The statement also said McCarthy's condition continued to improve.

McCarthy's condition continued to improve, he felt much relieved but didn't think he would leave the hospital until Monday. Mito was chosen by lot to make McCarthy's right arm heavily bandaged from the knuckles almost to the shoulder.

None of McCarthy's aides or associates in the Senate profess to know what motivated the request to NBC for live air time, made yesterday by Mrs. McCarthy.

Two schools of thought developed as to what McCarthy had planned to say in the proposed Thanksgiving Day broadcast, and presumably will now say on some other occasion.

Sen. Mundt (R-SD), who headed the Senate investigations subcommittee when it delved into McCarthy's Army controversy, said in an interview he thinks the Wisconsin Senator would like to condemn a willingness to make some amends to Senators and others he has assailed in the past.

On the other hand, Sen. McClellan of Arkansas, top Democrat on the McCarthy-Army inquiry group, speculated that McCarthy may want to rally his friends and assure them he plans to fight the censure movement to the bitter end.

A six-man special committee, headed by Sen. Watkins (R-Utah), recommended that McCarthy be re-elected for alleged contemptuous treatment of a Senate Elections subcommittee chair by Sen. Gen. Frank W. Esters, a witness before McCarthy's investigations subcommittee.

McCarthy has predicted he will be censured and has said he won't apologize.

Agreed to Sign Statement

It was learned authoritatively, however, that at one point before McCarthy had agreed to sign a joint statement with Sen. Hendrickson (R-KY) if one could be worked out.

McCarthy had declared that Hendrickson, a member of the elections subcommittee which investigated the Wisconsin Senator's finances in 1951-52, was "a living miracle... with neither brains nor guts."

Hendrickson told the Senate last week there need be no apology to him personally, that any insults were the right of the subcommittee and not against him. It was not clear whether Hendrickson had balked at signing the proposed joint statement or whether McCarthy's insistence that he would not apologize had killed that move.

ments of individuals and 17 convictions or guilty pleas.

Regers said more of the new group of cases involved alleged frauds in connection with home improvement loans. The Justice Dept. housing agency investigators and the Senate Banking committee have been hunting also for evidence of wrongdoing in connection with a now expired apartment construction program from which some builders allegedly netted millions in "windfall" profits.

Regers said special units in the department are "pursuing all possible courses of prosecuting those who ruthlessly victimized small home owners and tenants" and will continue to strive to recover for the government "windfall" profits in FHA rental projects.

Regers said many more cases now are before grand juries "or in the hands of the Federal Bureau of Investigation."

Hal Boyle Every Plane Trip Holds Adventure

Keflavik Airport, Iceland (AP)—All that goes up has to come down.

But sometimes the international air tourist of today doesn't always come down where he planned to. The vagaries of wind and weather still influence the big winged covered wagons he flies in, and on occasion they combine to land him for a free look at a country that wasn't part of the trip he scheduled.

Your timetable tourist may get peeved at this and regard it as a conspiracy against his vacation program. Those who regard travel as a form of adventure in itself, however, will accept the situation as an unexpected bonus.

So I felt fortunate that strong headwinds—and a when broken in landing—gave me a chance to land at this northern U. S. Air Base and see my

We alighted to a perfect landing, but as we rolled across the field there was a sudden loud crack, and we realized as we had merely crumbled a patch of ice.

But when we alighted the captain immediately went to one of the wheels and discovered it had snapped. As two big wheels are pinned on each side against just such an emergency, the danger, if any, had been slight.

A broken wheel on a covered wagon in the days when the West was being settled was often a real calamity. But this mishap to our plane was only a mild vexation—another chore in the day's work to our captain.

"We must have to locate another wheel and put it on before we can take off," he said matter-of-factly. "It will take a few hours."

It always amazes me how modern people born in the days of brass and buggy travel, now take the miracle of air passage for granted.

A couple of businessmen were awaiting the plane about the delay, even after breakfasting well on the terminal on bacon, eggs and steaming coffee. It was no consolation to them that the day's work in Columbus had had a considerable rougher time on his voyage.

On the other hand, a group of elderly tourists, returning from a three-month tour of Europe, were quite gay and cheerful. An 81-year-old retired banker, George L. Melrose of Boston, said he had wanted to organize a quick tour to see the sights of Keflavik, Iceland's capital.

All American Air Force corporal, stationed at the base here, waved his hand at the polar darkness outside, and advised:

"Don't bother. There's nothing to see."

The octogenarian banker promptly said: "I'm a young mother nursing her infant and fell sound asleep."

West Europe Defense Lists Use of H-bomb

Washington, Nov. 23 (AP)—Plans for the defense of western Europe now appear to include the use of the hydrogen bomb on the battlefield, to provide a crushing, all-destructive force where tactical nuclear (fission bombs or projectiles) might be inadequate.

Recent generalized and laconic references by American military officials to utilizing what a veteran officer said was a "new type" of weapons and tactics are required to counter aggression have been sharpened by a comment from the Deputy Supreme Commander of Allied powers in Europe, Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery of Alamein.

The British strategist said yesterday that he absolutely clear that we at SHAPE (the Paris headquarters of the Supreme Command) are basing all our operational planning on using the impact of new weapons on the

atomic and thermonuclear weapons in our defense.

"With us it is no longer 'they may possibly be used. It is very definitely they will be used, if we are attacked.'"

Significant Statement

Montgomery made the significant statement in a lecture at London last month. A copy of the lecture became available in Washington today.

Montgomery made the significant statement Oct. 21 in a speech before the Royal United Services Institution in London.

Montgomery arrived in Washington this week during a visit to the United States. On Wednesday he is scheduled to meet with Pentagon officials and later to fly to Augusta, Ga., to spend Thanksgiving with President Eisenhower, his colleague in the European High Command during World War II and later in the present SHAEF organization.

Yesterday, the Military Committee of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) started a series of meetings for periodic assessment of the status of western European military defenses, including consideration of operational planning on using the impact of new weapons on the

pattern of defense forces. There seemed the possibility that Montgomery might visit, informally, at least one of the committee sessions, to be held in the Pentagon.

Montgomery offered no details in his lecture on his inclusion of thermonuclear weapons in the operational plans for defense.

Delivery by Aircraft

However, these considerations became apparent:

1. The size of the hydrogen bomb, as it now exists, requires delivery by aircraft, either manned or remotely controlled. As far as is known, it can not be packaged into a small container, like the tactical-size nuclear fission bomb or atomic shells for use in tanks or warheads for medium range missiles.

2. Hydrogen weapons are applicable in quantities in the production in sizable quantities in the night, because of the expanded facilities for production of materials and perfected methods of "triggering" the bomb.

3. The area of destruction of a hydrogen bomb, measurable for battlefield purposes in tens or dozens of miles radius from an explosion, would make it effective against less concentrated enemy troops targets than is the case for a standard fission explosion. On the other hand, the distance between the explosion and friendly forces would have to be greater.

Evacuation of underground installations, such as command posts or missile-launching sites, would be possible by the impact explosion of a hydrogen bomb, which produces a heavy cratering effect.

Tactical use of hydrogen weapons would of course be in addition to the major strategic function of the bomb.

To destroy big war-goods producing centers, shipping and communications centers and homeland military command headquarters.

In his paper, Montgomery took issue with some current contentions about trends and the future for present-day weapons.

"There are some who say that if war is joined nuclear weapons will not be used," he said. "I would disagree with that."

"My opinion is that the fear of atomic and thermonuclear weapons is a powerful deterrent to war, but once a world hot war has started it is likely to be used. I believe that the use of them, would certainly use them themselves if attacked..."

Board Grants 15 Exceptions

Four Requests Tabled; Allow Jarvis Parking Within Foot of Line

All four applications made by Alexander Jarvis interests to the Zoning Board of Appeals were granted in executive session by the Board following last night's public hearing in the Municipal Building.

The requests were for exceptions to be made in connection with the new shopping center on E. Center Street.

Three of the four were made by the East Center Street Corp. and asked for variance to zoning regulations so that parking would be permitted within one foot of the street line instead of the five feet specified in the regulations; permission to have a free standing lighted ground sign there; and changes to permit building nearer the street line than allowable on the east side of Lenox Street.

A question was raised in connection with parking because the street was about four feet in front of the Jarvis property fronting on E. Center Street. This strip, plus the one foot setback in the application, would bring the area in conformity with other similar parking areas in the town.

However, the state ever uses the land, perhaps for the purpose of widening E. Center Street, and the parking area would be one foot from the sidewalk, posing a problem for the city in passing pedestrians.

No problems were seen in the application for erection of the free standing ground sign, and it was granted because the sign was felt by the ZBA to be necessary for the conduct of business there.

The third application, to allow building nearer the street line than permissible on the east side of Lenox Street, and a similar request made by the East Center Lenox Corp. for the west side of Lenox Street, were both granted by the board.

These two changes were recommended by the Town Planning Commission and the Board of Directors, and were made in connection with negotiations with the state for the donation of land on both sides of Lenox Street.

Of the remaining 15 applications, four were tabled for further investigation and the rest were granted, subject to conditions.

Two requests from Oak Lodge, Inc. for extensions of permission already granted for signs there, one was granted for two years, while the other was tabled.

The latter request was for a sign on the north side of Toland Turnpike on Residence Zone AA while the extension granted concerned a sign on the north side of the same street, west of the Hockanum River in Residence Zone A.

Charles Gibson, who had requested continuation of permission to sell religious articles and books in his home at 373 S. Main St. was given a two year extension.

Permission was also given Howard A. Gibson to replace an existing sign with a free standing lighted ground sign with the lighting not to exceed two 50 watt bulbs, one on either side of the sign, and shielded in such a manner that glare is minimized. This was granted for a six months period.

A request to be allowed to divide a plot of land into four building lots having slightly less frontage than the regulations allow in residence Zone A was accepted and the ZBA, by the division of the lots to be left to the discretion of the applicant, Warren Howard.
