

## Ex-President Arias Held in Slaying of Panama President

Panama, Jan. 3 (AP)—After a lightning roundup, police announced today they had arrested former President Arnulfo Arias in connection with the slaying last night of President Jose Antonio Remon, young man of this strategic Central American Republic for 10 turbulent years.

Secret police officials said they had arrested more than 20 persons in pre-dawn raids aimed at catching the assassin who machine-gunned the 46-year-old Remon as he chatted with a party of friends at Juan Franco race track.

Two other persons died in the gun battle between the President's bodyguard and his assassins. Three of Remon's companions were wounded.

Police said they nabbed Arias, who was thrown out of office in 1951 by Remon's police forces after a bloody palace battle, at Boca Chica, 200 miles west of the capital. Arias has a large coffee plantation near there. Reports earlier in New York that Arias was traveling in Europe apparently were without foundation.

Guizado Takes Reins  
In a 3 a.m. session, the National Assembly swore in Foreign Minister Jose Ramon Guizado as president. Guizado was elected first vice president on the ticket with

Remon in 1953. Their terms had until October, 1958, to run.

The Assembly had planned to declare a 30-day state of siege but was unable to do so because it lacked the necessary quorum. However, the cabinet in a state-

## 8,008 Risks Taken from U.S. Payroll

Washington, Jan. 3 (AP)—The Eisenhower administration reported today that the number of persons it has dropped from the federal payroll and classed as security risks has reached 8,008, of whom 2,096 had "subversive data" in their files.

Of the total, 3,002 were listed as fired outright and 5,006 as having resigned before final re-termination of their cases. The total represented about one-third of one per cent of the approximately 2,311,000 federal workers.

This new report on operations of its controversial security program was issued by the administration just two days before the convening of the new Democratic-controlled Congress, which promises to give the operation close scrutiny.

Charge Figures Hoax  
Many Democrats have challenged the figures, calling them a "hoax" and a "numbers game." Sen. Olin D. Johnston (D-S.C.) in line to head the Senate Post Office and Civil Service Committee in the new Congress, has said that that group will conduct a full inquiry.

He has already asked for a full report on the program from the Civil Service Commission, which keeps an eye on the operation for the White House and submits periodic reports such as the one it issued today.

The program is aimed at weeding out drunks, gossipers and people with records as law violators as well as Communists, fellow travelers and persons of questionable loyalty. Unlike the program of the Truman administration, it makes no distinction between the disloyal and the security risk.

Today's report, the third to be made public by the Civil Service Commission, covered the period from May 28, 1953, through last Sept. 30, or slightly more than 16 months. The Eisenhower security program took effect on the former date.

The first official report was made last March, the second in October, 1954.

2,096 Subversives  
Today's figure of 2,096 persons listed as having "subversive data" in their files compared with 283 so classified in the March report and 1,713 as described in October. The latter figure covered figures as of last July 1.

In none of the three reports was there a breakdown to indicate how many were "subversive" and how many were outright drunks and how many were resignations while under investigation.

The 8,008 total of those who were fired and those who resigned while still under investigation compared with totals of 2,458 and 6,550, respectively, in the two earlier reports.

The figures were not strictly comparable because, unlike the previous reports, the one issued today did not include figures for the super-secret Central Intelligence Agency (CIA).

It has not been reported in the public interest to release statistics for the CIA, the report said, "and figures pertaining to that agency are not included in this report."

The last previous report listed 75 persons dropped from the CIA payroll—one of whom was listed as fired and 74 as having resigned. All 75 were classed in categories other than "subversive data."

The report is used last March did not include figures for the Defense Dept.

Data in Files  
Today's report said the 2,096 listed in the "subversive" classification represented persons "whose files contained information indicating, in varying degrees, subversive activities, subversive associations or membership in subversive organizations."

## Sales Tax Hike To 4% Is Urged

A special state commission said today Connecticut should pay half the cost of educating its children, with the local governments paying the other half.

Currently, local governments bear about 80 per cent of the cost.

The special commission, appointed by the 1955 state legislature, recommended in a 22,000-word report to Gov. John Lodge, who retires Wednesday, that the state pay a flat \$100 per pupil, no matter how many pupils, to each municipality in the state.

The commission recommends financing the increased state burden of about \$23 million through a one cent increase in the sales tax. The current sales tax rate is three cents on a dollar (3 per cent).

The report was made to the governor by the 7-man commission to investigate the relationship between the state and its subdivisions.

The commission also recommended a new classification of streets and highways; a redesigning of the state's highway aid program in accordance with the proposed classification plan; an increase from 4 to 5 cents in the gasoline tax to support "urgently needed" highway construction; and the naming of a 3-member advisory commission to select highway routes.

The commission also urged that the state undertake the complete responsibility for un cared-for or neglected children. This would take them out of county jurisdiction.

Other recommendations included changes in jail systems and taxation.

The commission recommended across-the-board aid for schools because, it stated, the present plan the state's participation was increasing dollarwise but decreasing percentagewise.

For example, it noted:  
"In 1947-48, total state aid for operating costs amounted to \$11 million accounted for 21.6 per cent of the \$50 million expended for local public education. In 1953-54, \$15.9 million of state aid accounted for 17.6 per cent of the \$90 million expended for local education. Under the present law, the state pays \$114 for each of the first 100 pupils in a school, and then decreases in steps until the rate reaches \$34 for each pupil in excess of 750."

The commission said this system was unequitable.

Under the commission's recommendation, an estimated \$37.5 million will be needed during the 1955-56 school year. This will mean an increase in state revenues of \$23 million, the commission said, since the general per-pupil grant for 1953-54 was about \$14.5 million.

As to the highways, the commission recommended simplifying the current procedure. It proposes to initiate as a joint state and local undertaking a complete classification of the streets and highways of the state grouping those having "arterial" traffic service characteristics into a system such as (a) integrate, (b) state, primary and secondary and (c) local, on the basis of such classification, assign both administrative and financial responsibility for each part of the system to the level of government best suited to handle it.

The commission also recommended revamping of the jail system. It would turn over to the state what currently is the county jail job.

It urges the state to take custody of parole violators, alcoholics and offenders who are sentenced to more than 60 days. It would leave to the counties the custody of other short-term offenders and bound-over prisoners.

County jails currently take offenders who have been sentenced to less than 60 days.

## U. S. Bars 27% Of Country to Red Travelers

Washington, Jan. 3 (AP)—The United States today declared 27 per cent of the country off limits to Russians in a frankly retaliatory move against Kremlin restrictions on the travel of U. S. citizens inside the Soviet.

The tit-for-tat gesture was announced by the State Dept. after Secretary of State Dulles formally notified Soviet Ambassador Georgi Karlov.

For the first time, it creates barred areas and closed cities inside the United States.

The Soviet has had similar restrictions in effect for years.

But the U.S. move held out a suggestion that this country would drop its curbs on travel by Russians if the Soviet government took the first step in that direction.

State Dept. spokesmen said the restricted areas total 27 per cent of the U.S. land area and include part of 39 states, most of the Mexican border and the Great Lakes section of the Canadian border.

In the Soviet, these officials said, about 30 per cent of the land area is closed to travel by U.S. citizens or other foreigners.

The new U.S. regulations take the place of rules set nearly three years ago. Those required Soviet Embassy personnel and members of Amtrak, the Russian trade agency, as well as Tass and other Soviet press agency representatives to stay within 25 miles of the centers of Washington and New York City.

## Worker Tags Seven Defense Plant Reds

Washington, Jan. 3 (AP)—A 26-year-old General Electric Co. worker today named seven former GE employees as Communist agents in testimony to the Senate Investigations Subcommittee. James Juliana, subcommittee counsel, said all of the seven whose names were ticked off by Dante de Cesare of Schenectady, N. Y., had previously appeared before the subcommittee in public session and had refused to answer questions about possible Communist affiliations.

The seven were Sidney Friedlander, Gordon Balgrows, Arthur Owen, Dewey Brasher, Emanuel Fernandez, Robert Northrop and Joseph Gebhardt.

De Cesare was one of four witnesses who appeared before the subcommittee at the forenoon session of resumed hearings on alleged Communist penetration of defense industry.

A fifth man, Edwin Garfield of Allston, Mass., described as an employee of the Atlas Chemicals chemical plant in Boston, was subpoenaed but failed to show up. Instead, he sent a telegram saying he had been unable to arrange counsel.

## Traffic Deaths At 295; Called U. S. Disaster

At least 295 persons were killed in traffic during the nation's New Year weekend holiday.

The heavy toll was termed a "national disaster" by Ned H. Dearborn, president of the National Safety Council which had estimated the two-day holiday would see 240 persons killed in motor vehicle accidents.

Deaths from all types of accidents during the 54-hour period from 6 p. m. Friday to midnight Sunday, totaled 291, with fires accounting for 27 deaths and 39 fatalities resulting from all other mishaps.

The only other two-day New Year's observance since World War II—that of 1948-49—killed 207 in traffic and 309 in all types of accidents.

The United States traffic toll for the weekend compared with only nine deaths reported in Canada. Canada's population is approximately 15 million compared with an estimated 160 millions in the U.S. Driving conditions were generally less favorable for Canada's motorists than for those in most of this country.

The Safety Council, which has been close to accuracy with its pre-holiday traffic fatality estimates, came far under the actual death toll.

## Seven in State Traffic Victims Over Weekend

Seven persons died in traffic accidents in Connecticut over the 54-hour New Year weekend. It was the worst holiday death toll of the year (1954).

In addition, one man died in a fire in Stamford.

There were six traffic deaths on the New Year weekend last year. There also were six deaths on the three-day Memorial Day weekend. However, the worst Connecticut death toll came on a non-holiday weekend—Nov. 19-21—when eight persons died on the highways.

Connecticut's seventh highway death came late last night. Frank Fagin, 76-year-old restaurant employe, was struck by a car in a parking lot at Newtown. State Police said Fagin apparently had fallen to the ground before he was struck. He died just before midnight in Danbury Hospital.

One other of the holiday victims was a pedestrian. Three other highway victims were Waterbury natives.

## U. S. Confident Reds Will Free GI and Civilian To Help Dag

Washington, Jan. 3 (AP)—U.S. officials appeared confident today that Russia soon will keep its promise to release two long-missing Americans without insisting on the return of 11 Russian children now in the West.

Although the U.S. embassy in Moscow hadn't been told when the Russians planned to release the Americans, officials recalled that in a similar case a year ago the Soviets waited several days.

The Americans are William T. Marchuk, 35-year-old AWOL soldier of Brackenridge, Pa., and John Noble 31, a Detroit civilian. They are believed to have been held behind the Iron Curtain longer than any other Americans.

Their cases and those of the Russian children were linked in a note delivered Friday to the U.S. embassy in Moscow. The Soviets promised to return the Americans and other U.N. Assembly delegates in about 15 days.

## U. S. Confident India Rejects Pope Deplores Agreements in Paris, Moscow

New Delhi, Jan. 3 (AP)—Authoritative sources said today that India Prime Minister Nehru had refused a suggestion from U. N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold that a senior Indian diplomat accompany him to Pe-  
These sources, said Nehru based his refusal on the contention that India had abstained from the General Assembly vote under which Hammarskjold is making his trip and therefore could not associate itself fully with the mission.

The U. N. official and his party left by Indian government plane this afternoon on the next leg of the trip to Peiping seeking the release of 11 American airmen and other U. N. personnel held by the Reds.

Cool Attitude  
It could not be learned whether Hammarskjold made his suggestion that an Indian join him prior to his arrival in New Delhi yesterday, or during his stay here.

But the outcome of the suggestion only made more apparent the standoff attitude the Indian government is taking to the Secretary General's trip.

Hammarskjold had his only meeting with Nehru this morning, 18 hours after his arrival from London. They talked alone for two hours, then were joined by V. K. Krishna Menon, chief Indian delegate to the last U. N. Assembly, and N. E. Pillai, secretary general of the Indian Foreign Ministry.

Neither Indian nor U. N. spokesmen revealed what was said. After the talk, Nehru entertained his visitor at lunch.

## Live Atom Missile Tests in February

Each time a child eats a sweet, the teeth are attacked by these acids produced from the sweets.
