snorled submarine is about 85 of feet and man.

The Navy identified one of the injured crewmen as Seaman Robert D. Fulliam. He was burned on the face and arm.

The civilian workers, taken to Marine Memorial Hospital, were identified as Howard R. Swift, 34, South San Francisco, and Robert E. Williams, 24, Oakland, Calif.

All other names were withheld.

"Two lesser explosions shook the gas-filled forward section of the submarine early today—four hours after the initial blast and workers were pulled off the ship."

Lt. Austin K. Loyie, a 12th naval District public information officer, said the Navy will postpone search operations until the Pomodon's batteries discharge and the vessel is cleared of poisonous hydrogen gas. He said it may be necessary to wait next week before search is resumed.

The area after the initial blast was extinguished quickly by civilian workers and sailors from the aircraft carrier Philippine Sea and the submarine Catalina, which was being towed by the USS Albatross. The first explosion ripped the forward battery room where batteries were being charged preparatory to giving the Pomodon her first sea trial today after 4 1/2 months of overhaul.

Photographers were not permitted to take flash pictures because of the hydrogen gas. Navy officials said a spark from a flash bulb might cause a chain reaction explosion.

A Pomodon crewman described the blast as an "average explosion. It was maybe like a big firecracker going off inside."

"A and a couple of other guys climbed down below through the forward torpedo hatch and dragged some of them out. Pumps got pretty bad down there. It was really torn up bad. Even a rat couldn't get from one end of the compartment to the other."

The Pomodon is a sloop-type submarine launched in 1945 and modified for greater speed in 1948. It is 306 feet long, 33 feet wide and 23 feet high.

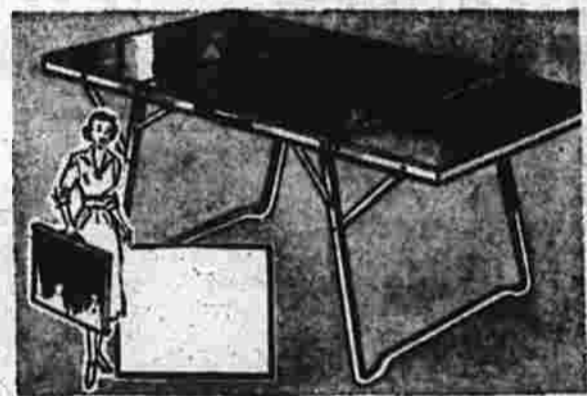

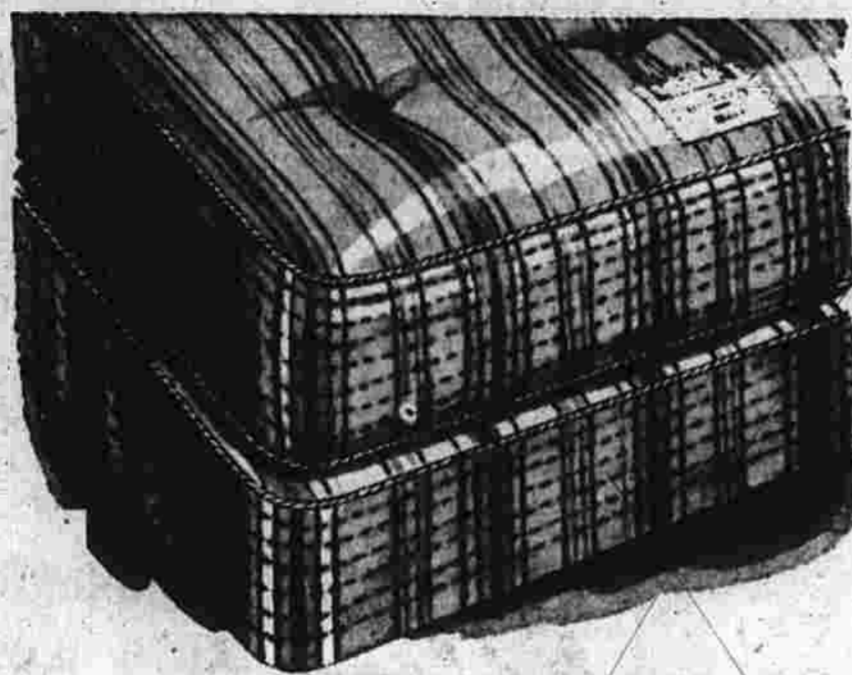

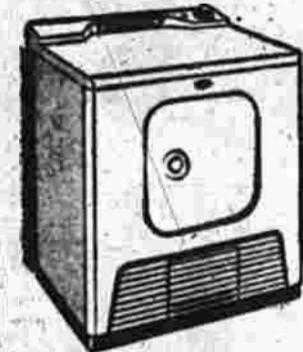

CIO Alerted Against Red 'Rebellions'

Washington (AP)—CIO labor unions were alerted against possible Communist efforts to sneak into the CIO to elect a new leadership aimed at Red-infiltrated labor organizations.

CIO General Counsel Arthur J. Goldberg wrote all affiliated unions a letter warning them to be on guard against Communist infiltration. He advised that the CIO has "welcomed" the movement of the loyal membership of these unions to legitimate labor organizations.

But, he pointed out, the new anti-Communist law provides incentive for the leaders of Red-infiltrated unions to seek "organized admission" by merger or other devices with "legitimate AFL or CIO unions."

In this connection, he noted that the Communist Control Act of 1954 "in effect establishes a presumption that a union affiliated with the AFL, CIO or any other established anti-Communist federation or organization is not Communist-infiltrated."

Moscow (AP)—There's a big drive on now to teach courtesy and politeness to Russian children, school teachers are leading the campaign.

Teachers Gazette, organ of the Ministry of Education, devoted a six-column article to it and there have been articles on the same subject in Komsomol Pravda, the organ of the Soviet Communist Youth League.

"How can one explain," demands Teachers Gazette, "the many cases of rudeness, brusqueness or impoliteness of youngsters—even girls as well as boys..."

"We must teach children at school cultural habits, manners in school, in public places, in every day life, and especially respect for their parents and other adults..."

Sometimes our teachers pay much attention to this and they achieve good results. For instance, in one school, children aged 11 and 12 were urged, so the teachers started to teach them to say "thank you" and how to treat grandparents and parents..."

Eddy Arnold Used Mail Order Guitar To Win TV Fame

New York (AP)—Eddy Arnold, Tennessee farm boy who took a mail-order guitar and went to town with country music, uses a television show of his own coming up on the celluloid network.

Arnold, whose photograph records of country songs have sold in the millions, has done three summer stints on network TV. In the new film show will be his first on regular basis. They will be distributed directly to stations, after the fashion of the Libronet show.

Although Arnold made his reputation as a singer of country songs, he says he plans to include standard popular music in his show as well. Since he hopes the films will be regular numbers, he says he'll stand the test of time.

"When I finally put my guitar in the case I had the feeling it was to be remembered just as a singer, not as a country singer or pop singer—just as a singer," he says.

Better Than One-nighters

Arnold is a little more than half-way through the first 26 of his 30-minute musical films. He started on the air in a number of cities later this month.

"I've worked like a dog," he says. "I haven't worked this hard in 10 years—no, I still better than one-nighters."

Eddy hasn't had many one-nighters in the past few years, however. When he has, they've been his own at the Grand Conception Hall in Washington, football fields and exposition.

He was summer replacement for Perry Como on CBS-TV in 1952 for Dixie Shore on NBC-TV in 1953. Last summer he was featured on NBC's program "The Farm." He has made two movies and RCA Victor has sold sales of his records have passed 30 million.

Prosperity Cuts German Exodus

Bonn, Germany (AP)—Prosperity at home and the prospect of early sovereignty are drastically reducing the heavy postwar migration of Germans to the United States.

U.S. High Commission officials say applications for West German emigration visas to America are now 50 per cent less than a year ago.

West Germany's annual quota of 25,000 emigrants to America will be filled during the year ending June 30, 1955 but the number of Germans to find new homes there is over.

When times were hard a few years ago, tens of thousands of West Germans fled to America. American consulates in the hope of emigrating. Now the bustling German cities are lacking in prosperity. There are plenty of jobs. Many who have applied to emigrate pass up their changes when their applications are approved.

The U.S. Consulate in Munich now receives about 700 applications a month compared with 1,600 a year ago. The Hamburg Consulate reports an average of 600 a month now compared with more than 1,000 a year ago. The Frankfurt Consulate receives 800 a month in contrast to 1,000 a year ago.

West Germany soon may become an immigration rather than an emigration country. Facing a labor shortage if rearmament begins this year, the government already is considering "important" Italian workers.

This nation's "export" of slaves to the United States is holding up. They are not included in the regular emigration quota. The Munich consulate handles 2,500 non-quota German emigrants a year. And 95 per cent are brides of American servicemen stationed here.

The Frankfurt consulate registers 300 to 400 brides a month.

Madison, Wis. (AP)—Architect Frank Lloyd Wright, who had declared he would leave Wisconsin because he wasn't appreciated, says he now plans to remain in his native state because he has found affection and thoughtfulness he never knew existed.

The famed dean of American architects was honored at a testimonial dinner here recently. He also was given a check for \$10,000 "as a token of appreciation" to help him pay back taxes on his studio home at Spring Green, Wis. It was last November that Wright said he would leave Wisconsin. That was just after the State Supreme Court ruled that Wright's Fellowship School for Architects at Spring Green did not qualify as an educational institution and that Wright therefore was subject to pay some \$18,000 in back taxes. Wright said then the proposed exodus from his native state did not involve the back taxes but a lack of appreciation.

Wright was in Madison for his 80th birthday, said "After that demonstration of feeling and affection last night, I don't think it would be possible for me to leave my native state."

"I never knew much affection and thoughtfulness existed. It would be ungrateful of me to consider leaving the state now."

TV Historical Miscues Spur Many Protests

New York, (AP)—It's the little things that can trip you up in historical shows on television, says Dr. Francis Ronalds of Carleade of America.

Dr. Ronalds, historical consultant for the weekly ABC show, says that if a show concerning the War of 1812 had a U.S. flag with only 13 stripes there would be a lot of protests.

"There were 17 stripes as well as 17 stars in the flag in the War of 1812," he says.

The onetime University of Illinois history professor points out that the original plan for the flag was to add a stripe as well as a star for each new state. When the number began to get too large, the flag reverted to the original 13 stripes and added only stars for new states.

Spot blunders

A show such as Carleade may present a historical fact that is unknown to many or even most people, he says. But there are a lot of people who do know all about it. They will spot even minor blunders.

On one show involving the Charter Oak, he recalls, one of the characters went to a window and raised a hand to look out. There was a flood of letters from viewers pointing out that such window curtains weren't in use in that period.

Dr. Ronalds and John Driscoll, script editor for Carleade, say the problem of the show from radio to TV greatly complicated the task of insuring authenticity. Any scene involving guns, for instance, could have been handled by the sound effects man in such a way that guns must be shown and they have to be right.

Ted Oberfelder, ABC vice president, proposes to find out whether daytime TV audiences might prefer straight entertainment to soap operas, quiz shows and how-to-do-it.

Starting Feb. 28, he's putting a daily 15-hour variety show on the network's local station, WABO-TV, in what he admits is a big gamble involving a budget of \$200,000 a week. And while it will be seen initially only in the New York area, it could have considerable impact on daytime TV programming on a national basis if it succeeds.

Oberfelder says he's not aiming so much as taking current viewers away from rivals as inducing more people to turn on their TV sets at the daytime. He reports an average of only 17 per cent of sets are turned on during daytime hours in this area, and says he's aiming at the other 83.

The show will be premiered after Broadway reverts. The cast will include Ray McKinley and his orchestra, actress Marian Colby, singer Bob Carroll and Tom Fuston as master of ceremonies.

"There's no middle ground on this," says Oberfelder. "I think it's going to be either a great big success or a big flop."

Bill Seeks to End Electoral College

Washington (AP)—A constitutional amendment to eliminate the electoral college system of voting by states as a unit for president and vice president, was proposed by Rep. Letoy Johnson (R-Calif.).

Johnson's proposal, similar to those introduced in every Congress for 10 years or more, would divide the electoral votes in accordance with the popular vote in each state.

The California congressman said the present electoral college system outmoded and said "it actually franchises all of the voters who voted for the losing presidential candidate."

"It could result, and has resulted in the election of presidents by a minority of the popular vote," he said in a statement.

Johnson cited the presidential election of 1948 in which President Truman won reelection with 30.2 per cent of the total vote but lost the electoral college to Republican Dwight D. Eisenhower.

In California, Truman received only 1,260 more votes than Dewey, Johnson said, yet he received the entire 26 electoral votes from that state.

Under Johnson's proposal, the California votes in 1948 would have been divided: Truman 14 and Wallace 3.

"This system would help build a two-party system in the South as it would count the votes of Republicans for president—this they might be encouraged to build up their strength," Johnson said.

"In Florida in 1948, 104,000 Republicans voted for Dewey and the Democrats, 281,000 for Truman. All the Republican votes were thrown away. This same situation happened in almost every southern state."

Berlin (AP)—The Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra is going to the United States this month for a tour of 19 cities. The trip may show whether music lovers there are willing to forget about the tainted past of some of its members.

"We consider it significant, both culturally and politically, that 10 years after the war we have a chance to go to America," says the orchestra manager, Gerhart von Westerman.

The orchestra's temporary conductor, Herbert von Karajan, was a Nazi party member. So were Von Westerman and some of the orchestra's 103 members. Roughly half of them played in the orchestra during the war. In return, they received the supreme favor from Adolf Hitler—exemption from military duty.

"It is possible there will be no objection to us," Von Westerman conceded in an interview. "If there are, we hope we can win over the objectionists in Europe, though U.S. occupation officials in Austria harshly harassed him from conducting."

A spect from Philadelphia, who had held Nazi party membership until 1942, said he had no objection to his going.

"We must prove that music has nothing to do with politics," he said in a recent interview.

Clementine Gave Atom Men Scare

Washington (AP)—In the hopes of age of industrial power, a new kind of repairman will be thankful for the memory of "Clementine," an American atomic furnace that broke down.
He will be guided, too, by lessons learned from "Alex," a Canadian reactor that also ran into hard luck.
Both reactors had to be completely dismantled because they developed dangerous radioactive hazards. Only the Canadian reactor was put back into operation, but valuable lessons were learned from both tear-down jobs.
These were ticklish, risky undertakings, requiring the development and application of ingenious techniques, some remotely controlled, to prevent death or injury to the men working on them.
The story of "Clementine" is related by the Atomic Energy Commission. And, while a part of the Canadian story has previously been told, scientists have recently been speaking up about the mishap which occurred in 1952.
Radiation Under Control
Both jobs were accomplished without exposing scientists and repairmen to dangerous amounts of

radiation, despite the fact that large amounts of radioactivity had to be handled. The Canadian project included disposing of approximately one million gallons of water containing more radioactivity than is present in the world's entire known supply of radium.

"Clementine" was an experimental reactor completed in 1948 at the AEC's Los Alamos, N. Mex. It was designed to produce the heat for the production of plutonium. It was the first of a series of reactors designed to produce plutonium for the production of atomic bombs.
The reactor was built in a concrete structure, and the fuel was contained in a central core. The core was surrounded by a moderator, which was used to slow down the neutrons produced by the fission of the fuel.
The reactor was operated for a period of several months, but it was found that the core was becoming overheated, and the moderator was becoming contaminated with radioactive material.

Movie Preview Held Vital in Film Industry

By BOB THOMAS Hollywood, Feb. 20.—Our lesson for today concerns that peculiar Hollywood institution, the lobby.

For some time on the preview I went to Mervyn LaRoff, longtime boy wonder of films. Still boyish at 34, he has been directing pictures for almost 30 years and claims to be the wisest of 3,000 previewers.

"Previewers are indispensable," he told me in his comfortable studio office. "You can't get your head and soul into a picture, but you never know if it's good until you play it to an audience."

"Virtually all producers except Darryl Zanuck preview their pictures. Some of them claim certain audience around Los Angeles are judged by too frequent previews and studios go far afield to seek fresh reactions. LaRoff says that at the previewers' courts at the

"All you need is an audience—any kind of audience," he said. "Give me a crowd of ten and I'll tell you where that picture is going to go. That's all I need to find out the worth of a picture."

"Some studios hand out cards for the previewers to express their opinions on. LaRoff thinks this is a bad idea.

"I make everybody a critic," he reasoned. "That's bad. Then the ticket buyers start getting analytical about what they liked or didn't like in the picture."

"You don't need cards. You can get the feel of the audience just by observing them. Look at the balcony and look down on them. If they sit forward in their seats, I know the picture is going well. If they slump back and get sleepy, that means trouble."

"The director said he has never had a picture that couldn't be fixed after a preview. He remarked, pointing to boxes on the stage wood, that he has never had a real flop."

"You can always fix up a picture, as long as you have had a good story to begin with, he observed. If you didn't have a good story, you've made nothing can help you. But I've always tried to start off with good scripts."

Anthony Ladd Small Egg Even some big film stars have been lobbied after previews. He said that Anthony Adams laid a small egg at the preview because it was about a half-hour too long. But it was a winner after some editing was done. Likewise the Wizard of Oz litigated up after the first showing. That's the colorful part of preview courts—overlength.

"But some require retakes to lengthen the picture or explain containing story points," LaRoff said. "We found out the hard way over Tokyo. We found out the hard way that the Japanese had no sense of the light scenes."

Recently LaRoff went to San Francisco and Oakland to preview Robert Taylor's "The Sign of the Cross." He found that the dialogue had to be inserted to space out the laughs.

"How come he went north for the preview? Because you get a broader audience up there, he said. "But this doesn't fit with his statement that audiences are the same everywhere. Oh well, who needs consistency?"

Plymouth Has More Powerful Models in '35

Detroit.—President John R. Manfield of Plymouth Motor Corporation reports the 1935 Plymouths are entirely new, both in styling and engineering details. They are lower, longer and wider than previous Plymouth cars.

They are the most powerful cars Plymouth ever built. The 1935 engines are a 117-horsepower Plymouth six, a 137-horsepower Plymouth V-8 and a 167-horsepower Plymouth V-8. The latter engine also is available with a four-barrel carburetor and special manifold which increases its horsepower to 177.

Plymouth offers as optional equipment a full range of automatic and power assist devices. They include PowerFite fully automatic clutch transmission, a new design coast full-time power steering, power brakes, power

operated front seat adjustment, power-operated windows, regulators, and adjustable speed electric windshield wipers. Air conditioning by Airtemp has been available as special equipment.

The 1935 line is made up of 13 models, including for the first time four-door versions of the Plymouth Suburban, the all steel body "station wagon" type car which Plymouth pioneered in 1934.

Manfield said the 1935 models are all new in a more basic sense than at any previous new model introduction in the company's history.

"We started three years ago to design them," he said. "Every thing is new. This applies not only to their styling and interior decor but also to the body structural details, the frame, the suspension system, the interior wiring and heating system and many other features. It literally is true that our 1935 models are new from bumper to bumper."

Styling by Exner. Plymouth's 1935 styling is the creation of a design team headed by Virgil M. Exner, director of styling. It is based on the streamlined, aerodynamic styling which Exner says, that styling must first be conceived as a unity. Ornamentation is then used to accentuate existing highlights rather than to create new ones.

Among the distinctive features of Plymouth's new styling are a low silhouette, slimmer and sleeker lines of body lines deeply recessed head lights and tail lights, and an overall appearance of forward motion.

Plymouth four-door sedans are 10 1/2 inches longer than 1 1/2 inches wider and 1 1/2 inches lower. Front seats are 3 1/2 inches wider and rear seats 1 1/2 inches wider.

A new Full-View wrap-around windshield, with sweep-back center posts, at top and bottom, has 16 per cent more glass area. It is contoured to eliminate distortion and to give the driver maximum vision at eye level.

The new models have push-button door handles. They operate with a new rotary latch which maintains the automatic self-lighting characteristic of Plymouth doors.

The fuel filter pipe has been moved from the rear to the right side of the car, with an ultraviolet hinged door on the right rear panel. The filter pipe occupies unused space behind the spare tire.

The trunk compartment has 33.3 cubic feet of useful space and the trunk compartment lid has an entirely new "rotation" bar hinge mechanism which provides more hand clearance and a more evenly balanced deck lid.

The color styling and fabrics of 1935 models are new. They are trend-setting, in the confident belief of Plymouth designers who made use of new methods of analyzing color preferences and cycles of color popularity. The 14 new exterior colors in the new models, for example, were chosen in a series of eliminations which started with 50 different colors.

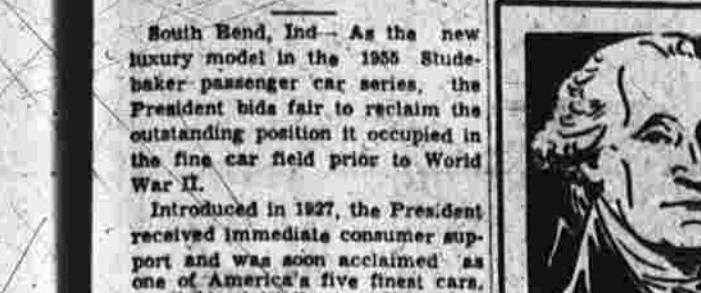
