrough was made by the German Panzer Division surprised and captured lightly armed troops of the American First Army Observation Battalion.

The Americans were disarmed and herded into a pasture a few feet from the road junction. They stood there, defenseless, hands raised in the accepted posture of prisoners, the Nazi Storm Troopers opened fire on them.

In the United States, admitted Communist Whittaker Chambers and Hilda Manning have testified that Noel Field was once a member of a Communist spy ring.

After Poland released Hermann Field, western observers here anticipated that he would be turned loose. But American diplomats said the Hungarian government ignored two notes sent to the U. S. Legation in the past six weeks demanding his freedom.

The Field mystery began in May, 1949, when Noel left his wife in Switzerland and went to Prague, Czechoslovakia. He was last heard from in that city on May 12. After charges could not be substantiated, he disappeared. His wife flew to Prague to look for him and also, too, vanished.

Noel's name came up in the sensational trial in October, 1949, of Laszlo Rajk, then Hungarian foreign minister. Rajk was accused of scheming with Yugoslav Marshal Tito to hand the country over to "American imperialism."

The prosecution at the trial described Noel as an assistant to Allen Dulles (now head of the U. S. Central Intelligence Agency) in the Office of Strategic Services—a U. S. cloak and dagger organization during World War II.

Rajk and his codefendants testified that Field organized the spy ring in that city on May 12. After charges could not be substantiated, he disappeared. His wife flew to Prague to look for him and also, too, vanished.

Noel Field's name also was mentioned in the November, 1952, trial in Prague in which 11 Czech Communists were sentenced to death. The defendants, including former Czech Communist Party Chief Rudolf Slansky and former Foreign Minister Vladimir Clementis, were accused of having contacts with Field, who was named as the No. 1 American spy in Europe.

The son of an American father born in London and came to the United States in 1920 to attend Harvard University. He went to work for the State Dept. in 1928, was in prison in Hungary and in 1947, after 36 years service, with the flag rank of rear admiral—one notch above commodore.



 The Watkins Committee judgment on the Zwicker affair... It is accomplished by escape by pretending that the conduct of the Army, in Washington, in discharging Perez instead of trying to court-martial him, was justification for violence on the part of McCarthy. What great sure may have been brought on him, what inner unhappiness he may have been experiencing in his temporary yielding to the judicial atmosphere of the Watkins Committee, are not things to appear on the surface of the case. All one does know is that the surface reason given could not, in itself, have swayed a mind.

A Cannon For Nasser?
 It is not recorded whether or not General Naguib, on his way out of office and out of any claim to power in Egypt, relinquished the medals he had accumulated from various sources. If not, how ever, it would seem that Secretary of State Dulles is in for another bit of travel. It appears he made that present of a revolver, a little over a year ago, to the wrong party.

To be sure, the selection of a revolver, as Mr. Dulles' diplomatic approach, was natural enough, considering the fact that General Naguib then seemed to be a full-blooded dictator. It could serve such a side-arm, as a symbol of the way he got to power and the way he might remain there. It would be a fitting gift to a dictator.

Yet it seems, in the upshot, that Naguib got the idea that he himself might be what Mr. Dulles seemed to think he was because the moment in which his regime was doomed.

The revolver, apparently, really should have gone to Colonel Nasser, the real boss of the Egyptian situation. And since, absurdly, Mr. Dulles cannot wish to show respect to the real boss of Egypt, then he should have given it to the front man, it is about time for him to be off toward Cairo, with some kind of cannon in his grip.

Big Airline Strike Averted 60 Days
 Washington, Nov. 17 (AP)—A threatened strike against six major airlines has been averted for at least 60 days by President Eisenhower's creation of an emergency board to investigate the labor dispute.

The White House order yesterday said that in the judgment of the National Labor Relations Board the dispute between the airlines and the International Assn. of Machinists "involved substantially to interrupt interstate commerce to a degree such as to deprive a section of the country of essential transportation services."

The dispute involves wages and operating rules. Employees of the six lines—Capital, National, North-west, Trans World United and Eastern—have authorized a strike, but no date has been set. However, the President's action yesterday automatically puts off a walk-out for 60 days, under the Railway Labor Act which applies.

The White House said the names of the emergency board members would be announced shortly.

British Try Clerk For Spy Activities
 London, Nov. 17 (AP)—A 27-year-old clerk was charged today with spying on Britain's anti-aircraft defenses "for a purpose prejudicial to the safety of interests of the state."

He was ordered to stand trial until the 1911 Official Secrets Act, the rarely invoked legislation under which atomic scientists Klaus Fuchs was convicted of spying for the Soviets.

At a 5-minute preliminary hearing before London's chief magistrate Sir Laurence Dunne, the clerk, John Clarence, was ordered held in custody for a further hearing next Wednesday.

He entered no plea today and police offered only evidence of arrest. There was no indication in court of where he worked or of his terms of employment, which listing him only as "of no fixed abode."

The charges alleged Clarence collected information about anti-aircraft installations, the two districts in North England "which was calculated to be useful to an enemy."

Fermi Wins First Award from AEC
 Washington, Nov. 17 (AP)—Italian-born physicist Enrico Fermi, who pioneered in the development of the first atomic bomb, is the winner of the Atomic Energy Commission's first special award for outstanding achievement in the nuclear field.

The AEC announced yesterday that Dr. Fermi, builder of America's first nuclear reactor which made the A-bomb possible, would get \$25,000 for his accomplishment, which the commission described as "tremendous importance."

AEC Chairman Lewis L. Strauss said in a statement that "as much as any individual, he is responsible for the achievement of the controlled release of nuclear energy."

In Chicago, Dr. Fermi said he was "deeply honored and gratified." He now is a physics professor at the University of Chicago's Institute for Nuclear Studies. He is a Nobel prize winner.

A Surface Pretext
 The change of mind of Senator Francis Case, the South Dakota Republican, on the charge against Senator McCarthy based on his treatment of General Zwicker is a change of mind based on a slim and almost non-existent straw. That being so, the conclusion must be that Senator Case was anxiously looking for some pretext he could use to remove himself from the original verdict of the Watkins Committee, and that, if he had not found this particular pretext, he would have found another.

What Senator Case pretends to have found out is that the Army was in possession of Senator McCarthy's demand that Major Perez be court-martialed on a date before Perez was discharged from the service. In this, Senator Case makes one impossible assumption—that the Army had, either because of Senator McCarthy's demand, or because of any other reason, any slightest pretext for undertaking a court-martial of the discharged soldier.

Beyond this impossible assumption, moreover, Senator Case, in his change of heart, deliberately and completely ignored the basis for the Watkins Committee censure of McCarthy in the Zwicker case.

What shocked the Watkins Committee when it got into the Zwicker affair—and at least one of its members entered this phase of the investigation with the idea that General Zwicker had indeed been a provocative witness for McCarthy—was the committee's discovery that McCarthy had deliberately and consciously made a sitting duck out of Zwicker. It discovered that the McCarthy committee staff, in private conferences with General Zwicker, had found him cooperative, and gained from him all the information and assistance he could give, and had, likewise, discovered what would have to be the limits to his public testimony. It was against this background of Zwicker's friendly cooperation in private that McCarthy then undertook his cold-blooded, savage abuse of Zwicker in public. It was only after knowing of his victim's innocence, in other words, that Senator McCarthy publicly proclaimed his guilt.

This instance of McCarthy ignoring information he himself possessed in order to claim a victim, in sensational headlines—this open attribution of guilt to somebody McCarthy knew, all the time to be innocent—is no isolated instance in the McCarthy career. It is a recurrent pattern.

And it was the Watkins Committee's discovery that this had been the pattern in the case of General Zwicker, and that the committee more than any other one thing it uncovered.

That same pattern has been used by McCarthy in the course of his present Senate fight. The other day, for instance, he knew that Senator Watkins had already sent for and was about to present him with a copy of the corrected resolution being introduced by the committee. It was after he knew this, after he knew that the very thing the document was coming to him, that McCarthy held an hour-long session with Watkins for not providing him with the document.

As for Senator Case, how did he wriggle out of his previous

APME Told U. S. Newspaper Should Expand Its Coverage

Tampa, Fla., Nov. 17 (AP)—The Associated Press Managing Editors Assn. was told today by the American Press on that newspaper readers a wider variety of news coverage.

What the typical American is looking for in his newspaper is something other than police court news and Frank Byrly, managing editor of the Des Moines Register and Tribune.

Three Schools of Thought Cited

Three Schools of Thought Cited said there were three schools of thought on the subject of allowing a socialist Press newspaper to use information which doesn't name the source and in interpreting news events.

1. That good investigative writing is nothing more than good reporting; that the newspaper owes it to its readers to give them explanations of the news.

2. That the AP must be the reporter of the news and not the source of the news, and that any setting down of the bars on attribution and interpretation would be dangerous.

3. That no middle of the road approach should be followed, with each story coming from a source who declined to be named being weighed on its news merits, carefully checked and handled.
