## Hungary Declines To Discuss Mindszenty Freed

Vienna, Austria, Dec. 16 (AP)—The Austrian Catholic News Service Katholik reported that the Austrian government in Budapest as reported by Josef Cardinal Mindszenty has been released from prison in Hungary. But the agency says there is no confirmation of the report. The Vatican also said it had no confirmation of similar reports.

In Budapest, spokesmen for the Hungarian Foreign Ministry and the Government Information Bureau declined to discuss the report. Earlier, there had been indications they might make a statement.

The State Dept. and Catholic agencies in Washington had no information that the Cardinal had been freed.

Katholik said it received information from well-informed sources in Budapest that the Cardinal had been freed one week ago and had gone to his diocese.

The Catholic News Service reported said, under a Budapest date-line: "It usually well informed circles of the Hungarian capital, it was reported yesterday that Cardinal Mindszenty had been freed from his prison since 1949, was released a week ago and had returned to his diocese."

"While diplomatic quarters in Budapest know nothing exactly about his release, the Archbishop's spokesman at Esztergom (Mindszenty's diocese) declared that the Primate is not staying in Esztergom."

"The report, Cardinal's release itself was neither confirmed nor denied by the palace."

Endre Marton, Associated Press correspondent in Budapest, said by telephone he had heard nothing to indicate that Cardinal Mindszenty had been released.

Sentenced to Life

Mindszenty, 63-year-old Roman Catholic Primate of Hungary, was sentenced to life imprisonment by a Red court on Feb. 8, 1949. The court convicted him of treason, leading to overthrowing the Communist government in favor of the West.

indicated, contributed largely to the reduction in traffic fatalities.

Among the 12 biggest cities, only three highway fatalities were reported, one each in New York, Cleveland and Pittsburgh. None was reported in Chicago. This included Los Angeles, Detroit, Baltimore, St. Louis, Washington, D. C., Boston or San Francisco.

No highway deaths were reported in any major city in the six New England states.

Three of the biggest cities reported no traffic deaths. And 25 of the 48 states which observed the nation's first mass effort to save lives by safe driving had no deaths on the highway.

Adm. H. R. Miller (ret.), director of President Eisenhower's Action Committee on Traffic Safety, which sponsored S-D Day, commented on the toll.

"We thank the millions of Americans who sincerely tried to avoid an accident and succeeded if we can do it on S-D Day, we can do it every day."

"Naturally, we wish the S-D toll had been just as low as we wish the traffic toll could be lower every day. But we feel the reduced toll offers definite proof that aroused public opinion and concerted effort can and will bring about a substantial reduction in the traffic toll and sooner than we think."

The National Safety Council figures that for each accident which someone is killed, there are 15 persons injured and 225 accidents.

The number of injured and accidents on S-D Day was not immediately available. But on the basis of average injury-fatality ratio, 45 fatalities would represent 1,575 injured and 10,125 accidents.

In Massachusetts, victims were Pat Kinias of Oxford, struck by an automobile in that town, and Americo Chavez, 25, killed at Somers, when his car struck a tree.

Burlington, Vt., Charles C. Lord, 43, of that city, died when his car struck a tree during a heavy rainstorm.

# Pentagon Plans New Slash in Armed Forces

Washington, Dec. 16 (AP)—The Pentagon is planning a further reduction in the nation's military manpower, with the bulk of the cut coming in Army units.

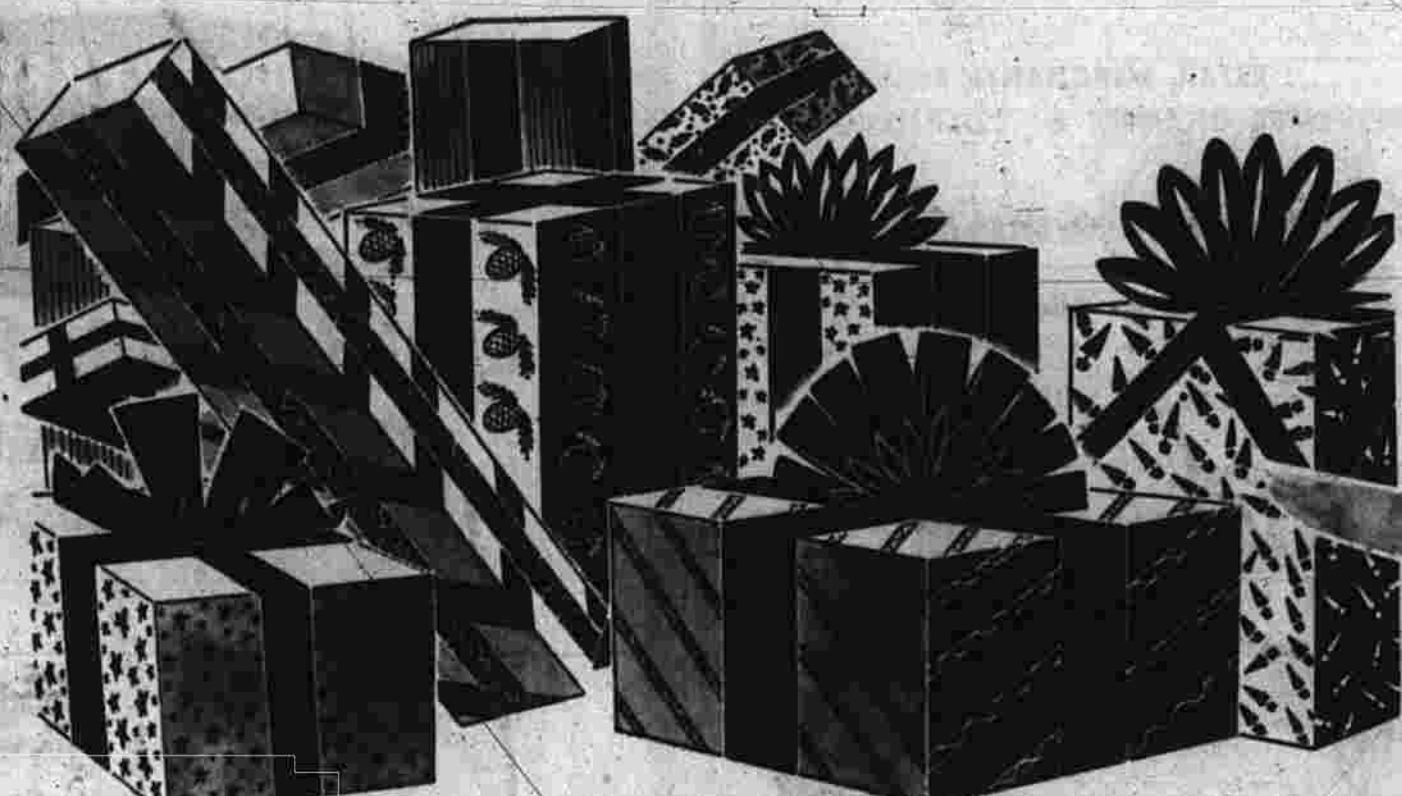

Hal Boyle  
Never Underestimate The Other Guy

Hal Boyle is a nation that fails to remember its past. The lesson it learns is war runs the risk of sudden oblivion. This would be a good time for every American soldier and civilian - and every schoolchild, too - to get a tablet and write in it 100 lines the following sentence: "I won't be afraid of the other guy, but I'll never underestimate him either."

A decade ago today the entire free world awoke to the value of this lesson with a shocked dismay. This is the 10th anniversary of the foggy morning when Adolf Hitler sprung a German Pearl Harbor on the Allies by suddenly smashing through their lines in the Ardennes. Looking back now, the lightning-like thing about the "Battle of the Bulge" is that the Germans achieved almost as complete a tactical surprise as the Japanese had three years before in their war-opening bombing of our bases in Hawaii.

The bitter lesson of Pearl Harbor never jolted your enemy - had he been almost forgotten, certainly by the people at home and by the eyes of the world.

It is only fair to say that these men at the front who say they never had quite shared the unrestrained optimism of the home front. The Doughboys must always regard the outcome of his war as doubtful.

But even our most veteran battle-hardened troops, called by the might of the Nazi attack. And the Belgian people, who have the least reason to be optimistic, are still strong of Germany, were numbered.

A nightmare quality of unreality hung over the entire situation. "Where did the German message go to get all those troops and all those tanks?"

No one knew. After the war it was learned that the American public no longer was concerned about the military problems of the Allies. The Doughboys had drilled their battle-throats to flush it with machine and steel and cover it with the Luftwaffe.

The thing is: He had been able to do this unopposed. He didn't win the Battle of the Bulge, but he there a mighty scare into the Allies. He had almost won in many American homes, and would have if it had not been for the luck of the battlefield had gone more in his favor.

Remember after the war the Jews at Hitler's banquet? He would have won. He did come up with a check for \$100 million. He had a rocket, the jet plane. And he had the atomic bomb.

Remember after the war the Jews about the supposedly mechanical argument. "Remember! How they could build great planes - they forgot to build the engines!"

But they produced a fine fighter plane in Korea, and came up fast with the atom and hydrogen bomb. It is never a mark of intelligence to laugh at the other fellow's ignorance. He may just be playing possum. Every pound of real common sense is leavened by an ounce of caution.

And so, on the anniversary of the morning Hitler delivered his surprise package, it is a good occasion to take up our pencils and write 100 times:

"I won't be afraid of the other guy, but I'll never underestimate him either."

Something worth remembering - this lesson that as a people we often forget so easily.

Recovery Is Seen For New England

Hartford, Dec. 16 (AP)—Economically New England is going forward and backward, says Vice President Alfred C. Neal of the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston.

It is true, he said last night in a talk at Trinity College, that since 1919 the proportion of manufacturing jobs in New England has declined, but those who interpret this as an economic loss are drawing an erroneous conclusion.

It over-industrialized New England, Neal asserted, it was only natural for manufacturing jobs to decrease proportionately to allow for sharp increases in clerical and sales, transportation, education and recreation.

Neal said he was drawing on information obtained by eight years of statistical economic research. Neal said New England's gains in durable goods manufacturing have more than made up for employment losses in non-durable manufacturing and have resulted in higher productivity and higher income.

As for New England's textile industry, often described as declining, Neal expressed the opinion that the textile arms still remaining in the region are in strong shape and are here to stay.

JUDGE DEFINES PARKING  
New Haven, Dec. 16 (AP)—A car isn't necessarily "parked" when it's not moving, ruled Circuit Court Judge Sidney A. Johnson yesterday in denying the plea of Thomas Knoll for restoration of his driver's license, suspended after he was involved in an accident last August. Knoll argued that the Motor Vehicle Dept. had no right to suspend his license because he wasn't "driving" when the accident occurred. He had stopped for a red traffic light.

But Judge Johnson said a parked car is one left unattended at a parking place.

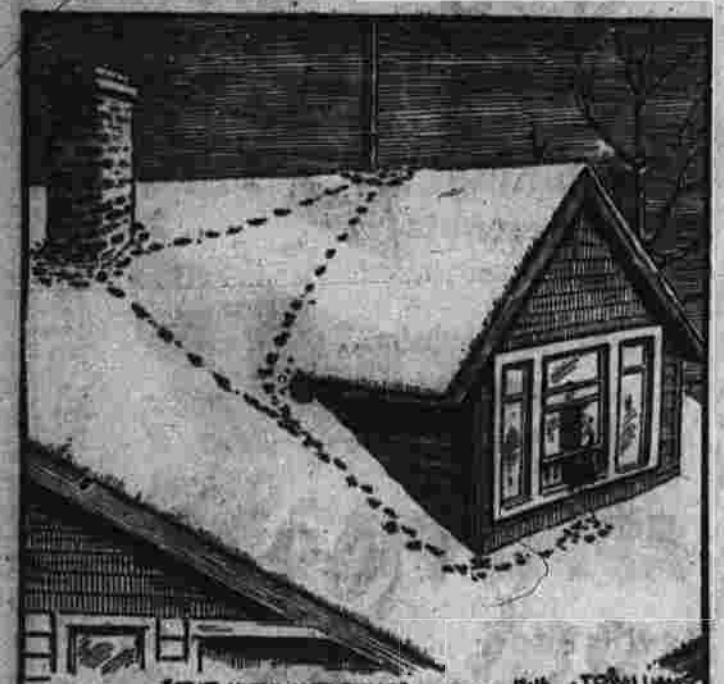

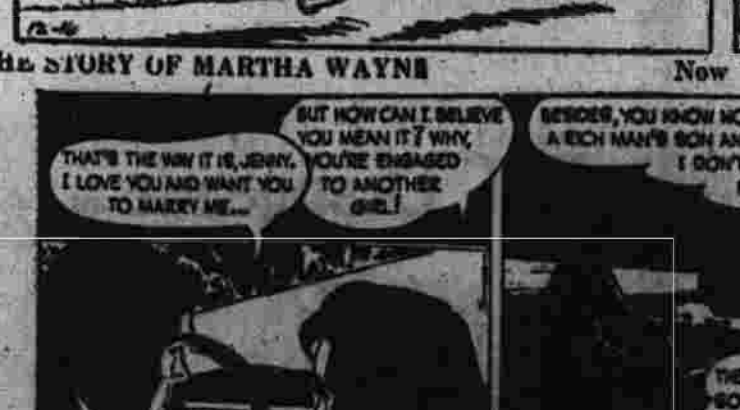
