Ronald, who was to become one of some 5,000 juveniles handed by the Juvenile Court of Connecticut in 1935, was born in Ithaca, N. Y., in 1927 and, along with his parents, his older brother and younger sister, moved to Manchester early in 1934.

The family had been drawn here by the employment possibilities offered by defense plants in the Hartford area. Mr. Mitchell, a skilled sheet-metal worker, found work almost immediately and had been regularly employed in the same factory ever since.

He was regarded as an efficient worker, although he had a great many absences on his record. It was believed that his absenteeism resulted from his drinking, but his acknowledged capability on his job, as well as the intervention of the union's shop steward on at least one occasion, saved him from being fired.

Ronald's mother had money to work in 1934 but the production officer she took the job because bills were beginning to pile up, Mr. Mitchell, however, said it was because she was beginning to wonder what she was doing there.

That first recorded interest of Ronald's in organized group activity, however, was also his last, and it didn't endure. He dropped out of the club a few months after he joined when his parents refused to buy him uniforms or participate in his Cub pack's activities, as other parents did.

TV Only Home Interest
TV Ronald's only interest at home seemed to be watching television. He would sit by the hour in front of the set in the living room, ignoring his school work for it almost entirely.

Although Mrs. Scher's report of Ronald's home-life revealed a family by whom the boy was fast deteriorating, there was also, the probation officer noted, an element of affection and concern. When Mrs. Mitchell called on Mrs. Mitchell a few hours after she had interviewed the boy, she found her upset and on the verge of tears, alternately asking, "Why did he do it?" and demanding that he be returned home.

Not making any apparent effort to improve them. One teacher told Mrs. Scher that she believed part of the trouble lay at home, where his parents, who never showed any interest in his progress, or lack of it, evidently neglected to put any pressure on him to study.

In addition, Mrs. Scher discovered that Ronald was a serious truancy problem, having been absent 15 times between September and the middle of January, when she visited the school.

Now shows I.Q. of 105
However, the school report on Ronald wasn't entirely dark. Mrs. Scher also learned that he had a better than average I.Q. He had made a raw score of 72 on the Otis Essay Test which, for a 15-year-old junior, measures out to an I.Q. of 106.

Another one of the battery of tests given students at Manchester High School, the American Council on Educational Tests, revealed an imbalance in his abilities favoring math and the sciences as opposed to English.

Scher said they had done as much with Ronald as they could in the juvenile court. He had originally been in a college program, but now taking more general courses, with the emphasis on math and science. But nothing had helped, and teachers and administrative officials were back looking for a solution.

However, they all agreed, in conference with Mrs. Scher, that Ronald's I.Q. and the flashes of ability he had shown, warranted some consideration. They said they would continue to work with the boy, provided the court held a hearing that he be permitted to remain at home under supervision.

His parents had agreed to help, but through Mrs. Scher, they learned that their promises had resulted from the teacher's added "pulling out a cigarette and playing with it after I've given him a particularly severe dressing down. It doesn't take him a little either when I take it away from him or make him put it back."

Steadily getting worse
Ronald's marks had been getting steadily worse, and he had been making it exceedingly difficult to meet expenses and pay off debts. Although Mrs. Mitchell was still working at the time of Ronald's referral to juvenile court, and her older son, Steven, a corporal, was serving in the army, a total of \$26, the family was still far from financially secure.

The Mitchell had bought a car, a television set and a washing machine in 1934. Mrs. Scher said that in 1934 Mrs. Mitchell was increasing their picture as she compiled a social history on the boy, there was one bright spot. When Ronald was 10 years old, he had won the Con-Santa award.

After Mrs. Scher had interviewed both parents about the family background, she told them that Ronald would have to appear in juvenile court at the end of the month. She explained briefly the function of the court and how it operates but declined to speculate on what would happen in Ronald's case, merely saying the boy had better remain on his best behavior. Then, after saying that Ronald would be sent home in a day or two, Mrs. Scher left. The next day she visited Manchester High
