### Bricker to Push President Curbs

Washington, Jan. 6 (AP)—Sen. Bricker (R-Ohio) said he will introduce in the Senate today the proposed amendment to limit the powers which are vested in the White House by the Constitution.

Bricker said in a statement he hopes he and President Eisenhower will have time today to agree on appropriate language.

The proposed constitutional amendment would revise the treaty making power. Among other things, it would make treaties valid as domestic law in this country only if approved by legislation was passed by federal or state governments.

Sen. Bricker's administration amendment would give the President power to make and enforce laws. A third amendment is required in both House and Senate to ratify any amendment.
